Occurring about 6 p.m., the motor of the hay chopper had been turned off, but Geraghty's hand was placed beneath the blades before they had stopped revolving.

Geraghty's presence of mind following the accident prevented severe bleeding as he held the artery at his elbow until aid arrived.

Idaho Power Work Starts

BOISE, Idaho (AP) — The Idaho Power Co. will begin work on the first of three dams authorized in the Hells Canyon reach of the Snake River as soon as the Federal Power Commission approves final design plans, company president T. E. Roach said Tuesday.

Roach said work will start first at Brownie Dam to be followed "as soon as possible" by construction at Oxbow. Construction of the low Hells Canyon Dam will follow "as rapidly as required by the expanding needs of the company's service area and of the Northwest Power Pool."

Roach outlined company plans at a directors' meeting during which the company formally accepted an FPC license authorizing the three dams.

Actors Face Red Probe

WASHINGTON (UP) — Some 30 Broadway personalities have been subpoenaed by House investigators for hearings starting Monday in New York on Communist activities in TV, radio and the theater.

Included are Jerome Chodorov, who wrote the stage and screen versions of "My Sister Eileen," and comedian Zero Mostel. Actor-producer Sam Jaffe and folk singers Lee Hays and Peter Seeger also are on the list.

Chairman Francis E. Walter (D-Pa) said the hearings, by a three-man House Un-American Activities Subcommittee, are a continuation of inquiries into Red activities in Hollywood, and should have the same result.

"I expect we'll find," he said, "that a lot of people in the entertainment business who have been Communists have used large incomes they got from entertainment to further the Communist cause."

Stocks Stay Steady Today

NEW YORK (UP) — Stocks steadied today, gaining fractions to a point or more in early dealings after a two-day decline had slashed nearly three billion dollars from the value of all listed issues.

Aircraft stocks, one of the new strong spots in the midst of yesterday's selling, continue in demand and ran up gains ranging to 1 1/2 points in Boeing at 61 3/4 in United at 74 1/2, and 1/2 in Douglas at 70 1/2.

Oils had some good performers with Standard of California up a point to 89 1/2, Socony Mobil 1/2 to 50 1/2.

De Pont ran up 2 1/2 to 216 1/2. Union Carbide and Allied Chemicals firmed.

Chrysler, selling ex-dividend, gained 1/2 to 88 1/2, but General Motors dipped 1/4 to 128 1/2.

Steels were firm with Bethlehem up 1/2 to 144 1/2 and U.S. Steel 1/2 to 81 1/2.
