

Oregon Women's Softball Tourney Opens Thursday

Oregon's best women softballers and top 11 teams will open a four day Oregon State Women's Softball Tournament here Thursday night at Conger Field in what is expected to be one of the finest tournaments yet held.

A total of 20 games is scheduled for the four day softball classic. Thursday night's slate finds just three evening games, but on Friday 11 trays will be played starting at 1 o'clock in the afternoon and closing with a pair of 8:30 tilts that night. Four games will be played Saturday, two in the afternoon and two more at night. Sunday's schedule will have two and possibly three games.

Three teams will boast all of the returning all-stars from past state tournaments, but the other eight entries all have bright prospects seeking ways to earn the 1955 honors in this week's state playoffs.

Roseburg, Lake Oswego and the Klamath Basin-ettes are the only teams entered that have all-star players listed on their tournament roster. Roseburg has pitcher Jack Weber who has been selected to the Oregon all-state squad once and the Idaho state team twice. Included among Weber's honors is the all-region pitching selection in 1952 while playing for the Caldwell Motor-ettes. Donna Bashford was selected to the position of utility outfielder in the 1953 state tourney and will be after the dream team selection again.

ALL STATE
Two other Roseburg players are also due for credit. First baseman Gladys Oyer was all-state while playing in Idaho in 1952 and Joy Young was a member of the 6th Army WAC softball team in 1953.

Klamath's Basin-ettes have five all-stars and one all-region player as they seek to capture their second championship in as many seasons of play. Ruth Hagelstein is a three time choice for the state team and last fall was chosen on the all-region team at Caldwell, Idaho. The four other all-stars are pitcher Mickey Hayman, shortstop Sandy Barron, who was picked as the 1954 utility infielder, catcher Teddy Walker and outfielder Darlene Gordon Perry. Walker has been selected twice, the other three once.

The Lake Oswego Mermaids will undoubtedly go into the tournament as heavy favorites and are loaded with all-star material of every sort including one former All-American softball player.

ALL-AMERICAN
Thelma Patricia Carlson ex-star of the Ery Lind Florida was an All-American pick a few years back and has been selected to three Oregon all-state teams. Carlson will probably divide her time in the outfield and pitching for the Mermaids.

Other standouts include all-state catcher Madilyn Lindsay, three time selection, Jackie Rice one time all-state pitching choice, right fielder Joan Safarik one time pick third baseman, Jess Safarik, two timer on past all-state teams, Mogue Witten, four year all-stater at shortstop, Catherine Canard a two year pitching choice and three time infielder Florence Dick, a second baseman.

All-in-all state softball officials are looking for one of the finest state tournaments yet held as is the thought of tournament director Jack Kemmler.

The advance ticket sale is still making very swift moves which might also point for a successful tourney. The season ticket sale is being carried on by the local Junior Chamber of Commerce, the Merrill team and the Basin-ettes.

Tickets are on sale at Beach's Jewels, Model Shoe Store, Gagnons, Rickys Town and Country and the city recreation office at the city hall. Price of the 20-game season ducaats are \$2 and the single game tickets are 50 cents for adults and 25 cents for students.

The amateur gold champion of South Carolina is Aubrey Rothrock—a student at the University of North Carolina. His home is Spartanburg, S. C.

Eugene Outguns NWL Foes; Salem Victors

The Eugene Emeralds brought out their big guns Tuesday night to end Wenatchee's threat to their dominance of the Northwest Baseball League.
The Emeralds shelled three Wenatchee pitchers for 17 hits in a 20-10 slugfest that evened the "crucial" series at Wenatchee as a game apiece. The setback dropped the Chiefs four games back of the Oregonians with two contests remaining in the current stand.
The Tri-City Braves kept pace with the Emeralds, however, with an 8-7 win over Yakima that left them still three games away from the leader.
Salem beat Spokane 6-2 in the league's other encounter to square the series at Spokane at one each. The semi-pro Cheney Studs beat Lewiston 15-3 in an exhibition game at Tacoma.
Seven errors and the 13 bases on balls given up by Wenatchee batters helped the Emeralds in their rout of the Chiefs. Eugene started with four runs in the first inning (two on George Huffman's homer) picked up six in the second, three in the third, two each in the fourth and seventh innings and closed the scoring with three in the eighth. CHICAGO (AP)—It might not make a particle of difference in the \$100,000 World tourney starting tomorrow, but national golf prestige is at stake in Tam O'Shanter's international matches which close today with a promised dogfight.

In yesterday's opening round of the TAM version of the Ryder Cup matches, an eight-member United States team nudged to a 2½-1½ lead over a foreign team in four-course competition.

The same 16 players pair off today in eight matches which may produce as close a finish as last year's opening international competition resulting in a 6½-5½ American victory.

Hunters Not Entitled To Two Special Hunts

Clarification of special deer, elk and antelope seasons was made today by state game agent Ken Cochran in hopes of saving local hunters from losing their special season privileges.

Cochran told the Herald and News that hunters are not allowed to apply for special antelope and controlled deer hunt tags in the same year. Those who have already applied for an antelope tag and are planning to do the same for the special deer season tags will have their applications thrown out and could possibly lose both chances.

The only controlled deer season area that it is permissible to apply for an antelope tag as well as a permit for special deer season is the Rogue River area. The regular season deer tag and the permit will be sufficient for this area. All areas except the Rogue River cost \$5 for the tag. The money must accompany the tag application.

Special deer seasons are in the following areas: John Day River, Wallawa Mountains, Hart Mountain, Rogue River, Alifalfa, Newbridge, Northside, Pleasant Ridge and Lookout Mountain. The application deadline for the areas in their respective orders are August 15, August 15, September 1, September 1, and September 15 for the final five areas listed above.

CONTROLLED
The elk hunters who are interested in applying for a special controlled elk hunt will have a chance at 14 different localities from which to pick. The deadline for applications for each of the following districts is October 3. The areas are Elgin, Cheshnum, Unatula, Ukiah, Desolation, Wenaha, Starkey, Mill Creek, Tillamook, Clatsop and Cottonwood Creek. There is no charge for an elk permit. The regular tag will be used. Hunters can apply for antelope or special deer hunting privileges as well as the controlled elk hunt.

The drawing for the antelope tags and the Sled Springs elk hunt was made this morning at 10 o'clock. Drawing times for the John Day and Wallawa Mountain special deer hunt will be made August 18. The Hart Mountain and Rogue River drawings will be made on the morning of September 7, while September 23 has been established as the drawing date for the remaining five controlled areas.

A few minor changes have been made in the special elk hunt that were recorded since the applications were issued to sporting

good dealers. Here is in part the release sent out by state game director Phil Schneider and his Portland office:

DELETED
The Burnt River season has been deleted from the list of special areas for elk hunts. The season dates of the following areas have been changed from November 5-23 to November 11-23: Cheshnum, Minam, Heppner, Walla Walls, Unatula, Ukiah, Desolation, Wenaha, and Starkey.

The Wenaha and Sled Springs area permits have been reduced from 400 to 200 and the Sled Springs area description has been altered to the following boundaries: Beginning at Wallawa; thence northerly along the Bates logging road to its junction with the west Grossman logging road; thence northwesterly along the west Grossman road to its intersection with the west fork of Grossman creek; thence northerly along the west fork of Grossman creek and Grossman creek to its confluence with the Grande Ronde River; thence northeasterly down the Grande Ronde River to Troy; thence southeasterly along the Flora road to its junction with State Highway 3; thence along State Highway 3 to its junction with State Highway 82 at Enterprise; thence northwesterly along State Highway 82 to Wallawa, the point of beginning.

Applications for any of the special or controlled seasons yet to come may be picked up at a local sporting good store without cost.
