

California Weather Good

SAN FRANCISCO (UP) — California weather summary: Clear skies are present over all of the interior portions of the state except a few scattered clouds in the southern portion. Coastal areas are covered with fog and low clouds nearly everywhere except clear on the extreme southern coast.

Temperatures, Tuesday were slightly lower at some inland points but maximum temperatures of 100 or more were reported from many desert and valley points. Coastal temperatures ranged from 85 to 88 on the northern and central portions and 70-80 on the south coast. Low temperatures this morning are several degrees lower in Central Valley but mostly unchanged over other sections with a range from 86 at Needles to 48 on the North Coast.

Men Held In Hong Kong

HONG KONG (UP)—Hong Kong police detained a United Press reporter and a Movietone News cameraman for an hour today and required them to give statements and destroy his film before their release.

Newsmen William Miao and cameraman Marvin Parkas were taken into custody by police while interviewing and making a film of American businessman Arnold Kiehn, who was being detained in a Hong Kong hospital pending his deportation from this British crown colony.

The two were taken to a police station where a police officer took their statements and Parkas was required to expose the film he had made of Kiehn.

Miao and Parkas were told by police that they should not have taken a film of any person under police custody. The newsmen emphasized they were merely carrying out their duties as members of a free press.

Massachusetts Polio Gains

BOSTON (UP)—Massachusetts' polio outbreak passed into the epidemic stage today.

The Public Health Department reported 112 new cases for a total of 1038 thus far this year.

A department spokesman previously said 1000 cases constituted an epidemic.

There were only 98 cases in Massachusetts at this time last year. Today's number of new cases was the highest for one day in the state's history.

Of the new cases, 51 were paralytic, 42 non-paralytic, and 19 were unclassified.

Nineteen of the new cases were in Boston, hardest hit by the polio outbreak.

Fisherman Drowns In B.C. Lake

SALEM (UP)—Glenn O. Davis said Tuesday he had received word that his business associate, Fred A. Davis, about 43, Salem, drowned in a lake north of Prince George, B. C., Tuesday morning.

He said he was informed that Davis fell from a 20-foot outboard cruiser while trying to untangle a fish line.

He reported that Davis' wife, Lillian, grabbed his clothing but lost her grip. Also on the boat were their two children and a friend.

Davis was a partner with Lewis, in the Willamette Amusement Co. here.

Pair Drown In California River

MODESTO (UP)—Tony Alton Smith, 9, and James Olin Barry, 51, Rivers, drowned late yesterday while swimming in the Tuolumne River in Stanislaus County.

The youngster lost his life when he apparently stepped into a deep hole near Modesto. His body was recovered about an hour later by sheriff's deputies. The victim's parents are farm workers.

Investigators reported Barry drowned six miles east of Modesto near Hughson when he probably was stricken with cramps. Officers said Barry had been working in the fruit harvest.

FIRE

SACRAMENTO (UP)—Josephine D. Harris, 33, died in Sacramento County Hospital yesterday of burns suffered when fire swept through her home in Del Paso Heights. She was found on the floor by firemen after they extinguished flames at the fire last Saturday. Miss Harris suffered burns over 60 per cent of her body in the blaze, believed to have started from a cigarette smoldering on a mattress.



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Airport Funds Go To Oregon Fields

WASHINGTON (UP)—Improvement of three Oregon airports is assured by allocation of federal matching funds by the Civil Aeronautics Administration, Sen. Morse and Neuberger and Rep. Green, Oregon Democrats, announced Wednesday.

The allocations are \$300,000 to the Portland International Airport, \$185,800 to Mahlon Sweet Airport at Eugene and \$34,500 to the Medford Municipal Airport.

The congressional delegation members said the funds are for runway extensions and reconstruction. They said the money is in addition to funds to be allocated within the next 90 days for other Oregon airport projects. The funds were voted by the recent session of Congress.

PORTLAND (UP)—The possibility of a cent-a-quart milk price increase looms for Portland area consumers.

PLUNGE

HOOD RIVER (UP)—The plunge of a car from a 300-foot bluff five miles south of here Monday night killed Earl Neal, 39, believed to have been a migrant farm worker from Pecora and Wyoming, Ill. Martin Mandora, believed to have been the driver, suffered multiple cuts. Both men were thrown from the car when it missed a curve on a road overlooking the Hood River.

A dairymen's group, the Grade A Milk Producers, asked distributors Tuesday to restore the cent cut the dairymen took after voters repealed the state milk control law last November.

Four distributors who attended the meeting at which the action was taken indicated they felt the dairymen's request was justified. There was no announcement of distributors' plans, but price increases to producers usually are passed on to the consumer.

Dairymen explained that they cut the price in the hope that production costs would go down. But, they said, Oregon State College figures show that costs actually have increased. Oscar Hagg, OSC marketing specialist, said producers are in "an extreme squeeze."

Phony Stock Sale Case Tried

OAKLAND (UP)—The court ordered Charles Fausel to return to his home in Phoenix yesterday following his plea of guilty to 17 counts of violating the corporate securities act by selling phony uranium stock.

Superior Judge Donald K. Quayle also told Fausel, 66, he must not handle stocks. Also named in the indictment charging the sale of \$100,000 in worthless stock were Jewel Rivers, 63, Hayward, and Gus Rogers, 80, believed to be in Nevada. Mrs. Rivers goes on trial Aug. 29.

KILLED

MERCED (UP)—Orbie D. Morris, a Merced area farmer, was killed last night when his pickup truck went out of control and overturned two miles west of here.

San Francisco Busiest Port

SAN FRANCISCO (UP)—The Board of Harbor Commissioners reported today that San Francisco's port has been rated in a nationwide survey as the busiest port on the Pacific Coast in terms of ship arrivals and departures.

The survey reported by the Maritime Association of the Port of New York credited San Francisco with 5204 arrivals and 2137 departures during the first six months this year and ranked it in sixth place among all U. S. ports.

The Port of Los Angeles, with 2181 arrivals and 2160 departures for the first six months this year, closely followed San Francisco both in national and west coast ranking. Seattle and Portland were rated 10th and 11th among U.S. ports.

NEW CASES

PORTLAND (UP)—The State Board of Health received reports of 10 new polio cases last week, increasing the year's total to 110. The total was seven less than for the week before.

The board said no trend can yet be determined in the polio incidence because the peak usually does not come until September or October.

MEDAL

WASHINGTON (UP)—President Eisenhower yesterday signed a bill awarding Dr. Jonas E. Salk a \$2500 gold medal for his part in developing the Salk anti-polio vaccine.
