

Babe Determined In 2nd Bout With Cancer

GALVESTON, Tex. (AP) — Babe Didrikson Zaharias cautiously got out of a hospital bed to show that she wasn't licked yet—and was determined to win her second battle with cancer.

The world's greatest woman athlete said, "get my shoes," when her husband encouragingly told her:

"Show us how you can walk. They hear all this talk about your being sick and may think you can't walk."

George Zaharias, the former "Weeping Greek" of wrestling fame, beamed happily as the Babe cautiously left her bed and walked around the room.

The Babe was making plans to return to competitive golf next season when Zaharias and a visitor

entered her John Sealy Hospital room.

"I finished a nap a few minutes ago and have been thinking about my 56 clubs and clothes and how pretty they are going to look," she said.

"I'm feeling much better," "It's my right foot that bothers me," she explained, "but it is much better after the treatment."

Babe began receiving X-ray treatments last Thursday, minutes after doctors told her a "small cancer lesion" in the pelvic area was the cause of pain that persisted after a successful spinal disc operation June 22.

It was a recurrence, a possibility that haunts many patients who have won a bout with cancer. In 1933, in Beaumont, the Babe underwent surgery for removal of a rectal malignancy.

Doctors were uncertain as to her golf future after the Beaumont operation but four months later she placed third at Chicago's Tam O'Shanter and won the Women's National Open at Peabody, Mass., in July 1934.

No surgery is planned this time, at least for the present. Both the Babe and George recognize they face another tough battle. Both are confident.

George puts it this way:

"The time we've spent here in the hospital is just a time out for a rest after being a champion 27 years."

The X-ray treatments at the University of Texas Hospital are expected to continue another 10 to 15 days.

After that?

"We're going to do just what our doctors tell us," George said.

"We believe in our doctors here and feel that what can be done will be done here. We are hopeful, just like before. The Babe will come out of it and believe she will. She's responding very well. She has less pain day by day. She took a ride right before last in a car, walks around and is talking about going to a beauty shop to have her hair washed and curled up."

"It is just one of the unfortunate things of life, but she took it with great courage."

Babe took periodic checkups following the Beaumont operation. All reports were good until after the disc operation.

Mail, flowers and telephone calls have poured into John Sealy since the Friday cancer announcement.

"She's heard from everybody everywhere, sports world, kids, old people, people we don't know," George said. "She's asked them to donate to the Cancer Fund but they donate and send flowers anyhow."

Auto Racers Looking For Leading Body

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind. (UP) — Known for dissension within its ranks, banded together today to organize a new governing group to take the place of the American Automobile Association's contest board.

Members of racing's many groups — from middle and sports cars to those running on the big car circuit, including the Indianapolis "500" — met in an unprecedented session Wednesday to "breathe life" into a sport assailed roundly for a number of disastrous accidents in recent months.

They formed a seven-man temporary committee, headed by Speedway Magazine George Ober, in the first step to form the new group, only a week after the AAA announced it is dropping racing at the end of the season.

Each faction of the racing fraternity elected a representative to sit on the committee. Others named were veteran driver Duane Carter, Indianapolis; mechanic Herb Porter, Indianapolis; promoter Tom Marchese, Milwaukee; car owner Bob Estes, Englewood, Calif.; Anton Hulman Jr., president and owner of the Indianapolis Speedway Corp., and Col. Arthur W. Herrington of the AAA contest board.

Thus, for the first time, American auto racing broke down the barriers to admit members of what the AAA refers to as "outlaw tracks" into one organization.

Ober said the committee's primary functions would be to raise funds, draw up a set of by-laws, examine methods of clarifying and simplifying rules and operating procedures, examine methods of improving track safety and scheduling of races.

Wenatchee and Eugene sprayed baseballs all over the ballpark Wednesday night in a Northwest League slugfest that cut Eugene's first-place margin back to a single game.

Wenatchee rapped 17 late blows in a 9-8 squeaker to take a 2-1 edge in the series in the Chiefs' home park. Eugene tagged veteran Bob Roberts for 12 hits.

Tri-City beat Yakima 9-1 and Salem whipped Spokane 9-3 in other games. The semi-pro Cheney Studs downed Lewiston 7-1 to sweep a two-game exhibition series at Tacoma.

Wenatchee pushed across four runs in the bottom of the ninth to upend Eugene. Herb Anderson singled down the third base line to drive in the winning run after the Chiefs had tied the game on four singles, a walk and a sacrifice fly.

At Kennewick, Tri-City tied the game with five runs in the first two innings. The big blow was Milt Martin's grand-slam homer in the second. The rallies were set up by Chuck Dillard who walked eight men in the slightly more than two innings he was on the mound. Yakima's lone score was on Herm Lewis' fifth inning homer.

Spokane tallied in the first inning and held Salem scoreless until the sixth when the Senators crashed through with three runs. The Solons added a singleton in the eighth and crushed the Indians with a six-run outburst in the ninth.

Cleveland Takes AL Lead

Al Lopez promised his Cleveland Indians would be back in first place and that's exactly where they were today all because of Ralph Kiner, who made a few special promises himself.

The 32-year-old Kiner, plagued by a bad back and reduced to part-time status, propelled the Indians into the American League lead by blasting a ninth-inning grand slam homer that beat the Tigers, 6-4, Wednesday night.

Kiner's homer was the 355th of his career and it moved the Indians two percentage points ahead of the White Sox, who slipped to second place by bowing to the Athletics, 5-4.

"It's high time I did something to help this club," Kiner said just before Wednesday night's game with Detroit. "My back feels a lot better tonight than it has in some time. If I get a chance to hit some pitcher might feel sorry."

Kiner received his chance in the seventh inning when he came in as a pinch hitter for Gene Woodling with the bases full but Al Aber struck him out. Kiner remained in the game and got another chance with the bases full in the ninth. Aber was still pitching and Kiner kept his promise by slamming the ball over the left field fence for his 14th and most important homer of the year.

The blow gave the ex-National League home run king two other distinctions. It gave him a total

of 1,001 runs batted in for his career and made him the leader among active players with 13 grand-slam homers.

Until Kiner came through with his game-clinching clout, the Tigers led 4-2 on Earl Torgeson's two-run homer in the seventh inning. Al Rosen and Hal Naragon also homered for the Indians.

Hector Lopez' sixth inning home run proved to be the deciding blow in Kansas City's victory over Chicago although the White Sox came within one run of tying the game in the eighth, a frame in which Bob Nieman homered. Minnie Minoso also homered off winner Alex Kellner with one on in the fifth. Harry Byrd was the loser.

Andy Carey's single in the 13th inning gave the Yankees a 3-2 decision over the Red Sox and Don Larsen his third straight triumph since returning from the minors 10 days ago. By winning, the Yanks climbed to within a half game of first place, four percentage points behind the White Sox and six behind the Indians.

Boston shortstop Billy Kaus set the stage for the winning run when he bobbled Yogi Berra's leadoff grounder in the 13th. After a sacrifice, an intentional walk and an infield pop-up, Carey smashed a drive over left fielder Ted Williams' head to bring home Berra with the tie-breaker. Big Frank Sullivan went all the way and gave up five hits, the same number as Larsen.

The Washington-Baltimore game

was postponed because of rain.

INCREASE

In the National League, the pace-setting Dodgers hopped on Ramon Montant for five runs on five hits in the first three innings to beat the Giants, 5-4, in a game called during the seventh inning because of rain. The victory pushed the defending world champions 18 games off the pace, in third place.

Cincinnati climbed to within 1 1/2 games of fifth place by beating Chicago twice, 7-2 and 6-3 with rookie Don Gross getting credit for the opening game victory and Art Fowler the nightcap. Ted Kluszewski slammed his 37th homer off loser Warren Hacker in the second game while Ernie Banks hit his 38th.

The Cardinals snapped a four-game losing streak by beating the Braves, 7-2, with the aid of three hits by Stan Musial, including his 1,000th extra base blow. Tom Poholsky hurled a six-hitter for his sixth victory.

Jerry Lynch's 10th inning single gave the Pirates a 3-2 triumph over the Phillies as Bob Friend registered his ninth victory of the year and ended a four-game Phillies' winning streak. Frank Thomas homered for Pittsburgh.
