State Playoffs Open Here Tonight

State tournament time is here for 11 of Oregon's top women's softball teams.

The annual Oregon Women's Softball Tournament opens here tonight at Conger Field with the first three of 30 scheduled games, and the defending champions, the Klamath Basin-ettes have their backs against the wall set for a strong defense of their 1954 state crown.

Six of the 11 entries take to the Conger Field diamonds in the first three games of the four day tournament, and all pre-tournament forecasts point for one of the finest such playoffs held to date.

The 1953 state champions, Lake Oswego, opens this year's tournament when they meet Forest Grove in the tournament opener at 6:45. Two other games will follow at 8:30 as Merrill meets Eugene and Salem tests the strong Rogue River QTs.

Mayor Paul Landry will be on hand and the official welcome of the city will be made to all the state tournament entries. His Honor will also open the first game of the tournament by tossing the first pitch.

Besides the Mayor of Klamath Falls, several other city officials are expected to be on hand as well as some of the state softball leaders.

ATTRACTION

This is the first year that the women's softball playoffs have been held outside of Portland, which could be a pioneer move for other upstate cities seeking

large sports attractions for their citizens.

Tomorrow, Friday, the tournament will move into its biggest day of action as 11 games have been scheduled. Starting with three games at 1 o'clock and closing with a pair of diamond battles starting at 8:30. The Conger Field games will be played at 1:24-5:57-8:30. Two games at Recreation Field will be played in the afternoon at 1 o'clock and 2:45.

Saturday four games are on tap with two of them slated for Gem Stadium, the first action of this nature since the Klamath Falls Gems and the Far West League left the local sports scene several years ago. In the afternoon Conger will be the site of two games starting at 2 o'clock and that night at 7 o'clock and 8:30 Gem Stadium will serve as the tournament location.

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Sunday, which will be the "big day" for two of the 11 teams entered, a 1955 champion will be crowned. One afternoon game is scheduled for 2 o'clock and Sunday evening the championship tilt starts at 7 o'clock. In case another game is needed to decide the state champion it will be played

at 8:30, also under the lights at Gem Stadium.

Other first round action besides the three games tonight finds Roseburg meeting the winner of the Forest Grove-Lake Oswego tilt. Oakridge-Westfir faces the winner of the Merrill-Eugene fray. Albany takes on a challenge from the Salem-Rogue River winner and Klamath makes its tournament debut as it faces the Oreno Valley champs, the Gales Creek Diamond Darlings.

FAVORITE

The pre-tournament favorite's spot has been given to the powerful Lake Oswego Mermaids, who claim several all-sisters and one former All-American softballer. The Mermaids are very strong in the pitching department with all-sisters Jackie Rice and Catherine Connard plus the twirling tactics of All-American outfielder-pitcher Tehlma Parrish Carlson, ex-Lind Florist starlet.

The Basin-ettes, even though they are on their home ground, will probably find a rough and steep road as they seek to make a successful defense of their crown, won last year in Portland.

It is possible for the Klamath entry to repeat, but the climb will be a long one. So far this year the Basin-ettes have been able to collect two wins, way off the pace of champions they were billed as. Not until recently has the locals looked as a solid team, but many say the team has just begun to jell and could completely reverse their trend for the 1955 playoffs.

The first game for the defending champs will be a 2:45 Friday afternoon at Conger against Gales Creek. If they win their first out-of-town game the Klamath will meet the winner of the Albany vs. Salem-Rogue River game at 8:30 Friday evening at Conger Field.

Tickets for the tournament are \$2 for the season pass, good for all games played, 50 cents for adults for single game tickets and 25 cents for single game ducaats for students.

Seals Pound Seattle Underhand Pitcher

Seattle manager Fred Hutchinson tried Bob Seals, softball pitching ace, against eighth-place San Francisco in both ends of a Pacific Coast League doubleheader Wednesday night and the guinea pig Seals won both games, 5-3 and 13-5.

Seals, who has scored some 55 softball shutouts with his whirling windmill delivery, quickly learned that things were different in regulation ball.

The Seals rolled five runs across in the opening game's first inning on two hits, five walks, two wild pitches and a balk. John Oldham, throwing in orthodox style, shut out the Seals the rest of the way.

Hutchinson again tried the Seals' experiment in the final two innings of the second game, when Seattle was trailing 9-5. Seals again had control trouble, walking four, throwing two wild pitches and hitting one batter.

Wayne Belardi drove one of Fesler's pitches for a two-run homer in the second game. In three innings in both games Fesler yielded nine runs.

While the first-place Rainiers lost two games in pitching experimentation, the Hollywood Stars scored a business-like 10-3 victory over Portland and closed to two games back of Seattle.

Lee Walls hit a pair of two-run homers and Bob Garber scattered nine Beaver hits. The win was Hollywood's third against one loss in the series.

At Oakland, Cal McElah pitched a seven-inning one-hitter as San Diego won the first game, 3-0. Oakland's Fred Besana countered with a two-hit shutout of the Padres in the second game, which the Acorns won, 9-0.

Piper Davis' two-run homer in the 11th gave Los Angeles a 4-2 first game win over Sacramento but Johnny Briggs pitched the Solons to a 7-2 second game victory.
