Help Needed To Battle Polio Cases

BOSTON (UP)—Massachusetts appealed for 43 nurses today to care for the mounting number of victims of a polio epidemic that has stricken 1,980 persons.

The number of victims jumped over the epidemic mark of 1,000 Wednesday as 134 cases were reported. At this time last year there were only 98 cases.

As the appeal for additional nurses went out, hospital administrators prepared for the worst from Hurricane Connie. Emergency generators were borrowed to keep iron lungs operating in the event of hurricane-caused power failures.

Ten iron lungs lent by the Navy Wednesday boosted the total respirators in use in Boston to 52. "We have reached the bottom of the barrel as far as nurses are concerned," said Dr. Roy F. Feemster, Massachusetts director of communicable diseases.

"The nurses now handling polio patients are tired and need relief," he said. "There is no question but we will need nurses shortly from the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis."

The community nursing committee met Wednesday and determined that 43 nurses would be the minimum number needed in four Boston hospitals. These hospitals are caring for many patients from outside the city.

The state Nurses Association sent 4,000 letters to trained nurses asking their help.

In Washington, Rep. Thomas J. Lane (D-Mass.) asked the Army surgeon general for military nurses and Medical Corps personnel to help fight the epidemic.

Dr. Joseph P. Reardon of the state Health Department said it was a "mild epidemic."

Thief Gives Himself Up

SAN FRANCISCO (UP)—A conscience-stricken robber turned himself in to Hayward police yesterday, saying he wanted to get "straightened out."

He was George C. Fraleigh, 40, a transient cook, who confessed to three recent holdups.

Fraleigh said he had a Vallejo Western Union office of \$320 on July 1. Two weeks later, he said, he robbed a Sacramento Western Union office of \$225, and last Saturday night he held up a San Francisco Western Union office and took \$40. He said he spent all the money on liquor.

He handed over his holdup weapon, a toy pistol.

Fraleigh said he turned himself in once before 20 years ago, when he was in the "same kind of trouble" in Massachusetts. He said he served five years in a reformatory.

Hayward police turned him over to San Francisco police, who booked him in City Prison on a robbery charge.

Russians Deny Submarine Activity

STOCKHOLM, Sweden—Russia says no Soviet submarines have been operating in Sweden's territorial waters or in the Baltic.

Swedish authorities have reported sightings of unidentified foreign submarines off the Swedish coast five times during the past four weeks. The local press hinted the subs were Russian.

The Soviet denial was contained in a note made public yesterday by the Swedish Foreign Ministry.

ABSENT

MOSCOW (AP)—Western observers have noted the continued absence from public gatherings of Nikolai Shvernik, former President of the Soviet Union. Recurring reports say that he is ill.

Shvernik is now chairman of the Central Council of Trade Unions of the U.S.S.R. When the body opened its third plenary meeting here recently, Vice Chairman L. N. Solovjev presided.

The decision was handed in by jury members at the coroner's inquest held this week. The decision stated the child died as a result of the fire and not as a result of negligence of the mother.

Mrs. Job had left her three children, Deborah, 18 months; Kathy, 3 months; and Kenneth, 1, locked in the house with no adult while she did some errands in town. The small boy told firemen he and a neighbor boy, who climbed in the bedroom window, started a fire in the bedroom.

Dog Used As Carrier In Bay Area Dope Ring

SAN FRANCISCO (UP)—State narcotics agents and police arrested eight men yesterday in breaking up a ring that used a dog to collect money from addicts and to deliver heroin to them on the street.

The dog, a Doberman-Pinscher named Butch, was taken to the shelter maintained by the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals.

His master, Quincy Cannon, 45, was booked on a charge of maintaining a place to sell narcotics and for conspiracy. He is already under a June indictment for seven counts of violation of the narcotics law.

The arrests came after police had watched Cannon's apartment for several days.

Narcotics Inspector Louis Noel said Cannon sold heroin at his apartment but to keep the traffic from becoming noticeably heavy, he trained Butch to do some of the work.

Noel said when a trusted customer would show up at the corner near Cannon's apartment, Butch would walk up to him and open his mouth. The customer would place a five or 10 dollar bill in it.

Butch would then trot off to Cannon's apartment, climbing three flights of stairs. Butch would scratch at the back door. A cellophane-wrapped packet of heroin would be placed in Butch's mouth. Then the dog would climb down the stairs and return to his customer, who would remove the packet from Butch's mouth.

Arrested with Cannon were his roommate, Frank Winborn, 45, who was booked on the same charges; Fred D. Webber, 25-year-old dishwasher, who was accused of possession; and five other men, who were charged with addiction.
