Siskiyou Area Fires Quelled

YREKA - All of the 16 fires that were started in Siskiyou County by a thunder storm Sunday night were reported under control Tuesday.

Larry Kirton, State Division of Forestry fire dispatcher here, said that mop up operations were being carried on Tuesday on three fires, and Lee Morford, U. S. Forest Service fire dispatcher for the Klamath National Forest, said that there were no fires burning on land under federal jurisdiction.

One of the largest fires fought Monday night was at Yreka mountain, southwest of Yreka. The fire started on state land, but a Klamath National Forest crew from Forks of Salmon aided in fighting the blaze.

Kirton said about two acres were burned over before the fire was checked. The fire was reported by a traffic officer of the California Highway Patrol. It was located near the summit about two miles from the Yreka-Port Jones state highway.

Mopping up operations were also being conducted on a fire in Scott Valley, and another in Timber Gulch near the Cherry Creek road, an extension of the Greenhorn road near Yreka.

Tea of the 16 fires were in state land, and the others were in the national forest area. All of the fires except the Yreka Mountain fire were confined to less than one acre. Damage was reported as minor.

Fires in the Klamath National Forest included four in the Yreka district, one on Willow Creek near Callahan and one near Goodnest on the old Mt. Hebron road. This fire, although in the Shasta National Forest, is under the fire control jurisdiction of the Klamath National Forest.

Kirton said that if it was not for the near-cloudburst precipitation which accompanied the storm, there would have been many more fires. Official national forest fire danger rating at the beginning of the storm Sunday was "extremely high."

In early dealings everything dropped and in some cases, notably corn and soybeans, losses were quite extensive. This reflected the Agriculture Department's estimate Wednesday of bumper crops.
