

Sports Interests Build Healthy Bodies

Among the very best gifts you can buy for the back-to-school group are health-building items of sports equipment. Youngsters of high school and college, or even grammar school, age will tell you they're really the "most."

And besides giving them pleasure, you may give the youngsters a start on the road to a better character, as well as more popularity.

In a broad sense, an active interest in sports is the finest bulwark there is against juvenile delinquency. Leading psychologists say that the excess energy spent on athletics can easily spell the difference in many borderline cases. The overall battle may be won with a basketball, football or track shoe, as much as it is by a book.

Basketball, a game witnessed yearly by 100,000,000 Americans, is more widely played than any team sport. There is scarcely a town or hamlet, however small, which does not have a basketball court. A gift to a school-age boy of a rubber or leather basketball is certain to be appreciated.

Another fine idea is an outdoor practice hoop, to be placed in your own back yard on a tree or perhaps the garage. The children—and adults as well—will soon be using it all year 'round.

The biggest sport of the moment, however, when the school year is just beginning, is rough-and-tumble football. If Junior plays at school, the proper equipment will not be a problem. But for youngsters confined to the sandlot game, it is usually badly lacking—and the gift of a helmet or shoulder pads will help to protect them from injury.

For youths who will be on an out-of-town campus and who like to throw a football around or only have time for the "touch" type of game, there are balls designed for exactly this purpose. The Touch-down Club by Spalding, for instance, is an inexpensive version of nearly half a size smaller than regular balls.

The other popular sports at school—baseball, softball, soccer, track, tennis and sometimes golf—offer a wide choice of gifts which will fit almost any child.

Speakers, of course, are essential for many sports played indoors, as well as the daily gymnasium period.

In many cases, like tennis and golf, there is scaled-down, lighter equipment which is more suited to Junior's abilities. Advice on proper sizes can come from your sporting goods dealer.

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Qualities That Make Them Washable Are Important in Clothes

"Washing out a few things" is more like washing out a few tons of things when there are school kids in the house.

Most mothers feel as though they spent the major portion of their time with anxious ear pressed to the automatic washer's palpitating heart. School children seem to gather dirt even when enclosed in a dustless room for 10 minutes.

Few women who depend upon their washers, and in many cases, dryers, stop to think how much easier it is to maintain a child in reasonable cleanliness with washable clothes than it would be if nothing they wore could be washed and worn immediately.

First, it would mean a larger investment in clothes. According to a Westinghouse survey, women who owned washers and dryers spent about half as much for quickly outgrown children's wear than did those without dryers.

Second, it would be more expensive to have the clothes dry-cleaned than to wash them out.

Third, there would be no rubbing out a spot with soap and water and dispatching the child off again.

Wise mothers, when shopping for washables, look for the following:

Fast color, pre-shrunk or shrink-resistant fabric.

Well-finished, generous seams, deep hems.

A belt with washable backing and buckle.

Washable buttons and trimmings.

Little white touches that snap on and off.

Washable or removable shoulder pads.

More and more fabrics are showing up washable, and many of them no-iron. The Amurion Corporation annually whips up rayon, nylon, orlon, dacron and acrilan in yardages that stagger the mind, all of it no-iron.

Winter clothes are moving into the washable class with ease.

Among these are all wool or wool and nylon flannels that have been sanforian treated.

Starching has been eased with the advent of plastic starches like Perma that last through eight to 15 washings.

These also may add years to the wear of the material by keeping dirt and stain out of the goods.

Washing wool knits still falls into the hand category. To prevent shrinkage, an outline should be made first. This can be kept on file for future use. Surface interest can be kept up by damping down with a sponge while drying.
