The diners fled out in orderly fashion. Firemen said the blaze started in a kitchen broiler and ate through the roof.

Korea Celebrates Liberty; Anti-Communist Riots Quiet

SEOUL (AP)—Demands for Communist truce inspectors to get out of Korea continued today but demonstrations quieted as Koreans celebrated the 10th anniversary of their liberation from Japan. President Syngman Rhee yesterday opened the celebrations with a speech attacking American policy in Asia and restating his determination to remove the Neutral Nations Supervisory Commission from Korea. Koreans claim the Communist Czech and Polish members of the NNSC's truce inspection teams are spies. Addressing 10,000 people in Seoul Stadium yesterday, Rhee said President Eisenhower had enunciated a new U.S. policy at Geneva—one advocating a new "peace of mutual forbearance." Rhee urged the free world to abandon any drift toward this or any other "status quo" policy and instead "roll back the Iron Curtain from areas it has illegally engulfed." He sat down. "Communist Czech and Polish Spies leave Korea." Gen. Lyman L. Lemnitzer, U.N. Far East commander, returned to Tokyo after telling Rhee the United States was obligated under the armistice to protect the truce commission. The demonstrations slacked off after Rhee announced Saturday he had postponed indefinitely his ultimatum for the truce inspectors to get out of the country. He said then that he had assurances from the United States that it "will make efforts soon" to obtain peaceful removal of the truce inspection teams. Peiping radio snapped up this as proof there was "American backing of his (Rhee's) provocations against the commission."

Crosby's Son Hurt In Crash

RAYMOND, Wash. (AP)—One of crooner Bing Crosby's sons, Pvt. Phillip L. Crosby, 21, is in a Raymond hospital today with a broken back. The young soldier from Ft. Lewis drove through a guardrail down a 23-foot embankment into the Willapa River bed while trying to get back to his Army KP duties early yesterday. Fortunately, the tide in Willapa harbor, into which the river flows, was out. Otherwise, authorities said young Crosby would have drowned. His father left a Spokane golf tournament to fly to Raymond. Bing would allow no hospital pictures taken of his son. Acting Police Chief Russell Starns gave this account: Phillip had been in Aberdeen, north of here, and took the wrong road to return to Ft. Lewis, where he was due for KP duty at 5:30 a.m. yesterday. He wound up in Raymond, some 30 miles to the south. Phillip asked a pedestrian how to get to the fort. The man told him he'd have to go back to Aberdeen to get on the proper road to Ft. Lewis. So Phillip started back. Three miles later his car ripped five guard posts out of a guardrail before tumbling into the river bed. At the New Riverview Hospital, it was said Phillip had three fractured vertebrae and minor lacerations. One of the spinal fractures was in the neck. The other two were lower, down in the back. He will be hospitalized several weeks. As soon as possible, he will be taken to Madigan Army Hospital, at Ft. Lewis. Bing Crosby, meanwhile, was staying with Dr. R. A. Bissabarger at the doctor's home.
