Men Accused By Witness

SINGAPORE (AP)—A deaf and dumb witness identified two Singapore men Tuesday as members of a mob which killed an American newspaperman last May 12. Ordered to stand trial were Ong Ah Too, a truck driver, and Suppiah Subramaniam, unemployed. They were charged with being members of an unlawful assembly that resulted in the slaying of Gene Symonds, 29, southeast Asia manager for the United Press, and three other persons. The mob was demonstrating in support of a bus strike. Symonds went to the scene to cover it and was beaten and kicked to death. The mute witness, Lim Yen Lin, testified at a preliminary hearing

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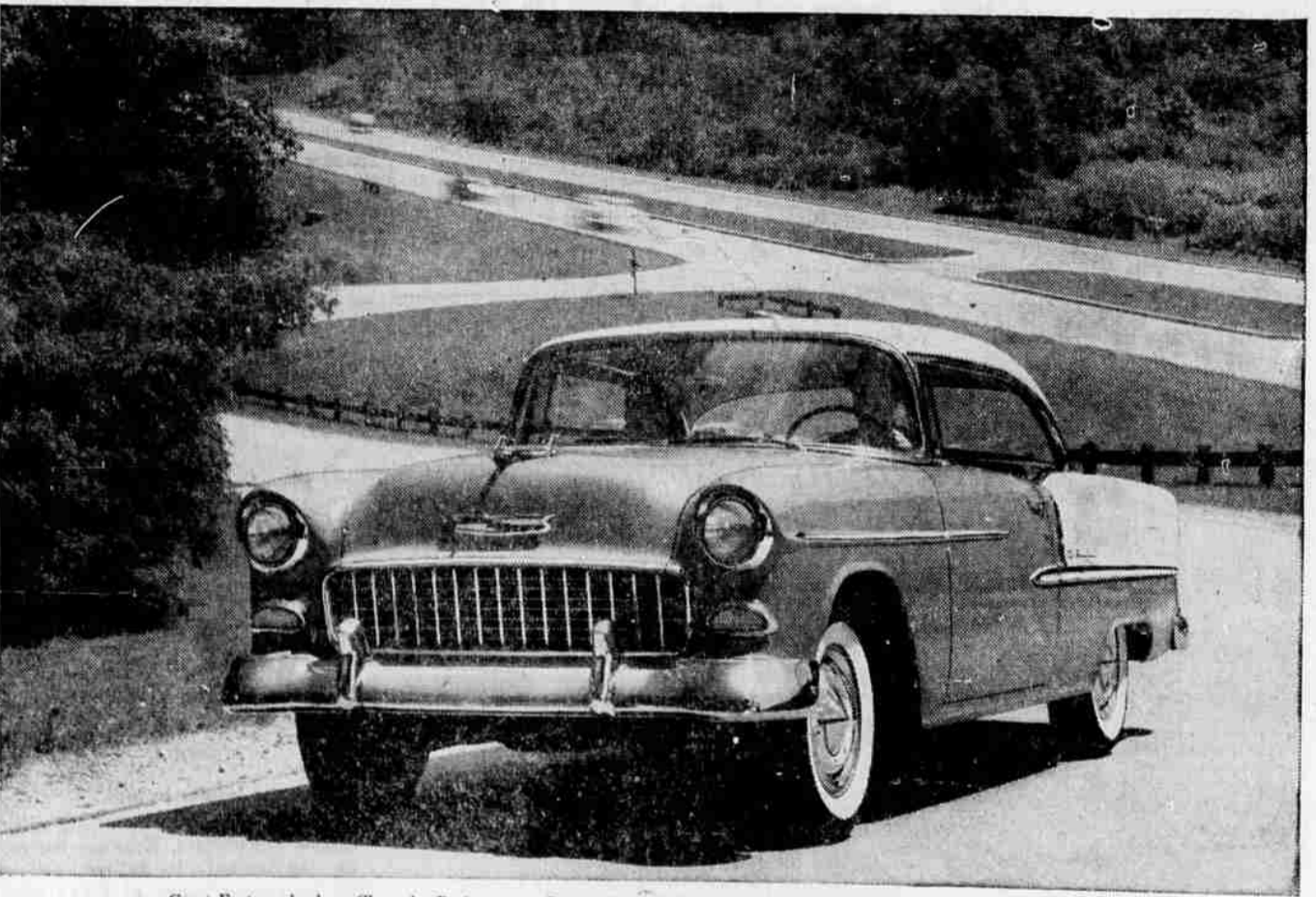
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Liquor Charge Sentence Given
