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Runaway Blimp Landed In Field

LAKEHURST, N.J. (AP)—A damaged, runaway Navy blimp was set down in a cornfield by three crew members last night after drifting helplessly for 15 miles.

None of the three civilian crewmen aboard the 350-foot airship was hurt. The craft had broken away from ground crews after an initial landing at the Lakehurst Naval Air Station in which her landing gear and both propellers were smashed. Five crewmen jumped to the ground. The pilot, copilot and a mechanic stayed aboard to dump the ship's gasoline and water supply.

The Navy said this made the blimp too light to remain afloat. Off it went, and floated helplessly for 93 minutes. It was finally brought down by releasing helium gas.
