

New Chryslers To Be Shown

NEW YORK — Chrysler, which has been emphasizing "the forward look" in promoting its 1955 models, has three new "idea" cars that appear to have the look of 1960 or later.

The cars, developed to test public reaction to new concepts in styling and design, go on public display Wednesday at the Chrysler salon. Tuesday they were set up for a preview by newsmen and invited guests.

The public showing will run through Aug. 26.

Chrysler emphasized the three "idea" models are not to be manufactured. At the same time, however, and stylists said some of their features may be used in future production models.

The cars are called Flight Sweep I and Flight Sweep II, and the Falcon. The first two, identical excepting one is a convertible and the other a hardtop, are four-passenger sports models. The Falcon is a low-slung two-passenger roadster.

All three are snappy appearing models. They have windshields that slope at an angle of 36 degrees. They have upward rear fenders that, with taillights, form into a trailing fin motif. They have full wheel openings and forward sloping hoods.

The Flight Sweeps have curved side window glass and an electrical console between the seats for heater controls, turn signal controls, transmission selector and radio. Bucket type front seats, separately adjustable, and bench rear seat with rear seat center armrest also are features of the Flight Sweep models.

The Falcon has concave inner door panels, forward sloping front fenders, fender louvers and externally mounted dual exhaust system.

All three cars are powered with modifications of the Chrysler stock engines. All present extremely low silhouettes. The Flight Sweeps are only 23 1/2 inches high with an over-all length of 207 inches. The Falcon is 51 1/2 inches high with an over-all length of 182 inches.

Killer Snake To Be Used By Cult

PINEVILLE, Ky. — As a testimonial to their faith, members of a snake-handling cult will hold services Sunday with a rattlesnake that fatally bit one of their mountain preachers.

Preacher Oscar Sutton said the killer snake will be handled by a Pentecostal Church congregation at a "big" meeting just across the Kentucky line in Virginia. The announcement came Tuesday at the funeral near here for

Lee Valentine, who died 10 hours after being bitten by the rattler during services Saturday in Ft. Payne, Ala.

Snake handling violates Kentucky and Alabama law. Alabama authorities are investigating the death of Valentine, 52, of Pineville.

An overflow crowd turned out for the last rites on Straight Creek, the community Valentine served for many years. There were eulogies, singing, guitar picking and snake handling.

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Young Brothers Found Suffocated

PHILADELPHIA — Two young brothers playing in an abandoned refrigerator were trapped and suffocated last night.

The bodies of Lee Andrews, 2, and his brother Lewis, 3, were discovered by their mother when she opened the refrigerator in a vacant first-floor apartment of their north Philadelphia tenement.

The mother, Mrs. Veronica Andrews, 21, had just returned from a police station where she reported the boys missing.

She pulled the boys, clad only in shorts, from the tiny cubicle and summoned aid. A doctor reported he detected signs of life in the younger boy, but despite emergency efforts, both were pronounced dead in Hahnemann Hospital.
