Miss Siskiyou To Be Named

YREKA — Judges will name Miss Siskiyou, queen of the Siskiyou County Fair and the county's candidate in the Maid of California contest, at a dinner meeting Wednesday night at the Yreka Inn. The fair will be held Friday, Saturday and Sunday at the fairgrounds just south of Yreka. Four communities have named queen candidates. They are Weed, Mount Shasta, Dunsmuir and Yreka. There will be one judge from each of the cities, and the judges will not be permitted to vote for the girl from their own community. The winner will be crowned at the county fair, and on August 27 will leave for Sacramento to participate in the Maid of California judging. Miss Siskiyou will take a jug of water obtained from the Marble Mountains Primitive Area with her to the state fair to participate in the Marriage of California Waters Pageant, when the Maid of California candidate from each county will pour a sample of water from that county into a common urn. Winner of the Maid of California contest will receive a \$1,000 U.S. savings bond, and the 10 runners up will receive a \$100 bond each. Entrants in the Miss Siskiyou contest are Joan Irvine, Dunsmuir; Terry Huntington, Mount Shasta; Sandra Hughes, Weed, and Judie Swenson, Yreka.

Yreka Council Studies Budget

YREKA — The Yreka City Council last week began work on a preliminary budget for the city for next year, but decided to put off the tedious job until a special meeting Wednesday. Adoption of a final budget must come before the end of the month, as state law requires that cities set their tax rates prior to September 1. The city last year budgeted \$220,563 and spent \$230,323. Councilman James Cummings said that the current water shortage, and expenses pertaining to a shortrun solution of the problem, such as wells currently being dug south of the city, should be considered in the budget. Also, costs of installing streets and other city services in new subdivisions should be considered, he said.

Early Klamath Work Recalled

A former, short-time resident of Klamath Falls, L. R. Bowen, was a visitor here August 15. Bowen, whose residence is in Denver but in the original gas mains in 1929 for the Standard Oil Company. The construction work was near the viaduct and Bowen, construction engineer for the Thebo-Starr-Anderson firm of engineers recalled that the foundations for the installation were floated because of the high water level. He is currently superintendent of construction for the North Atlantic Construction Company which is installing a U. S. Air Force Base at Sondrestromfjord, Greenland, one of the three U. S. air bases on the island. He has also been located at Thule in Greenland, 600 miles north of his present location. Near the U. S. base location, is a Danish settlement. The Scandinavian Airlines between Los Angeles and Copenhagen service the island. Practically all domestic supplies as well as passenger and mail are flown in. A new hotel has just been opened by Danish proprietors which is partially staffed by young women, first at the base with the exception of those in the small Danish settlement. Climate of Greenland is similar to that of the northern United States except for almost continuous high winds, Bowen stated. He was seeking old acquaintances during his stop in Klamath Falls.
