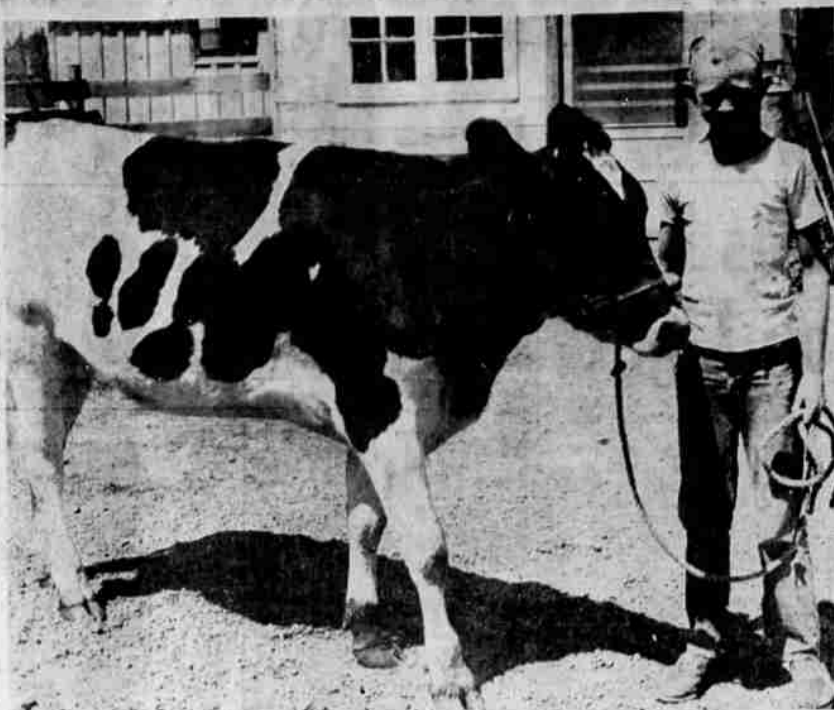

## Oregon's Banks Are Largest Lenders To State Farmers

Oregon farmers and ranchers met their credit needs during 1954 chiefly by loans from their local banks, according to R. H. Tisdale, vice president and manager of the First National Bank, who represents the Oregon Bankers Association for Klamath County.

Oregon banks remained the largest lenders to the state's farmers and stockmen during the year, providing far more financial aid to our agriculture than any other lending agency, he noted.

Quoting from the fourteenth annual farm lending survey of the Agricultural Commission of the American Bankers Association, Tisdale stated that on January 1, 1955, Oregon banks had loans outstanding to farmers and ranchers totaling \$45,929,000 including both production and mortgage loans.

## Child Custody Battle Rages

HILLSBORO (AP)—The Washington County Welfare Commission Tuesday placed 9-month-old David Casteel in the temporary custody of his foster parents.

They are Mr. and Mrs. Wesley Remington of Aloha who took the child for adoption soon after his birth. The real parents, Mr. and Mrs. Arnold Casieel, now are attempting to regain custody of the child.

Last week the Remingtons forcibly removed the child from the Casteel home where he had been taken under a court order.

Tuesday's hearing on the case was without incident. Before the hearing opened, however, Mrs. Casteel's mother, Mrs. Edith Riben, rushed up to Remington's home and beat him with her fists. She shouted that she intended to see justice done.

The Remingtons' adoption petition is to be heard Aug. 24 by County Judge Harry Seabold.

SALEM (AP)—All roads in Crater Lake National Park now are open, the Oregon Highway Commission said Tuesday.

The last section to be opened was part of the rim road, which now is clear of snow all the way around the lake.

## Corvallis Man Killed By Auto

ROSEBURG (AP)—An automobile struck Merritt A. Dilley, 66, of Corvallis, as he was walking down a highway Tuesday, killing him outright.

Coroner L. L. Powers identified the driver of the car as Donald M. Cook of Portland.

Powers said the Dilley car had become overheated while traveling on Highway 99 about 25 miles north of here. Dilley went to a nearby farmhouse for water and was returning with it when struck by the car.

Dilley was partially deaf and unable to hear Cook's warning blast on his horn, his daughter Roxie reported. Also in the Dilley car were his wife, Ethel, and another daughter, Cleo.

## Lumber Machine Kills Worker

SWEET HOME (AP)—T. Harold Hermans, 48, of Sweet Home was killed Tuesday in an industrial accident in the Santiam Lumber Co. plant here.

He was cleaning bark out of a steam-powered loading arm, a machine which lifts logs onto a conveyor belt, when he accidentally tripped the control mechanism. The fast-moving arm struck him on the side of the head, killing him outright.

The body fell 15 feet onto the pell and was carried some distance before other workers were able to stop the machine.

Survivors include the widow, Thelma, and two young children.
