

Pacific Stock Show Planned

The Pacific International Livestock Exposition will hold its 45th annual showing October 15-22 at its North Portland plant. Manager Walter Holt announced this week.

As last year, the P-I again will be a straight livestock show, although it will have a companion feature in the Lewis and Clark Sesquicentennial Exposition of Progress in the main exhibit hall. This feature, sponsored by the Downtown Portland Optimists Club, will carry out the Lewis and Clark theme in commercial and industrial exhibits and entertainment attractions.

Premium books were mailed last week for the livestock show, which again this year will include com-

plete showing of beef and dairy cattle, sheep, swine, Angora goats and dairy goats. Premium books are free upon request.

A total of \$45,000 in premium money and the prestige of showing at the P-I with its long-established reputation for top-flight competition again is attracting entries from the country's best-known herds. Holt said. Among those requesting entry blanks are the Harmony Jerseys Farms, Clair Smith, manager, Greenwich, Connecticut. They will show better than 30 head of Jerseys. Closing date for entries is October 1.

National breed association special recognition again will add to the prestige of two shows — the Register of Merit Hereford Show and the Regional Holstein show.

Chamber Honors Basin Pioneers

Two of Klamath County's venerable pioneers Wednesday were accorded life-time honorary memberships in the Klamath County Chamber of Commerce.

At the weekly meeting of the chamber's board, Dr. George Wright and Bert Hall were unanimously voted the honor.

Both of the civic leaders aided in developing the county from its virtual inception.

The doctor and the board director of the California Oregon Power Company have served as committee chairmen, and officers in the chamber many times in the last several years.

Deb Addison, president of the chamber, presided at the Wednesday meet.

Copco Water Plan Backed

Copco's plans for Klamath Basin's power development and water storage was given unanimous approval by the county's chamber of commerce board of directors at their weekly meeting Wednesday.

The power company's plans call for storage of the overflow of Upper Klamath Lake in Aspen and Round lakes, and for domestic, agricultural and municipal needs to be given priority over Copco's use of the water.

The proposed project would provide for storage of 580,000 acre-feet of water and would provide a power development of 315,000 kilowatts of power.

If the plans are approved by the various federal and California and Oregon regulatory authorities, the consummation of a 50-year contract

will start the construction of the necessary dams and canals of the proposed project.

The overflow water during the run-off seasons of Upper Klamath Lake is now lost.

Various other agencies, government and private, have submitted plans for the overflow storage, but the one submitted by the California Oregon Power Company met with the most favor from the chamber's board.

The Wednesday meeting was held at the Winema Hotel.

New Farm Bureau Plan Rejected
