Savings Bonds Record Told

Oregon continues to have the highest percentage of increases in savings bonds sales in the nation, according to word received by Ted Gamble, chairman of the Oregon Savings Bonds Committee...

Total Oregon sales of E and H Bonds for the first half of this year were 40 per cent more than for the same period a year ago. Gamble said, "Florida was the second highest state with an increase of 32 per cent. National sales at the end of June were 14 per cent ahead of June a year ago."

Oregonians purchased another near-record volume of E and H Bonds in July, Gamble reported, with sales amounting to \$3,897,509. This represents a 5.8 per cent increase over July of 1954, which was by far the best month of that entire year. If bond sales were over the million dollar mark for the fourth time this year.

According to County Chairman Myron E. Shannon, sales in this county in July totaled \$38,338, compared to \$47,613 in July 1954.

Yreka City Council Studies Critical Water Situation

YREKA - The Yreka city water committee this week heard several reports concerning the critical water situation and problems attendant upon its alleviation.

A financial report shows that the city has approximately \$340,000 in remaining bonding capacity in case the voters pass the appropriate bonds.

State Senator Randolph Collier, who was recently named chairman of the water committee, requested C. M. Potter, superintendent of streets and water, to provide the committee with a list of water customers outside the city limits. If these were to be brought into the city, it would raise the total assessed valuation for tax purposes of the city, Senator Collier commented.

At the meeting, Potter described the city water system to the group and said he did not feel that any changes in the internal piping system were necessary. He recommended that a dam be built for storage purposes on Greenhorn Creek, just south of Yreka. This dam, he said, would in normal years be filled with run-off water from Greenhorn Creek and in dry years could be supplemented by water pumped from Yreka Creek which carries more water.
