Persons Over 70 Okayed For Jobs

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Civil Service Commission today announced a change in its regulations to permit persons over 70 to take regular federal jobs. Under the old regulations such persons could receive only temporary renewable appointments up to one year. The commission said the change was made to conform to congressional action lifting maximum age restrictions on federal appointments for this fiscal year, which ends June 30, 1956. A commission spokesman said the change does not affect the requirement for mandatory retirement at age 70 of any federal employee who has served at least 15 years, unless he is continued in service by a civil service or presidential order.

Schmidt Plans Divorce Filing

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP)—Airman Daniel Schmidt's lawyer says Schmidt will file "not later than Monday" for a divorce from the wife who married again while he was a prisoner of the Communist Chinese. Atty. Howard P. Welch said he plans to start divorce proceedings for Schmidt "perhaps this weekend... Not later than Monday." Daniel, 23, was one of 11 American fliers released recently by the Communists. He returned home last week to learn his 20-year-old wife Una had married logging worker Clifford Fine, in the belief, she said, that Schmidt had died in Korea. Welch said the petition for divorce will include a request that the court give Schmidt the custody of 2½-year-old Danny Jr., the son that was born while he was in a Communist prison. At the same time, Welch confirmed Daniel's plans to drive to Portland this weekend to see his mother Mrs. Nellie Peters. Mrs. Peters told reporters she had received a telephone call from her son telling her to expect him in Portland Sunday. She said Schmidt told her over the phone he didn't intend to go back to Una. "We are through. I don't even want to see her again," she said. Mrs. Peters had said only Wednesday she was sure Danny and Una would patch it up again. Clifford Fine, the third party to the triangle, has left Una for a job in another town, said her attorney.

Thrombosis Hits Clement Atlee

LONDON (AP)—Former Prime Minister Clement Atlee is convalescing from a cerebral thrombosis he suffered after returning from a vacation trip to Yugoslavia 10 days ago. Atlee's wife said last night the veteran 72-year-old Labor Party chief is recovering from the brain clot, but that he is also suffering from a skin ailment. "He is not keeping any engagements," she said. "We shall be going away next week for a holiday in Fombroshire." Atlee, who served as Britain's first postwar Prime Minister, is resting at his home in Great Missenden, Buckinghamshire.

President Invites Newsmen To Visit Mountain Retreat

FRASER, Colo. (AP)—President Eisenhower lowers the privacy bars a bit at his Rocky Mountain vacation ranch here today to provide a look at a relaxed kind of presidential life. He invited newsmen, accompanying him from Washington and the Denver Summer White House, to visit the ranch for a glimpse of how he and his 7-year-old grand-

son David have been spending their time there. Up until today the press has been barred from the President's secluded retreat. The President has not left the ranch since he arrived Tuesday afternoon from Denver, and newsmen have had to depend almost entirely on White House Press Secretary James C. Hasty for reports. Those reports have been on a variety of activities—fishing, golf practice, pistol target shooting, work on an oil painting, cooking—and the official government business which always must be handled where a president is. Yesterday for the second day in a row Eisenhower was up early at 5 a.m. and prepared breakfast for David and the other members of his small party. The menu was orange juice, scrambled eggs and bacon, toast and coffee. After breakfast David clapped on a Davy Crockett conman cap and banged some golf balls around the cow pasture. While that went on, Eisenhower was at work in the living room of his cottage on an oil painting of a mountain view. David turned later from golf to softball, then to horseback riding, in the company of 12-year-old Jack Tkach, son of the assistant White

House physician, Maj. Walter Tkach. After spending more than two hours at his easel, the President donned waders, a khaki jacket and a Western-style hat and went off aboard a jeep for some trout fishing in St. Louis Creek, which winds through the ranch. With him was his host, old friend Aksel Nielsen, of Denver. The presidential luck was not anywhere near as good as it was Wednesday when he caught several trout, including a 13-inch two-pounder. Yesterday he landed only one, 80 did Nielsen. Before dinner last night Eisenhower got out a .22-caliber pistol and did a bit of target shooting. The President plans to drive back to Denver Sunday afternoon.

Oregon Leads Timber Cut

SALEM (AP)—Oregon led the nation last year in timber production, harvesting 3,860,735,000 board feet of logs. State Forester George Spaur, who announced the figures, said it was the second largest cut in the state history. It was exceeded only by the 9.8 billion board feet cut in 1952. For 17 straight years, Oregon has maintained the national leadership. Production in 1954 was 273 million feet more than in 1953. Douglas County led all Oregon counties last year by producing 1,598,258,000 board feet. Other counties in the top 10: Lane, 1,257,565,000; Jackson, 669,068,000; Coos, 603,699,000; Linn 519,117,000; Lincoln, 404,348,000; Curry, 395,254,000; Tillamook, 359,077,000; Clatskanie, 376,177,000; Josephine, 282,864,000. Grant County led the Eastern Oregon counties for the fifth consecutive year with 244,560,000 feet. Klamath County's production was 125,636,000 feet. The total pine harvest was 1,371,579,000 feet.
