Southern D.A. Levels Charge

BROOKHAVEN, Miss. (AP)—Dist. Atty. E. C. Barlow of Lincoln County leveled charges of neglect of duty at Sheriff Bob Case today and accused Mississippi Gov. Hugh White with failure to cooperate in clearing up election "fraud and corruption."

The charges grew out of an explosive countywide situation which was climaxed last Saturday when a 63-year-old Negro was shot to death on the courthouse lawn.

Barlow denounced Case for not doing his duty. He said the sheriff "has not turned up one witness to anything" in connection with the shooting of Lamar (Diney) Smith, 63-year-old dog trainer.

Three white men have been charged with murder in the shooting. Each was released on \$20,000 bond pending grand jury action next month. They were identified as Noah Smith, 59, Mick Smith, 45, and Charles Falvey, 39, all of near Brookhaven.

Barlow said Case "told me he saw Noah Smith leave the scene of the killing with blood all over him."

"It was his duty to take that man into custody regardless of who he was, but he did not do it."

Smith had reportedly helped other Negroes to cast absentee ballots in the state's gubernatorial race.

Barlow criticized Gov. White for refusing his request for highway patrol aid in investigating the killing.

"The governor said he would do nothing without being requested by the sheriff," Barlow said.

White said he had no authority to send the patrol into any county without the proper request.

Barlow called for a general housecleaning for what he termed fraud and corruption throughout the county.

YREKA — Funeral services were held at Fort Jones Tuesday for Elsie Mildred (Millie) Luttrell, 69, who died Sunday at the Siskiyou County General Hospital where she had been a patient since August 10. She had been in failing health for the past year.

Floods Ravage Japanese Island

SAPPORO, Japan. (AP)—More torrential rains fell throughout central Hokkaido today and the toll from flash floods mounted to nine killed and three missing. Thousands of houses have been flooded, destroyed or washed away and thousands of acres inundated on Hokkaido, Japan's northern island. Roads have been cut, railway embankments eroded and dozens of bridges washed away, paralyzing all rail traffic. More than 6 1/2 inches of rain have fallen. The weather bureau predicts four to five more inches.

Church, State Dispute Boils

BUENOS AIRES, Argentina. (AP)—Argentina's Senate has authorized President Juan Peron to delay action on the explosive issue of separating church and state even as the government renewed its dispute with Catholic leaders.

The Senate gave its stamp last night on the government bill which already has cleared the lower house. If Peron signs it, election of a constitutional assembly to sever the church's official ties with the state could be held off until next May. The original law called for an election before Nov. 23.

Under the present constitution, Roman Catholicism is Argentina's official religion and the President must be of that faith. The Vatican excommunicated Peron last June during his bitter feud with church leaders whom he accused of starting an insurgent political movement. They denied the charge.

The Senate acted less than 24 hours after Justice and Interior Minister Oscar Albricio, in a blunt statement to newsmen, accused seven priests in Buenos Aires of using the pulpit to incite "a campaign of disobedience" against Peron. Albricio said the government campaign against church leaders, halted after the abortive June 16 rebellion against the President.

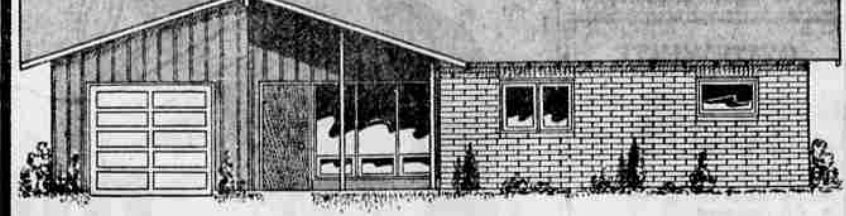

Soviets Blast Arms Report

LONDON (AP)—A Soviet spokesman today denounced as false a British estimate that Russia and her satellites have six million men under arms — but he didn't say what the correct figure is.

An article by M. Mikhailov in the Soviet government newspaper Izvestia, quoted by Moscow radio, commented on the reaction of the British Foreign Office to last week's announcement that the Soviet Union is cutting its armed forces by 600,000 men.

The Foreign Office said it was difficult to judge what such a reduction would mean since the Soviet Union had never disclosed its total armed strength. The British statement added that Red forces "are estimated at some 4,750,000 with a further 1,250,000 in the satellite forces."

Mikhailov asserted such a pronouncement could be "characterized as a new outbreak in the cold war" and added:
