## Sanders Says Uclan Outlook Not As Good

EDITOR'S NOTE: This is the first in a series on the prospects of Pacific Coast Conference football teams for the 1955 season.

LOS ANGELES (UPI)—Red Sanders, the candid coach who predicted accurately last year that his UCLA Bruins would sweep the Pacific Coast Conference championship, said just as staunchly today that the 1955 outlook is not as bright.

With the exception of pass-angling end, Ronnie Knox, the mighty line which packed such meat grinders as tackle Jack Elena and guard Jim Salisbury is gone.

So is tailback Primo Villanueva and quarterback Terry DeBay, the drivewheel in Sanders' single-wing machine.

However, Ronnie Knox at long last gets his chance to show what he can do in varsity football. The much-publicized transfer from California figures to move into Villanueva's position while fullback Bob Deporter and wideback Jack Decker, both veterans, provide backfield experience.

COMPETITION  
Doug Peters, an Oakland, Calif. senior, may give Davenport some competition for the fullback spot, while juniors Bob Bergdahl of Los Angeles and Bruce Ballard of Arcadia, Calif. battle for the quarterback job.

Sanders said the team's weakest points in the line are particularly in the tackle spots. Center is in good shape with Steve Palmer returning. Steve had a great

season in 1954 after starting out as a substitute for Capt. Johnny Peterson.

The best looking sophomores are center Jim Matheny from Temple City and guard Esker Terry from Memphis, Tenn. However, neither is expected to break into the first string.

Sanders considers the schedule as about "25 per cent" tougher than last year's, which opened with a romp against San Diego Navy.

TOUGH START  
This time the Bruins start off at home against Texas A & M, then go to College Park, Maryland, for what could be their toughest game on the state. UCLA squeezed out a 12-7 win over the Terps last year — and Coach Jim Teatum says that this year he will have his best team in 10 seasons.

Sanders says his strategy will be to get by these first two games without injury and then "the squad could shape up fairly well."

He will stick to his power-packed single wing offense and balanced line alternated with a short punt formation.

Although many quarters say the Bruins will be just as tough as last year, especially if Knox really uncorks, Sanders only says "I'm inclined to think our 1954 national championship team was the greatest in collegiate football history. How can you improve on that?"

## Pelican End Said Starter For State '11'

PORTLAND (AP)—Tentative starting lineups were named Wednesday for the Shrine All-Star football game at Multnomah Stadium Saturday night.

Lee Gustafson, State coach, listed three players from his state co-championship South Salem team to open. They are quarterback Herb Juran, halfback Neal Scheldel and guard Larry Newsum.

Other probable state starters: Ends, Elvis Mitchell, Klamath Falls, and Al Van Leuven, North Bend; tackles, Vel West, La Grande, and Freeman Cross, Prineville; guard, Glenn Ewins, Vale; center, Mike DeVore, Medford; halfback, Nuo Beasner, Roseburg; and fullback Willard Reese, North Bend.

Tom DeSylvia, Portland Metropolitan coach, was less certain about his starters but gave this tentative lineup:

Ends, Bob Sturzig, Milwaukie, and Francis Randall, Estacada; tackles, Jack Stone, Gresham, and Gene Grosse, Beaverton; guards, Jerry Simpson, Jefferson, and Lee Glatner, Astoria; center, Gerry Stickle, Lincoln; quarterback, Ted Miller, Milwaukie; halfbacks, Duane Marshall, St. Helens, and Gene Schutler, Oswego; and fullback, Grant Jackson, Jefferson.

The teams will go through light workouts at the stadium Friday to get the feel of the turf.

Shrine officials said advance ticket sales indicate a possible record attendance at the annual game. State won 50-0 last year and the Metropolitan stars will be out to snap a four-game losing streak in the event.

## Oakridge '9' Gets Crack At Ramblers

The final big league women's softball team scheduled to appear in Klamath Falls will be here Thursday, August 25, at Gem Stadium as the highly regarded Arizona Ramblers meet the hustling band of Oakridge-Westfir Loggerettes in an exhibition women's softball game.

Originally the Ramblers were to meet the Klamath Basinettes, but since the schedule was completed the Basinettes have disbanded.

Oakridge was selected for a replacement by the local softball commission because of the team's showing made in the recent state softball tournament here.

The Loggerettes lost a close 2-1 decision to the state champion Oswego team in the Sunday night final, but the winners had to go nine innings to turn the trick.

Arizona's Ramblers are probably the biggest name publicity-wise to appear in Klamath Falls. The Ramblers have played in more world tournaments than any other team in the country and have won the world crown in 1949-50-51 while finishing second in the women's "world series" five other times, for a total of eight championship battles.

Besides the team's record, the Ramblers have had more All-Americans listed on their roster than any other club in the world. Two of the All-Americans that are on the club's squad, all 14 of which have promised to be present in Klamath Falls, are Marge Law, five time A-A pitcher and Dot Wilkenson who steals the thunder from her teammates as far as All-American honors are concerned. Wilkenson has been an A-A catcher for 13 consecutive years.

## Oregon Girl Eyes Fairway Championship

FLORENCE, S.C. (AP)—Two teenagers far from home, Carole Jo Kabler of Roseburg, Ore., and Joanne Gunderson of Kirkland, Wash., met here Friday in an 18-hole match for the U.S. Golf Assn. girls' junior championship.

Each registered a 2 and 1 victory in Thursday's semifinals. Carole Jo, whose awkward-appearing swing belies the strength of her game, eliminated Betsy Cullen of Tulsa, Okla., and Joanne prevailed over Anne Quast of Marysville, Wash.

Miss Kabler, women's and junior tournament winner in Oregon this year, missed seven putts of eight feet or under, but still was only two over par for the 17 holes around the Florence Country Club course, which has a tournament par of 74 and runs 6,953 yards.

Last weekend she set a girls' competitive record 73 here in a warmup event for the national meet.

Against Miss Cullen, Carole Jo was out in par 38 and 4 up. She won the 10th, then lost the next three before putting down her opponent's rally to win fairly well in hand.

Miss Kabler, beaten in the first round last year by Willie Smith who went on to take the title, has played 76 holes in winning her five matches. Six more than Miss Gunderson. Both finalists are entered in next week's National Amateur for women at Charlotte, N.C.

## O'Malley Meets With Mayor On Bums' Fate

NEW YORK (AP)—President Walter O'Malley of the Brooklyn Dodgers and Mayor Robert Wagner went into a high-level conference today and on the results could hinge the future fate of the Broom.

The Dodgers are going to play seven home games in Jersey City next season and that announcement whipped city officials into action. They know O'Malley means business in his efforts to have a new field, with adequate parking facilities, built for the Dodgers.

Before entering the mayor's chambers, O'Malley revealed that Ebbets Field would be sold at the end of the 1957 season.

"That means," he said, "we'll play 77 home games somewhere in 1958. I hope we'll play them in Brooklyn if things move fast enough."

O'Malley vetoed the idea that the city float a municipal bond issue to build a new stadium as has been done in Cleveland, Baltimore and Kansas City.

"That's out," he said emphatically. "I wouldn't want to have baseball tied up with politics in any way. All I ask of the city fathers is their help in condemning city property."

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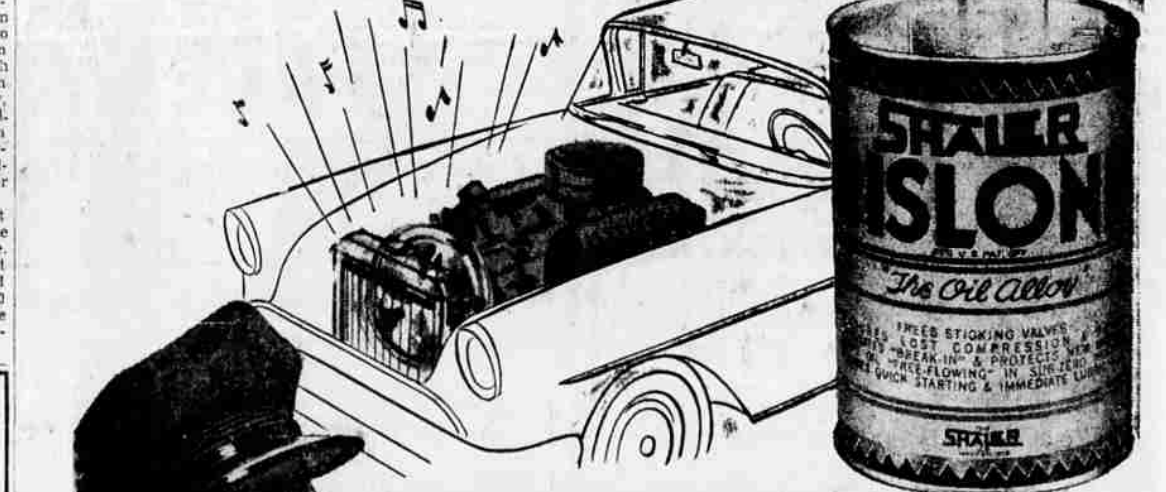


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
