Peronists Rally For Leader

BUENOS AIRES, Argentina (AP)—Thousands of Peronista Party members shouted their allegiance to President Juan Peron, the party's founder, Friday night in their first big rally since the June 16 revolt.

The three-hour party rally was billed as the kickoff in a campaign to pump fresh energy into the Peronista movement. It appeared to signal an end to the political aspects of the "peronification" program Peron called for following the abortive rebellion against his government.

The new Peronista Party chief, Alejandro Leloir, told the cheering crowd "the people's loyalty to Peron is invincible... The Peronistas are going forth into the streets... to unmask the enemies of the nation."

Marines Offer Women's Jobs

Women Marines may not spend any time on the frontlines, but they do just about everything else done by their male counterparts.

This means that they must acquire considerable technical knowledge in the fields in which they are to work. This is where the Marine schooling program enters the picture.

Such occupational fields as intelligence, logistics and drafting and surveying involve study of many subjects. The intelligence schooling includes such subjects as cartography, use of stereoscope and aerial photographic interpretation, and other subjects.

'Turncoat' Treatment Attacked

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. Keafauer (D-Tenn.) said Saturday he is dissatisfied with the "lack of anything substantial" in the newly-proclaimed code of military conduct.

In a caustic vein, Keafauer wrote Secretary of Defense Wilson, terming the code "a fine patriotic set of principles which are excellent and beneficial for club conditions."

"But," Keafauer continued, "I wonder how they would serve the man exhausted by battle, hungry, cold, facing hostile interrogators, and the prospect of more-auferring and unknown dangers any better than do the present Articles of War."

The Tennessee senator, a member of the Senate Armed Services Committee, told Wilson he hopes "you will undertake a more thorough study of the treatment of returned prisoners of war and their needs for the future."

Keafauer made the letter public. President Eisenhower last Wednesday proclaimed the new military code which sets forth guidelines for the conduct of American fighting men, stressing the highest ideals of valor in an effort to strengthen them against severe tests either in the front lines or in enemy prison camps.

Keafauer asked whether "as a nation (we) are playing square with some of the boys whose photographs I have seen in the papers upon returning home... boys who had but a few years of education, who now are labeled 'turncoats,' tried and given very little chance to resume the life of an American citizen."

Hells Canyon Study Slated

WASHINGTON (AP)—The long-smouldering Hells Canyon power fight will come under the scrutiny of two Senate subcommittees during a series of public hearings here next month.

Sen. O'Mahoney (D-Wyo.), chairman of the judiciary anti-monopoly subcommittee, said Friday his group and the interior subcommittee on irrigation and reclamation will conduct the hearings.

O'Mahoney said the two subcommittees will investigate the circumstances surrounding the Federal Power Commission's recent action in licensing Idaho Power Co. to build three low level dams in the Hells Canyon area of the Snake River where a high federal dam has been proposed.

The federal dam site would be flooded out by the backwaters from the low level dams which Idaho Power has been authorized to build.

O'Mahoney also said the subcommittees will probe the "proposed merger of the Puget Sound Power & Light Co. with the Washington Water Power Co., both Washington State private utilities."
