Entomologists Show Exhibit

Young entomology enthusiasts who have spent the summer hunting fields, woods and streams for additions to insect collections, will exhibit today and tomorrow (Tuesday) at the 4-H Junior Livestock Show.

The third annual exhibit this year promises to be the largest yet attempted.

Two 4-H entomology clubs, led by Mrs. Jo Schuh of the Altamont community and Mrs. Bob Dehlinger of Langell Valley have accumulated insects from the Klamath Basin, from other sections of Oregon and a few from California. Minute varieties have been arranged on slides.

Enrollment in the clubs has increased from six to 15 boys and girls representing three divisions of the project. In addition to the 11 exhibitors in the "Bug Catchers" division, there are two members enrolled in "Know Your Bugs," a second year group, and two in "Life Study," the third year project.

The display is being entered in the exhibit building where 4-H garden, flower and food preservation exhibits will also be open to the public.

Anderson Case Delay Asked

Another postponement in the appeal of the James Quinton Anderson murder case to the Oregon Supreme Court has been requested by attorneys Herbert and Robert Welch, Lakeview, counsel for the convicted slayer of Richard David Miller, Klamath Reservation show horse breeder.

Anderson was found guilty of the murder last February after a spectacular two-week trial at Burns. Robert Welch said Monday that the latest delaying in filing the transcript of the homicide trial had been requested because other pressing legal business had made it impossible for the defense lawyers to complete the action on or before September 1.

Welch added that the motion for an extension to October 1 had been filed in Harney County Circuit Court but he had not been informed whether Judge M. A. Biggs, who presided at the Anderson trial, had approved another delay.

Anderson has been held in the Klamath County Jail since his conviction. Judge Biggs permitted his transfer to Klamath Falls after it was shown that the Harney County Jail in Burns does not provide maximum security.

The case was tried in Burns after Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg of Klamath Falls sustained a motion for a change of venue. The defense contended that feelings were so strong against Anderson that he could not obtain a fair trial in Klamath County.

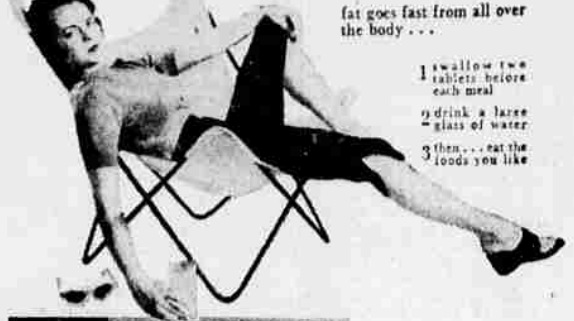
