

Portland Sweeps Two From Suds, Hollywood Wins Two

The Hollywood Stars delivered a solid one-two to their cross-town rival Los Angeles Angels last night and the blows staggered Pacific Coast League leading Seattle more than 1,000 miles away.

The second-place Stars clouted the Cherubs 2-1 in the first game and then 2-1 again in the second one. In the meanwhile Seattle's suffered double ignominy at the hands of the Portland Beavers who solidified their first division purchase.

SNAPPED

Portland topped the loop bosses 9-4 and then 4-0 with the second Beaver victory snapping a 12-game win streak for Seattle's Lou Kretlow and cutting Seattle's league lead to three games.

San Francisco's Seals treated home town fans to a pair of come-from-behind victories, beating Oakland 5-2 and 5-3. San Diego shut out Sacramento 2-0 and then the Seals spotted the Pads three runs, out scored in the bottom of the ninth for a 4-3 decision.

Red Munger notched his 19th win in the first game, which he won with a home run, his first in two years with the Stars. Tom Joe Trimble was returned winner over Los Angeles by the same 1-0 count.

Curt Roberts' homer brought in the first Star run and then Dick Smith hit a sacrifice fly with the sacks loaded in the bottom of the seventh of the short game.

Bill Werle scattered ten Seattle hits in winning the opener in the Northland. He got slugging help from Wally West and Don Egger. Westlake homered with the bases full in the first inning for a lead Werle never lost. Egger slammed one with none on in the ninth.

Ewell Blackwell took the loss and Bob Balena hit a solo Seattle homer.

THREE HITTER

In the second game the Beavers spoiled Kretlow's 12-0 mark as Royce Lint pitched a three hitter. Kretlow gave up eight hits, one of them the second homer of the day by Egger.

Dave Melton hit a three-game home run in the bottom of the eighth with the score tied to give San Francisco the first game victory over Charlie Beaman. The Seals got only five hits to 10 but their four-run eighth and 10th.

In the second game Oakland took a three-run lead in the fourth and the Seals erased it with five big tallies in the fifth. Reno Chese and Mike Baxes each had two-run doubles.

Ed Ervatt pitched a three-hit shutout for San Diego over Sacramento, besting Marjine Pieretti's five-hit effort in the opener.

The winning run in the second game was driven in when Jake Crawford poked a base hit after the Solons had loaded the bases. Earlier San Diego leaped off to a 3-0 lead and the Seals started their come-back job in the fifth when Jerry Streeter hit a solo homer.

Owner Sees Swaps Taking Match Verdict

CHICAGO (UPI) — Owner Rex Ellsworth said today his flashy 3-year-old Swaps would be "even better" in his August 21 match race against Nashua than he was Saturday when he won Washington Park's \$146,425 American Derby in record time.

"I'm extremely confident that he'll repeat his Kentucky Derby victory over Nashua," Ellsworth said. "He needed the toughest competition after his layoff."

Saturday's field was competition, Swaps didn't recognize it. A quarter mile after the start of the mile and three sixteenths grind, he was in front by a length and he stayed there despite what appeared to be a tight hold by jockey Willie Shoemaker.

At the finish, Shoemaker let him run briefly when Clifford Mooers' Traffic Judge came up. After this short sprint, he was clocked at 1:53 3/5, breaking a track record established in 1952 by Volcanic and equalling the American mark set a month ago by Heaty House Farm's Platan at Arlington Park.

The win paid Swaps \$69,000 to increase his earnings for this year to \$481,550 and for his two years of competition to \$439,500.

Brooks Continue Downfall, Lose To Phillies; White Sox Close AL Race

Baseball folks were beginning to wonder today whether Brooklyn may be headed for the most spectacular smashup in the long Dodger tradition of blowing pennants.

Actually, it would take a complete collapse by Brooklyn together with an incredible finish by either of the two top contenders—Milwaukee or New York—to accomplish the miracle. But those who still recall the late-season slides of the Dodgers of 1942 and 1951 are convinced nothing is impossible.

Win or lose, the Dodgers certainly haven't looked like pennant winners since the All-Star break, playing eight games under 500 ball since July 9. Beaten for the third straight time by Philadelphia yesterday, 6-4, the Dodgers limped home with a record of 10 losses in their last 14 games. Their 16 1/2-game lead of Aug. 12 over Milwaukee was trimmed to 11 in nine days.

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Chicago's relentless White Sox climbed within half a game of New York's American League-leading Yankees, sweeping a double-header from Detroit 2-0 and 8-2. Righthander Dick Donovan, just three weeks after undergoing an appendectomy, followed a four-hitter by Connie Johnson with a well-spaced eight-hitter for his 14th victory in 18 decisions.

The Yankees, on a winning skid of their own, dumped Baltimore 6-1. Don Larsen pitched a six-hitter. It was the Yankees' 10th victory in the last 11 starts.

Cleveland's third-place Indians remained one game from the top, walloping Kansas City 9-4 although held to seven hits by loser Al Dittmar. Ten bases on balls, together with home runs by Larry Doby and Gene Woodling, helped the Tribe's cause. Woodling, the ex-Yankee, also singled in two other runs.

Boston's Red Sox remained very much in the running, vanquishing Washington 4-1 to remain 4 1/2 games off the pace. A three-run, August 12 1 1/2-game lead over the outburst against loser Chuck

Stobbs in the eighth snapped a 1-1 deadlock and gave rookie George Susce his seventh triumph.

The slumping Dodgers managed only six hits off winner Herman Wehmeier, who won his 10th for the Phillies with the help of reliever Jack Meyer. Homers accounted for all Philadelphia's runs off six Dodger hurlers. Willie Jones hit a grand slammer in the third. Glen Gorbous and Del Ennis also homered to give the Phils an early 6-0 lead.

The Dodgers made it 6-4, but in the eighth, Meyer, in a relief role, retired three batters with a runner on third and nobody out. The rookie right-hander filled the bases on walks in the ninth but ended the game by getting pinch hitter Don Newcombe on a soft fly.

The Dodgers haven't reached the alarming stage yet but old Brooklyn sufferers still haven't forgotten that the Dodgers blew an early August lead of 10 1/2 games over the Cardinals in 1942 and a mid-August 12 1/2-game lead over the Giants nine years later.

Veteran outfielders Bobby Thomson and Andy Pafko rapped three hits apiece and Thomson drove in three runs to spark the Braves to victory over the Cubs. Righthander Bob Buhl spaced seven hits for his 12th victory.

Outfielder Wally Poff drove in three runs with his 21st home run and a single in the Reds' victory over the Cardinals. Harvey Haddix was the victim.

Minnie Minoso, with six hits in nine times at bat in the twin bill, broke up a scoreless pitching duel between Johnson and loser Billy Hoelt when he unloaded his seventh home run in the sixth inning of the opener between Detroit and Chicago. Walt Dropo ignited a four-run second in the nightcap with his 17th homer off rookie Jim Bunning.

Three Yankee home runs proved the undoing of veteran southpaw Eddie Lopat, making his first Yankee Stadium start against his former mates. Hank Bauer hit his 15th homer in the second. Bill Skowron hit his 11th and Mickey Mantle his 32nd in the third.

Jose Santiago, in relief of starter Bob Lemon, was credited with the Cleveland victory. Lemon was tagged for all Kansas City's runs in the second.

Sammy White, with a home run and double, drove in two of Boston's runs against Washington.

Two Klamath Falls Cub baseball teams swept a doubleheader from a pair of Alturas Babe Ruth League clubs Sunday afternoon in games played at Bowers Field in the Northern California city.

The Gun Store of Klamath had to come from behind to nip Alturas 9-6 in nine innings and Fluhrer's, the second Basin Cub team, humbled Cedarville 5-0 in the nightcap.

In the second game Fluhrer's pitcher Jaydee Perkins fashioned a near perfect game except for a first inning single and a catcher's error in pitching the breadmakers to the victory.

Perkins struck out 15 Cedarville batters in five innings, but a catcher's error allowed one of the strikeout victims a new lease on life. The only other out came on an outfield fly.
