NEW YORK (AP)—The Cleveland Indians started the season tabbing Herb Score as the rookie of the year — and may wind up hailing him as the guy who pitched 'em into the 'World Series.'

For the brilliant 22-year-old fireballer has taken over in the heat of the American League stretch run as the ace of the Cleveland staff. Bob Lemon, Early Wynn and Mike Garcia — the one-time "big three" of the Indians — all have faltered and left it to "the kid" to do a man's job.

And what a job he's been doing! In the last three weeks, he's reeled off four straight triumphs while Lemon, Wynn and Garcia have managed to produce one each. He started the string with a one-hit masterpiece against Baltimore and followed with two wins over Detroit and over Kansas City.

UO Misses Shaw, 13 Lettermen

Editor's Note: This is the third in a series on the prospects of Pacific coast Conference football teams for the 1955 season.

EUGENE, Ore. (UP)—The Oregon Webfoots stripped of mighty George Shaw and 13 other lettermen, will field a green team this year that may be short on victories but definitely long on speed.

In fact, Coach Len Casanova thinks his 1955 squad may pace more velocity than last year's contingent which finished third in the PCC standings.

However, Cas doesn't harbor any illusions about moving that far up the ladder again. Too many other clutch performers are expected to return, and he expects to see a lot of Shaw and 13 other lettermen.

Major weakness is lack of a good passer, something new to a team which has sported the likes of Shaw and Norm Van Brocklin. However, there is solidly among the 14 returning lettermen. Halfback Dick James, a fleet runner who was ninth among the national scorers in 1954, is back, as are end Phil McHugh and tackle Lon Slinger.

I think these three boys will do a pretty good job," Casanova says. **LINE OF HALFBACKS**
James is sure of one halfback spot while a seven man battle rages for the other between four juniors and three sophomores. Junior Dick Pavlat has the edge on experience there — 28 minutes of varsity ball.

More speed is at fullback where sophomore Jack Morris is expected to move in after four years in the service. Morris is a good kicker and has gone over the 220 yard low hurdles in 23.

Tom Crabtree, a former halfback, apparently has first call on Shaw's old quarterback spot followed by John Keller. Both saw plenty of action there last year whenever all-purpose Shaw would switch over to halfback or end.

McHugh figures to handle Reeve's left end position to left George Slinger and Bruce Brenn — junior transfers from Santa Rosa and Boise — angling for the right flank.

DEFENSIVE PERSONNEL
The line lacks key defensive personnel aside from the young Slinger, who is expected to reclaim left tackle and center Art Weber. Harry Johnson probably will move in to Tucker's vacancy at right tackle. He played 135 minutes last year.

Reynolds Cochran will seek to take over Patena's spot at right guard while sophomore Harry Mondale and veteran Spike Hillstrom joust for left guard.

Another ambitious soph is Norman Chapman who eyes the center spot held down by Weber.

Despite lively competition for jobs, however, Casanova agrees there is no substitute for experience.

Top Netters Missing From Nat'l Women's Golf Tourney Opens Action
CHARLOTTE, N.C. (UP)—A tiny, reddish-haired Canadian girl and a blonde, shapely Californian, not much larger, stood out today among half a dozen favorites as the 55th National Women's Amateur Golf Championship opened at the Myers Park Country Club.

Canada's Marlene Stewart and California's Barbara Romack are typical of the youth movement in women's golf. Marlene — 5-1 and 116 pounds, has acquired a wealth of golf experience in 21 years. She won the British women's championship in 1953 and was runner-up last year and has captured the Canadian title three times in five years.

Barbara, 22, 5-4 and 116 pounds, is the defending champion; runner-up in this year's British championship and winner of a block of lesser tournaments.

But the question of stamina arose as the comparatively small field of 104 set out for seven rounds of match play over the hilly course. The weather has been steamy hot and the long back nine at Myers Park offers a real test of endurance. At least two of the par four holes on the backside are long, uphill tests where most of the girls can't get home with their second shot.

In addition, the Bermuda grass greens have some of the players talking to themselves.

Miss Stewart, who has been hitting the ball well in practice, says the greens don't bother her. "I go to school in Florida (Rollins College) so I'm used to Bermuda," she explained.

Miss Romack, who has been sidelined most of the summer with an ankle injury suffered in the British championship, also is accustomed to Bermuda greens after a couple of winters on the Southern tour.

Dick Donovan's Win Expected By Richards

CHICAGO (UP)—Dick Donovan, 25-year-old right-hander who came off the operating table three weeks ago and in his first return to the mound surprised a lot of people yesterday but not Manager Marjory Marion.

Donovan came through with an 8-2 victory over Detroit after Connie Johnson had blanked the Tigers 2-0. The White Sox pulled within half a game of the league-leading New York Yankees.

"He's quite a pitcher," said Marion after the game. "But you know something, I expected it." Marion might have expected it, but others didn't. After all, Donovan underwent an emergency appendectomy July 31 and doctors said they didn't expect he'd be able to pitch under game conditions for six weeks.

"I feel wonderful," he said. "No aches, no pains, no anything. It felt as if I were taking my regular turn. You know, like I hadn't been out at all. Sure I tired, but no different than other games."

"This makes me look pretty good," said Donovan. "How would you like to lose your top pitcher for three weeks and then have him come back in perfect shape for the stretch drive? They didn't think we'd be up there now last spring. But we're really going to show them something."

"Sure," I expected a good game out of Donovan. He's sincere and takes his baseball seriously. He's a hard worker and he was out there running every day to get himself back in shape. He only pitched three batting practices last week but I knew he was ready because he got those legs in shape."

Donovan's return skyrocketed Chicago's pennant chances. Marion was worried about his pitching staff with the Sox having to play nine games in the next six days.

Palmer Captures Open Win
MONTREAL (UP)—Canadian Open winner Arnold Palmer who "couldn't afford to remain an amateur," will today set his sights on the rich \$25,800 Labatt Open tournament in Montreal this week.

The broad-shouldered Latrobe, Pa., golfer oddly enough holds both the U.S. Amateur title and the Dominion Open crown.

"At least I will for the next two months until somebody wins the 1955 Amateur," he said.

Palmer turned pro after his big victory last year at the Country Club of Detroit and incurred the displeasure of U.S. Amateur officials who charged that Palmer used the event as a springboard to the pros.

"I can understand that they want the winner to defend his title, but I just couldn't afford to remain an amateur," he said in an interview.

But until Saturday, the 25-year-old son of the rolling pro at Latrobe, Pa., Country Club picked up only \$1,000 since he became eligible for prize money, and hadn't won a major tournament.

He won the Canadian classic Saturday with a 23-under-par 165, just two strokes shy of the Canadian record set by Johnny Palmer of Winnipeg. N. C. first year good at Badin.

"I had one sure left goal, I guess, that's the toughest one of all," he said afterward.

Asked if the pressure bothered him when Freddie Hawkins of St. Andrews, Ill., narrowed his lead to two strokes, Palmer said, "No, I don't think so."

"I always make a rule to play the course rather than my opponent. I did the same thing when I won the Amateur and that was match play. I just keep shooting and hoping to play the best I can," he added.

His best was good enough to win the \$2,400 first prize money by five strokes over runner-up Jackie Burke Jr., Klamath Lake, N. Y.

Top Netters Missing From Nat'l Women's Golf Tourney Opens Action
CHESTNUT HILL, Mass. (UP)—Some of the nation's top women golfers vied today for championship contention by a rain-forced rash of withdrawals, settled down to scalping each other today as the 75th National doubles tourney resumed after a five-day layoff.

The four remaining seeded tandems in the men's domestic division and unpaired seeded teams had the field to themselves after the forced postponement stripped the tourney of "name" tandems.

Weather permitting, third round matches will be finished today. The Longwood Cricket Club tourney, originally due to end Sunday, now is scheduled to wind up Thursday.

Top contenders for the title vacated by Vic Seixas and Tony Trabert were Eddie Mayson of Trenton, N. J., and Cliff Moya of Berkeley, Calif., fifth in domestic seedings.

Seixas and Trabert, aces of the American Davis Cup team, were off to Boston Hills, N. Y. where Cup challenge round play begins Friday.

They, along with teammates Ham Richardson and Gil Shea, and the Australian Cup team who will meet the Americans in the classic, left Boston Friday. They were forced to delay when rain washed out play for five days, pushing the tourney into conflict with challenge round preparations.

Three other seeded tandems were eliminated in early round play.

WSC Eyes Promising Grid Year

PULLMAN, Wash. (UP)—A Washington State eleven, loaded with starry lettermen, looks for one of its best seasons in years and Coach Al Kircher thinks his Cougars may finish among the top three in the PCC standings.

"If they don't, another long victory drought is in sight behind the banks of the Palouse.

The Cougars, as usual, have to risk buying their season right off the bat by opening against Southern California in Los Angeles, and play UCLA in the third game of their schedule.

Yet Kircher rates the 1955 slate as much easier than last year's which saw the Cougars finish up with a 4-6 record and in a two-way tie for fifth in the conference. Such brutal interconference foes as Texas and Michigan State have been replaced by Kansas and San Jose State.

"This 'softer return' will be handled by 21 returning lettermen, 15 with two years of varsity experience.

Quarterback Bob Iverson, end Pete Toomey and tackle Tom Gunn have been named to the team against the likes of Texas, Michigan State, Ohio State and Baylor. The line is deep in experience if not manpower and Bob Miller, who will battle Dennis Rath for the fullback slot, is a good triple threat man.

Only six lettermen are gone and the biggest gap was left by Duke Washington, the swift fullback. Kircher rates his current backs, with the exception of left half Jim Hagerty, as "quick" but not fast.

Heinrich, playing in the stadium where he won All-America fame as quarterback for the Washington Huskies, passed for one touchdown and completed 12 out of 25 tosses for 178 yards.

Epps bucked through the Forty Niner line for another touchdown and racked up a total of 102 yards in 16 carries.

Browns Plug Defense Holes, Whip Packers

The Cleveland Browns, who parlayed a stout defense and the kicking of Lou Groza to nine straight professional football division titles, appear to have shored up the defensive holes that were so obvious in their recent game with the College All-Stars.

The collegians daringly bolted through the veteran Cleveland line while former Notre Dame quarterback Ralph Guglielmi, now of the Washington Redskins, completed 10 of 19 passes for 129 yards in a 30-7 upset of the defending National Football League champions.

But it was like old times Saturday night when the Browns rode over the Green Bay Packers, 13-7, on the strength of two field goals by Groza and a brilliant last-ditch goal line stand.

FIELD GOALS
After spotting the Packers a touchdown in the opening period, the Browns tallied their only touchdown in a pair of quarter goals, one in the second and the other in the third to close out the scoring.

But quarterback Tobin Rote, passing and running, helped move the Browns for a first down with two minutes remaining in the game. The Packers, however, were stopped on the third and fourth downs with only a yard to go for a first down on the three as the Browns' forward wall held.

The goal line stand was like the one the Browns staged against the Philadelphia Eagles late last season at Cleveland in sking out a 6-0 victory in what proved to be the turning point of the 1954 campaign in the Eastern Division. With three minutes to play the Browns stopped the Eagles after Philadelphia had driven to a first down on the Cleveland one yard line. Groza scored the six points on a pair of field goals in that one.

The New York Giants and the Chicago Cardinals earned the supposedly weaker Eastern Division a clean sweep in other NFL weekend exhibition games.

BOTTLED UP
The Giants bottled up the San Francisco Forty-Niners' running game and swept to four touchdowns themselves in a 23-17 victory before 49,000 fans in Seattle, Wash., while the Cardinals downed the Chicago Bears, 21-6, before 30,000 fans in the Gator Bowl in Jacksonville, Fla.

Quarterback Don Heinrich, who gained national prominence with the University of Washington while playing on the same field, passed for one touchdown—a 61-yarder to end Ken MacAfee—and completed 12 of 25 tosses in all for 178 yards. Bobby Epps and Alex Webster, who starred in Canada's Big Four Union last year, accounted for the other touchdowns, Webster scoring two of them.

The passing of Lamar McHan and the running of Johnny Olzewski and Ollie Matson paced the Cardinals to their upset win over the Bears. George Blanda accounted for all the Bears' points with two field goals.
