Oregon Shows Job Gains

Summertime employment gains continued throughout Oregon in July, bringing the number of non-farm workers to 485,700, it has been revealed by the state unemployment compensation commission in cooperation with the U.S. Bureau of Labor statistics. The figure was nearly 10,000 more than June, and 46,000 more than for July of last year when a labor dispute affected about 26,000 workers in the lumber industry. Expanded construction, food processing, transportation and utilities were largely responsible for the gains last month. There was a loss of 2,600 in government jobs.
