

Waldorf Faces Year With Green Gridders

BERKELEY, Calif. (UP)—Coach Lynn Waldorf of California will hit the spot at long last as he prepares for a 1955 grid with a green squad which has been stripped of the masterful running arm of Paul Larson.

"It certainly is the most inexperienced group I've had since I came here in 1947," Waldorf rumbles as he notes that Matt Hazelton, the great Bear center, also has graduated. "However, this is

a well balanced club and I don't think we'll do too bad."

Waldorf agrees that the schedule looks easier than last year's murderous affair which saw his Bears flung against mighty Oklahoma, Ohio State and UCLA in one season. UCLA still is on the menu but this fall's interregionals are with such tamer outfits as Pittsburgh, Illinois and Pennsylvania.

BALL PACKERS

The Bears will have to make up for Larson's absence by wicking more to the ground and Waldorf expects to have plenty of material in that department.

Jerry Drew, who averaged 9.29 a carry last year, is in line for the fullback spot although he may have trouble keeping it from Steve Dimeff who holds the edge in blocking and linebacking.

There is better than average speed at the halfbacks with Johnny Wilson and Ted Gramer returning. Both were starters at various times last year. Tom Kramer may or may not be back to beef up the situation if he can get past his scholastic difficulties.

Some lucky non-letterman is in line for Larson's assignment at quarterback. The inside track seems to belong to Mike Casey, who leads in variety experience. But Guy Gianulis, last year's Fresh quarterback, might be in the luck come Sept. 17.

LACK DEPTH

The ends are solid but lack depth. Jim Carmichael, who was third in pass receiving last year as Larson's batterymate, has the call at right end and Bill Vallotin, a converted back, may edge out Ed Brandt at left end.

A bad hole was torn in the tackle brigade when Harry Ghilarducci was pronounced unfit to play after undergoing an eye operation. While Bob Oliver returns to work on the left side, Don Tronstein, a junior letterman, and Ray Young, up from the Freshers, will vie for Ghilarducci's position.

Don Gilkey and Nick Popkin are two seasoned guards but there is no one to backstop them. Center also is a plum for some non-letterman. Don Mitchell and Frank Matarocci are likely candidates, although Mitchell is weak on defense and Matarocci short on experience.

Dodgers Win, ChiSox Take Lead

Big Don Newcombe may still be considered the ace of the Brooklyn Dodgers pitching staff, but he must be wondering today whether he'll ever connect for his 19th victory of the season.

Thanks to some power hitting by Carl Furillo and Duke Snider, the Dodgers snapped out of it last night to defeat the Chicago Cubs 6-4, but Newcombe wasn't around for the finish. The Cubs rapped him for three runs in the second inning to go ahead 4-3, and Newcombe retired in the third with a strained shoulder muscle.

It was his fifth start at victory No. 19 since he beat St. Louis July 31, and ran his season's record to 18-1. His mark is now 15-4.

The victory boosted Brooklyn's National League lead to 12 games over Milwaukee, defeated 4-3 by the Philadelphia Phillies.

The American League race, meanwhile, continued on its merry whirl with the Chicago White Sox taking over first place by two percentage points over the New York Yankees, and the Boston Red Sox only 3 1/2 games back in fourth place.

Chicago regained first place, although splitting a twin bill with the Baltimore Orioles, winning the opener 6-2 and losing the second same 10-3. The Yankees committed five errors, and Detroit thumped New York 7-2, while Ted Williams had another big night, driving in four runs as Boston defeated the Cleveland Indians 8-3. This left Cleveland in third place, a game

behind Chicago and New York, in a virtual tie for first. Kansas City edged Washington 4-3.

In other National League games, the St. Louis Cardinals beat the New York Giants and the Pittsburgh Pirates edged the Cincinnati Redlegs, both by 2-1 scores.

Newcombe, who had a 20th season in 1931 and was 19-11 in 1935, will be in shape to pitch his next turn, the club physician said. But getting No. 19 seems to be a job. Milwaukee knocked him out Aug. 4, and although the Braves rallied to win, Newcombe wasn't involved in the final decision. Then he was beaten by the Cubs 5-4 Aug. 4, and Robin Roberts and the Phillies bested him in two 3-2 decisions Aug. 14 and Aug. 18.

Don Roosen relieved Newcombe last night and posted his sixth victory without defeat when Furillo hit his first homer with one on in the seventh. He also had a single and a double. Duke Snider, also in a slump as the Dodgers had lost nine of their previous 13 outings, clipped in with two doubles, driving home two runs.

Stan Lopata singled with the

bases full in the ninth as the Phillies scored three times to defeat Milwaukee. Jack Meyer, ace reliever, got the decision after taking over from Murry Dickson in the ninth.

Four Baltimore errors aided Chicago in winning the opener, while Virgil Trucks gained his 13th victory, Bob Kennedy homered for the Sox. In the second game, however, the Sox muffed a chance to take a clear league lead when the Orioles racked four Chicago hurriers for 15 hits. Dave Philly touched off a five-run Oriole rally in the fifth inning with a two-run homer. George Zaverink got his first pitching victory of the year.

New York's defenses fell apart, and Bob Turley was wild as a March hare at Detroit, while the Tigers' rookie Frank Lary went all the way, spacing eight hits. Turley muffed his 12th defeat, against 13 wins.

Williams drove in four runs with a two-run homer, his 23rd, and a double to prevent Cleveland from joining Chicago and New York in a three-way traffic jam atop the league. Tom Brewer got his ninth

victory for Boston, while Herb Score was losing his 19th game. Al Smith hit his 17th homer for the Indians.

Vic Power batted in three runs, two with a homer, to pace the Athletics attack over Washington. Roy Sievers blasted his 20th and 21st home runs for the Senators.

With the bases loaded in the eighth inning, Bill Sarni of St. Louis dribbled a slow roller down the third base line that hit the bag

for a single, scoring Stan Musial with the run that beat the Giants. Paul LaPalma pitched the last three innings to gain his fourth decision for the Cards.

Vernon Law scattered six hits to make his seasonal record 9-3 as the Pirates downed Cincinnati. Jerry Lynch opened the Pirate eighth with a triple off relief hurler Buster Freeman, and scored the winning run on Frank Thomas' sacrifice fly to left field.

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Bob Albright Decisions Arthur

SEATTLE (UP)—Heavyweight Bob Albright, of Los Angeles, won a unanimous decision here Tuesday night over John Arthur of Johannesburg, South Africa, in the feature 16-round fight. Albright, weighed 230 and Arthur 218.

Arthur was knocked down twice in the second round, but came back strong to take the third and fourth rounds. The first round was even.

Albright was cut over the left eye in the third round and at the end of the fight both boys showed they had been in a battle.

Judge Frank Pantley scored the fight 95-89 in favor of Albright. Judge Jim Grant, 91-89 and referee Whitey Domsted, 89-92.

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
