

Loggerettes Meet Talent Loaded Ramblers Tonight

Women's softball takes over the local spotlight tonight at Gem Stadium as the famed Arizona Ramblers of the Pacific Coast Women's Softball League come to grips with the spirited Oakridge-Westfir Loggerettes in an exhibition diamond affair.

Game time is 8 o'clock. A preliminary game will be played at 6:30 between the Elks and VFW of the Klamath Falls men's league.

This is another game of the post-season playoffs now in session. The winner will meet Suburban next Monday evening for the president's cup championship.

The Arizona Ramblers are said to be many to be the biggest name of its kind to appear on the Basin sport picture. The Ramblers are three times world champions. Five other times they were in the world championship game, making a total of eight tries for the coveted title of women's softball.

Besides the world championships and league trophies the Ramblers have collected, they have one of the brightest rosters in the business. Meaning they have more than their share of All-American talent. In fact, Arizona has had more All-Americans on their team than any other club in the country.

Just last year two of the softballers from Phoenix were selected for the dream team of the world. Marge Law, who has curves, both with and without a softball, was chosen for the fifth time to an A-A team, while Dot Wilkenson's pick came as no surprise to many. It brought Wilkenson record to 13 selections as an All-American catcher.

The official softball guide for 1955, which is published by the American Softball Association, has this to say about the Ramblers' standout receiver: "Here is the gal that has played in more world tournaments than any other member of the fair sex, and has named to more All-American teams than any other girl. One of the greatest competitors that softball has ever known. Dot also doubles in brass as the manager of the Ramblers, and has proven a most capable leader. She is undoubtedly the greatest girl catcher of all time."

KFJI Plans To Award KU, Tech Trophies

TIPTOP TALENT

Oakridge has their share of tip-top talent, and what may be more important than ability, the Loggerettes are loaded with spirit. This was clearly demonstrated in the state tournament here earlier this month.

Led by the all-state pitching of Daria Logan and Sharon Shepard the Loggerettes moved from an unheard-of first round game into the championship fray against the state champions, the Oswego Mermaids.

Logan twirled a no-hit, no-run

game in the first seven innings for the Loggerettes in their strong bid for an upset win over the pre-tourney favorites, but errors gave the Mermaids the state title in nine innings, 2-1.

The Oakridge delegation also snared two other all-state berths. Third baseman Nina Edwards and first baseman Helen Sanders were both chosen to the 1955 state team. Both are among the top hitters for the Loggerettes. Although she didn't receive all-state honors, shortstop Jeanne Nicholl of Oakridge was a leading factor in the team's second place finish.

The tickets for tonight's big softball jamboree, which incidentally will be the last women's diamond play of the year, will sell for 75 cents for adults and 50 cents for children under 12. There will be no reserved seats for these games.

Budge, Kramer Pick US To Win Davis Cup

FOREST HILLS, N.Y.—Take it from two former amateur tennis kings with the big game: The United States will retain the Davis Cup against the challenge of Australia starting tomorrow, perhaps by a margin as big as 5-0.

That was the prediction today of Don Budge and Jack Kramer as the draw was made for the two opening singles matches tomorrow on the famed Stadium Court.

Secretary of State Dulles will draw the names of the opposing players out of the huge coveted cup.

Budge and Kramer, now professionals but themselves onetime defenders of the international trophy, made their predictions after numerous workouts with Tony Trabert and Vic Seixas, the pair who brought the cup back to the United States last year after a four-year sojourn in Australia.

KU Gridiron Boss Issues Second Call

A second call for all boys interested in playing Pelican football at Klamath Union High School this fall was issued by coach John McGinnis this morning.

The Pel gridiron boss said physicals were given this afternoon and the equipment will be drawn by prospective gridirers Friday morning at 10 o'clock at the Field House on Modoc Field.

First practice sessions will be held Monday, August 29, at Modoc Field. Until school starts, McGinnis has planned two-day workouts for the Pelicans as he points for the first game of the season against Grant of Portland on September 10.

"The U.S. will win because Tony and Vic have been working out against players with powerful serves and the big game such as Don and I have," said Kramer. "By contrast, the Australians' practices have been with team substitutes. They would have been much better off if they had obtained the aid of such Australian stars as Frank Sedgman and Dinny Pails."

Kramer said he looked for the Americans to win by at least 4-1, "perhaps by as much as 5-0."

Budge declined to predict the margin of victory but said he was confident the Americans would win the doubles—considered the key point in the five-match competition.

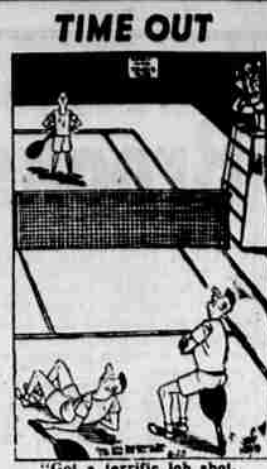
"I liked the way they looked against us yesterday," said Budge, whose service still is considered one of the most powerful in the history of sport.

Bill Talbert, nonplaying captain of the U.S. team, was expected to go all the way with the 31-year-old Seixas and the 25-year-old Trabert.

Talbert was toying with the idea of naming 22-year-old Hamilton Richardson for one of the singles berths until yesterday. Then in a "produce or else" match, Seixas whipped the former intercollegiate champion from Baton Rouge, La., 6-3, 3-6, 6-3. That settled it for the captain.

"I was very much impressed by the way Seixas played," said Talbert. "Not his game so much as by his attitude. He saw he had a job to do and did it. I haven't seen him look as well since the Challenge Round in Sydney last December."

Meantime, the Aussies captain, Harry Hopman, refused to come right out and announce his lineup but indicated it would be Lew Hoad and Ken Rosewall, a pair of veterans at 20, in the singles and the unbeaten combination of Hoad and the flashy Rex Hartwig in the doubles.



Gilmer's Play Pleases Lions' Gridiron Boss

MOBILE, Ala.—Coach Buddy Parker of the Detroit Lions, worried over star quarterback Bobby Layne's injuries, breathed easier Thursday after watching Harry Gilmer run and pass his team to a 17-14 exhibition over the Washington Redskins.

Gilmer, former University of Alabama tailback, completed a pass to rookie Dave Middleton from Auburn for a 35-yard touchdown in the first quarter of Wednesday night's game, and ran around right end from the four for a third quarter score.

A 27-yard punt return by Middleton and a 26-yard pass from Gilmer to Jug Givard set up the third period score.

Washington's two sub-quarterbacks, Al Denson and Ralph Guglielmi, accounted for one touchdown each. Dorow, who played most of the first three quarters, led the Redskins to the seven and then passed to Norb Hecker in the end zone in the first quarter.

Guglielmi scored in the final two minutes of the game on an eight-yard dash. He had completed a 28-yard pass to end Johnny Carson three plays before.

Doak Walker booted a 43-yard field goal early in the first period.

Gilmer picked up 190 yards by completing 15 of 21 passes.
