

Out Of Doors With The Sportsman Weekend Angling Outlook

PORTLAND (AP) — Fishing conditions good in many of the coastal areas of Oregon, the State Game Commission reported in looking toward the weekend prospects.

There has been good success in many other waters of the state, too, the report said, giving this picture by districts:

Northwest
Sea-run cutthroat angling fair in north coast streams. Salmon fishing fair in Columbia, slow in Nehalem Bay. Tillamook, Nestucca, Salmon rivers poor to fair for trout angling upstream, fair to good at tidewater. Several Chinook jacks caught in Nestucca and Salmon rivers. Jetty and rock fishing good for ling cod. Bass and trout being taken at Lake Lyle. All Lincoln and Lane County streams good for sea-run cutthroat and angling in the upper stretches of the streams has been fair. Fishing in the Florence area lakes has been fair. McKenzie and Willamette rivers continue fair to good. Dorena Reservoir has been good. Lookout Point Reservoir has been good on trout especially at the upper end. Clear Lake has been fair to good. Lakes in the McKenzie Pass area have been fair.

Southwest
Winchester Bay salmon angling good, some now being taken from the jetties but mostly the fish are still outside. Sea-run cutthroat on Smith River has been fair to good. Tenmile Lake angling has been generally slow except on bass. Salmon angling in Coos Bay has been good. Some jack salmon are being taken in the Coquille River between Moors mill and Bullards bridge. Coos and Coquille tideswaters have been giving up a few sea-run cutthroat. Large cutthroat are being caught in the Coquille River in the Riverton area. Striped bass angling in the mud flats near Railroad bridge and McCullough bridge has been fair to good on the incoming tide. In the main Rogue trout fishing has been good while in the north forks of the Rogue and tributaries it has been excellent. Willow Creek reservoir has been some better. Cooler weather has brought improvement in most waters. Fish Lake in Jackson County is being drawn down to low level but fishing remains good. In the Gold Hill to Gracie sector only a few steelhead are being taken. The upper Umpqua area is generally fair. Summer steelhead angling has been improving in the Steamboat area but is slow elsewhere.

Central
Lower Eagle and Herman creeks were closed to angling Aug. 15 and remain closed until Dec. 1. Black, Hicks and Wabun lakes have been excellent for 6 to 10-inch Eastern brook trout. Lost Lake very good for trolling flies. Frog Lake has been producing limit catches on flies and bait fishing has also been good. Olalie and Monon lakes have been good for Eastern brook. The weekend outlook at Horseshoe Lake is good for 7 to 9-inch rainbows. Blue Lake has been reported good and East and Paulina have been improving. Deep trolling has been good at Big Lava Lake with fond tenders and worms. Odell Lake has been fair. Davis Lake has been good on dry flies. Gold Lake has been good in early morning and evening. Crescent Lake has been good.

Slammer, Slugger Top Field

MONTREAL (UP)—The "slammer" and the "slugger" headed a field of 131 Dominion and American golfers today as the \$26,200 Labatt Open, Canada's richest golf tournament, swung into the second round at the Summerlea course.

Burly Mike Southak, a somewhat tamed-down slugger, and Sam Snead, the master, were out in front with five-under par 65's. But only one stroke separated them from Doug Ford of Klamath Lake, N.Y., and Marty Furgol of Lemont, Ill.

Gene Littler, Palm Spring, Calif. pro, was only two strokes off the pace and seven other par-busters were bunched at 68 as 18 shooters broke regulation figures Thursday.

Snead, the 43-year-old veteran from White Sulphur Springs, W. Va., made a dramatic finish to deadlock Southak for first place. The popular Snead, well behind golf's leading money winners this year, had one of his better days in the opening round of the 72-hole medal play.

"I putted better than I have all year," he said. Asked to explain his new-found touch, he added: "Well, if you get off to a fast start and birdie the first two holes the cup begins to look big." He said making a circle with his arms the size of a bushel basket.

"But when you're not dropping them," he added, "it's no bigger than this," he added describing a small circle with his thumb and fingers.

Southak played steady and frequently exciting golf as he toured the par-70, 6,515-yard layout in 33-2, the same as Snead. The former Duke University end also birdied the first two holes and the 6th and 7th. But he faltered briefly when he three-putted the tough 8th for bogey-four. He came home in two under, however, scoring crowd-pleasing birdies on the 13th and 17th.

Rickey To Stick With Bucs

PITTSBURGH (AP)—Despite the poor showing of the Pittsburgh Pirates under his leadership, General Manager Branch Rickey says he has retained the confidence of John Galbreath, president of the club.

And, he says, he intends to stick with the Pirates when his five-year term as general manager expires at the end of November.

In an interview yesterday, Rickey, 73, indicated he would stay on in an advisory capacity. But in the same breath he left the door open for Galbreath to reappoint him general manager.

Rickey's contract has a provision for him to remain with the Pirates in an advisory capacity. Last year, after he announced plans to retire at the end of this season, Galbreath said he would ask Rickey to stay on for at least one more year as general manager.

When asked yesterday if Galbreath had talked with him about this, Rickey said "Yes" but declined to elaborate. He said merely: "Mr. Galbreath has told me 'Branch if you go out, I do.' But I believe John's statement has to do with the contract as it stands now."

Galbreath, a multimillionaire Columbus (Ohio) real estate operator, was not available for comment.

Rickey said Galbreath has loaned more than a half million dollars to the hapless Pirates "without seeking money from the other stockholders."

Net World's Leading Question To Be Answered In Davis Action

FOREST HILLS, N.Y. (UP)—Two young men from opposite sides of the globe walk out onto the famed center court at Forest Hills today to answer the tennis world's biggest question.

One is rangy Tony Trabert, the 25-year-old Wimbledon champion from Cincinnati. The other is chunky Lew Hoad, a 20-year-old blinding bridegroom from Australia.

The question to be answered is: Which is the world's greatest tennis player?

A lot of the evidence will go today on the emerald green turf where they'll battle for the cherished Davis Cup. There is much more at stake than a mere one point of the five which will decide whether the United States keeps the huge silver bowl or the Aussies take it back down under.

AT STAKE
Trabert has the most at stake. He stepped to the front of the pack by winning at Wimbledon. Two singles victories in the current Davis Cup play — plus a win in the approaching nations — would put him solidly in line for a \$100,000 professional career.

But if he loses today to Hoad it is a black eye which could extend all the way to his wallet.

Harry Hopman, the acrid little man who captains the Australian tennis tourists, started the controversy over which was the greater of the two.

"Potentially, Hoad is the No. 1 man in the world," he insisted as his charges stormed into the challenge round. "He had some tribulations but now that he has the right mental attitude he will prove

he is the best before the year is out."

Naturally, the American contingent rallied behind Trabert. "You have to take Trabert on the record of his performances during the past year," asserted Billy Talbert, non-playing captain of the United States team. "Possibly he isn't as hard a hitter as Hoad but hitting too hard is unsound. It's sort of like Mickey Mantle trying to hit a home run every time he goes to bat."

REASONS
Jack Kramer, the former amateur and professional champion who would like to see Trabert come through for financial reasons, went even further. "I'd bet on Trabert against practically anybody in the world, amateur or pro," he said flatly. "He is much sounder technically than Hoad, although Hoad may be faster. Eventually, Trabert will play better than anybody in the world."

But it is Mercer Beasley, the wise old owl of the tennis teaching ranks, who makes the strongest case for Trabert. "Tony is smarter," Beasley analyzed. "Hoad tries to blast every shot off the court. Trabert simply has more brains, as well as just as much power."

So it goes. But sometime late this afternoon, as the shadows settle over the huge concrete horseshoe packed with breathless

fans, the issue should be settled with certain finality.
