

### PATRICIA JANE TAYLOR CLAIMED AS BRIDE OF LEWIS E. ERBES JR.

Lemon-yellow, pale green and white were colors chosen by Patricia Jane (Pat) Taylor, for her wedding in First Methodist Church August 14, to Lewis E. Erbes Jr. White gladioli, lemon-yellow pompons and palms were featured in the floral decor, illuminated by lighted tapers in floor candlebrays. White gladioli were used for the altar arrangement; and pews were marked with white gladioli and lighted candles tied with white bows.

Dr. Dallas McNeil read the 2:30 p.m. service in the presence of 150 guests.

The bride is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Mark D. Taylor Jr., Wapato, Washington; and her husband is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Lewis E. Erbes, Fort Jones, California.

Mrs. Earl Redman, organist, accompanied soloist, Sandra McAllister, Portland.

The bride, given in marriage by her father, wore a dress of Chantilly lace and nylon tulle over bridal satin. The full floor length skirt of net over satin was topped with a lace jacket and graduated pleatum. The jacket, designed with a peter pan collar and long sleeves, was fastened with lace covered buttons.

A pearl and lace scalloped tiara held the illusion veil-fashioned and hand-rolled by the bride. Her bouquet was a yellow throated orchid surrounded by white rosebuds and stephanotis.

For "something blue" the bride wore an unusual blue garter designed and made for the occasion by Marian Higley her former roommate at Willamette University.

Her only jewelry was a pair of cultured pearl earrings, gift from the bridegroom.

Maid of honor was LaRayne Weed, girlhood friend; and bridesmaids were Marian Higley, referred to above, from Portland; and Ann Pedersen, also girlhood friend.

All wore dresses identical in style, of faille taffeta with nylon lace, peplums and jackets—the maid of honor's in yellow, and the bridesmaids' in Nile green. All wore lace bandeaus outlined in pearls and trimmed with pearl encrusted lace rosettes—in yellow and Nile green to match their dresses. The headpieces were designed and handmade by the bride.

Each carried a cascade arrangement of charm glameilas to blend with the color of her frock—and all wore matching lace mitts. Their pearl necklaces and earrings were gifts from the bride.

Flower girl, Noreen Nybakken, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Norman Nybakken, Wapato, wore yellow. Her matching headband and the basket she carried were designed and made by the bride. She wore a pearl necklace and bracelet—given to her by the bride. John Koehn, son of Mr. and Mrs. Virgil Koehn, was ringbearer.

The bride's brother, Airman 1-c Donald D. Taylor, Anchorage, Alaska, served as best man; and ushering were Robert Charles; Robert Archambault, brother of the bridegroom, Red Bluff; Terry Kuhman and Joe Meador.

Mrs. Taylor wore a powder blue lace dress with pearls and rhinestones accenting the scalloped neckline. She wore a mauve rose hat, gloves and rosebud corsage with white shoes and bag.

The bridegroom's mother chose a dress of antique rose silk with matching hat and black accessories. Her corsage was of white and delicate pink roses.

Pat, who attended Willamette University last school year, where she was a member of Alpha Lambda Delta honorary, was valedictorian of her KUHS graduating class in 1954.

Erbes, a 1933 graduate of OTI in gunsmithing is with Ellingson's Sporting Goods, South San Francisco. Until 1955 he was with Hal's Sport Shop in Klamath Falls.

The ring pillow used for the Erbes-Taylor nuptials was one used by the bride's parents at their own wedding. For the recent wedding, it was decorated with the orange blossoms from Mrs. Taylor's bridal veil.

The sixpence in the bride's slipper was sent by a cousin of the bride from the Isle of Man. Embroidery from Mrs. Taylor's bridal veil was the "something old"—applied onto the bride's wedding slip; and the "borrowed" was a lace handkerchief from Mrs. Jack Stenberg, Wapato.

Out of town guests were Mr. and Mrs. Mark D. Taylor Sr., grandparents of the bride; Mr. and Mrs. Jim Puckett and daughter Amy; and Alice Janssen, cousins of the bride, Allen, Nebraska; Mr. and Mrs. Bob Archambault; Mr. and Mrs. George Erbes, uncle and aunt of the bridegroom, Red Bluff; and Mr. and Mrs. Lewis E. Erbes, parents of the bridegroom, Fort Jones.

The reception was in the church parlors, after which, the newly wedded couple left for a California honeymoon. They are now at home, 1019 Clark Avenue, San Bruno, California.
