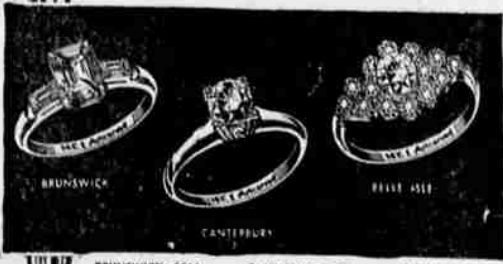
Hurd-Ryan Morning Nuptials In Weaverville Catholic Church
