

Here Is A Glance Around The United States Capital

WASHINGTON (UP) — What a few in Washington: When the visiting Russian farmers were here, there was a big hoe down at the Soviet embassy. There were a few red faces. The embassy had run out of forks. The wife of an American newspaperman who had been invited spoke lightly to a waiter. The white coat (who turned out to be an American working for the caterer) said in a whisper,

"I'll call the Kremlin. You'll have a fork in 15 minutes." In two minutes the man was back. With a fork.

That same day there was a press conference at the embassy. Something had happened to the air cooling system. The reporters were complaining. The stock answer came from a Russian reporter who always covers Mr. Eisenhower's press conferences in the old State Department building. "The little level is never air-conditioned."

The couple held identical tickets on the daily double at Exhibition Park Race Track. They said they used "the Chinese alphabetical system" to pick the winning combination.


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
