

Nashua Whips Swaps

CHICAGO (AP)—It took Nashua 3 months and 24 days to catch up with Swaps and avenge his Kentucky Derby loss.
The powerful, mahogany bay, pride of the East, met the California-bred Swaps under neutral conditions yesterday at Washington Park and scored a brilliant 6 1/2-length triumph in one of the greatest match races ever run.
It was a thorough trouncing at 1 1/2 miles under equal weights of 126 pounds, the same as the Kentucky Derby when Swaps brushed off favored Nashua's midstretch challenge and swept to a 1 1/2-length victory.
The \$100,000 winner-take-all showdown was the first of its kind since Armed Bear Assault and jockey Eddie Arcaro by eight lengths for the same jackpot at Belmont in 1947. It undoubtedly crisscrossed 3-year-old horses and probably the Horse of the Year award for Nashua's handsome son, owned by William Woodward Jr. of New York.

College Gridders In Action

It's Sept. 1, and with the American League pennant race heating the sports headlines, college football pops into the picture with the opening of fall practice.
The college boys have a gimmick to snare their share of the interest. The word is out that it may be a long autumn for Ohio State, the 1954 national champion, and Notre Dame, the perennial pretender to the throne.
And with those two elephants on the fence, Oklahoma, riding a 19-game unbeaten streak, makes its big bid to reclaim the national title it last held in 1950.
The Sooners were No. 3 a year ago in the Associated Press ranking, running behind OSU and UCLA. With Notre Dame, Navy, Mississippi, Army, Maryland, Wisconsin and Arkansas filling out the top 10.
SWAMPED
Graduation losses have pared Ohio State's hopes to Howard (Hopalong) Cassidy, one of the big guys as the Buckeyes ruled the Big Ten last season with a seldom-seen sweep of seven games and then swamped Southern California in the Rose Bowl 20-7.
Michigan, packed with sophomores, Wisconsin, even without Alan (The Horse) Ameche, and Iowa figure to get into the act in the unpredictable Big Ten.
Graduation losses have chopped down the Irish too, with sophomore Coach Terry Brennan in search of a replacement for quarterback Ralph Guglielmi.
On the West Coast, UCLA, which missed a showdown with Ohio State in the Rose Bowl because of a rule prohibiting two consecutive appearances—again looks like the big threat for the Pacific Coast Conference crown. Fleet stable.
But Southern Cal, counting on a fleet stable of backs, also gets a nod.
TOUGHIES
In the Big Seven, as always, it's Oklahoma. The Sooners haven't lost in 47 league contests. Texas and Pittsburgh look like the only outside toughies.
In the East, the two service schools—Navy and Army—are the terrors. The Middies, the 1954 team called desire that defeated Mississippi in the Sugar Bowl, have been in practice for two weeks—a NCAA concession to schools which open early.
Georgia Tech, counting backfield speed and a big line, gets the early vote. Mississippi, not on Tech's schedule, Auburn and Kentucky also have been getting mentions.
It's still Jim Tatum's Maryland in the Atlantic Seaboard-Southern sector, with Duke and West Virginia again thumping the drums.
Texas, the big disappointment of '54, Rice and Baylor shape up as the big barriers for a repeat by Arkansas in the Southwest. The Razorbacks, with Wichita's Jack Mitchell replacing Bowden Wyatt as coach, will try on the split-T for size.

Portland, Seattle Split Pair

At best the Los Angeles Angels have only an outside chance of winning the Pacific Coast League pennant but they're having lots of fun playing "spoiler" for their arch-rivals, the Hollywood Stars.
A Wrigley Field crowd of 15,483—biggest of the PCL season—turned out last night to see the Angels turn back the Stars, 8-1, for the second night in a row and once again block Hollywood's chances of moving into first place.
Front-running Seattle managed to split with Portland and thus take a half game lead over the Stars. The Rainiers won the opener 8-0 and dropped the second game, 4-2.
Meanwhile, the San Diego Padres roared back into contention with a 5-0, 6-2 sweep over Sacramento, leaving the Padres just 2 1/2 games back in fourth place and Los Angeles 5 1/2 games behind with 14 games to play.
CELLAR RACE
At the other end of the ladder, San Francisco climbed out of the cellar past Oakland with an 8-5 win over the Oaks.
The Angels' Don Elston tossed a four-hitter for his 18th win while his mates, led by Steve Bilko, landed on Ben Wade and two successors for 11 hits. Bilko, the league-leading home run hitter, slammed his 36th round-tripper in the second inning to get the Angels off to a 1-0 start.
Seattle went on a slugging spree in the seven-inning opener in Portland as Elmer Singleton potted his eighth shutout and 17th win. Jerry Zuvella, Joe Ginsberg, Bill Glynn and Art Schulte hit home runs to account for all of the Rainiers runs.
But in the nighttime Royce Lint muffled Seattle bats with a five-hitter for his ninth win. Luis Marquez singled in two Portland runs in the third and the Beavers were never headed. Wally Westlake homered in the seventh for Portland.

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Swaps Better Says Shoe

CHICAGO (UP)—I didn't have the same horse under me today that I had in other races.
Swaps didn't run up to his past form, and I know my horse is capable of a lot better than he did today.
Both horses bore out coming out of the gate. Nashua came toward me and I went toward the stands. It was just a stride or two and I don't think it made any difference in the race.
We tried to beat him. We came down the home stretch the first time, but by the time we reached the first turn I knew I didn't have my best horse under me.
Then about the halfway point, we came at him. We got up maybe a neck behind and then he went away from us. Arcaro just had too much horse. I began whipping Swaps at the head of the stretch when we came at him again and we couldn't pick up anything and that was it.
I knew I had a beaten horse at the quarter pole. We came in-side later. We weren't trying for better footing. I knew we were beat and we weren't going to win. I was easing up then and I was pulling him up when we finished.
I knew my horse was getting tired and there wasn't any point in beating him to death.
Arcaro bore out on us at the first turn but he was just looking for the best part of the track, and I don't blame him. It didn't help us any to have to go out but I don't think it made any difference in the outcome. I don't think the start made any difference either. I still think he's a good horse, a lot better than he was today.

Football Opens For PC Teams

Posing over with football coaches and players get down to the serious business of fall practice Thursday at the nine Pacific Coast Conference schools.
Wednesday—the candidates turned out in shiny game uniforms for camera day.
Thursday it's working equipment.
Here's how the opening day sessions lined up:
SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA—Twenty-four lettermen and 50 others showed up in cooking 100-degree weather. Center Marvin Goux dressed for pictures but is not expected to get back into action until late fall, if at all, because of a back operation.
CALIFORNIA—Seventy-six showed up but it looks like the Bears have lost one of their 11 lettermen, fullback Jerry Drew whose broken arm failed to respond to treatment.
STANFORD—Twenty-one lettermen were among 70 players out for the picture session. The Indians appeared huskier than usual and Coach Chuck Taylor agreed: "We have pretty good size this year. We also have some little fellows."
UCLA—Guard Hardiman Cur-ton was named captain by the 23 lettermen on the squad, the first Negro to be chosen captain at UCLA. Coach Red Sanders had 62 players out. Sanders said he planned to start his formal practice at a fairly easy pace.
WASHINGTON STATE—Coach Al Kircher started looking early among his 47 players for a break-away back needed for the Cougars' new split-T attack. There were 16 seniors among lettermen reporting but 6 others were missing, three who quit school and three because of grades.
IDAHO—Forty-eight candidates showed up and Coach Skip Stahley

warned: "I'd say just about six or seven of these guys look like cinch starters. The rest of 'em will scrap it out." The Vandals have 19 lettermen including 7 backs.

OREGON STATE—New Coach Tommy Prothro had 26 lettermen on tap, most of any PCC school. He took over from PCC Taylor.

WASHINGTON—Coach Johnny Cherberg showed a faster and bigger batch of players, featuring 25 lettermen and three candidates for the key quarterback spot—veteran Sandy Lederman, letterman Jerry Redmond and ex-ent Steve Roake.

OREGON—Coach Len Casanova had 44 players on hand, including 13 lettermen, 4 others from last year's squad, 14 sophomores and 13 junior college transfers.

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Score's Mound Work Gives Tribe New Ray

CLEVELAND (AP)—Young Herb Score's sparkling three-hit victory over Baltimore Wednesday boosted the Cleveland Indians' pennant hopes as they face four games with the league-leading Chicago White Sox.
The rookie southpaw's performance—which gave Cleveland a 5-1 victory despite eight innings of hitless relief pitching by Baltimore's Hector Brown—kept the Indians on pace in the nip-and-tuck pennant drive.
Score's 13 strikeouts ran his total to 209, and he became the first pitcher to pass 200 since 1948, when Cleveland's Bob Feller set the record of 348.
Brown fanned 19, and the game total of 23 tied the modern Major League mark. Brown, a right-hander recently recalled from the Pacific Coast League, was wild at times, but stopped the Indians cold and retired the last 13 batters in succession.
Although he pitched eight full innings without allowing a hit, he can't get credit for a no-hitter. To get credit, a pitcher must go the full nine innings, and the last of the ninth wasn't necessary, as Cleveland won.
