Southern Officials Probe Death Of Young Negro Boy

GREENWOOD, Miss. (UP)—Local authorities today planned an all-out murder prosecution in the kidnap-killing of a Chicago Negro boy who reportedly insulted a white woman at a rural store.

Sheriff George Smith of Leflore County said storekeeper Roy Bryant and his half-brother, J. W. Milan, definitely would be charged with murdering the 15-year-old, Emmett Till, a victim of polo.

Bryant and Milan, both white, admitted kidnaping the boy but claimed they released him unharmed. The boy's nude body, shot in the head and weighted with 125 pounds of metal, was found in a river Wednesday morning.

News of the discovery of the body brought an immediate angry reaction from the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People and denunciations of the State of Mississippi.

In New York, Roy Wilkins, NAACP executive secretary, said the slaying was a "lynching." In Chicago, Henry Huff, chairman of the NAACP Legal Redress Committee, protested to state and federal authorities.

Mrs. Mamie Bradley, Till's mother, said in Chicago that she would "fight to the end to see that justice is done," and added, "the state of Mississippi will have to pay for this."

The sheriff said he had suspected foul play as soon as he arrested Bryant and Milan on kidnap charges, and awaited only to find the body before prosecuting them for murder.

Young Till's body, the head pierced by a gunshot and bashed in by a heavy instrument, was discovered partly submerged in the Tallahatchie River 25 miles north of here.

Smith quoted Bryant and Milan as admitting abducting Till from the home of Moses Wright, an uncle of Till who was visiting after Mrs. Bryant said Till was the one who insulted her. But they claimed they afterward released Till when Mrs. Bryant later said he was not "the one."

Till, or someone, was said to have directed a "wolf whistle" at Mrs. Bryant during a visit of several Negro boys to the store and upon leaving said "goodbye" in a manner that Bryant and Milan considered insulting.

Improved Security System Predicted By Two Senators

WASHINGTON (AP)—Both Senators Olin D. Johnston (D-SC) and Carlson (R-Kan.) said today they expect improvements in the Eisenhower administration's employee security program to grow out of their Senate subcommittee investigation.

Johnston is the chairman and Carlson the lone Republican member of a Senate Civil Service subcommittee conducting the inquiry.

The senators late yesterday finished three days of public hearings on a series of disputed firings of

government employees as security risks. Witnesses also offered many recommendations for revising the program set up by President Eisenhower's order in 1953.

Carlson said, "I think the security program can be improved and we can make some recommendations that will be worthwhile."

Johnston said in a separate interview testimony showed that the security program has been administered "in a slipshod fashion."

He also said the program "needs a general overhaul to protect the rights of individuals and also to see the government is kept free of any Communists or subversives."

One of the most frequent complaints before the committee was that federal workers have been ousted as "security risks" without a fair chance to clear themselves. Among other things, witnesses recommended that accused employees be allowed to face their accusers, that security officers be required to make their charges more specific, that hearing boards

be required to give the reasons for their decisions, and that the security program be restricted to those jobs where government secrets are involved.

Johnston said the subcommittee will resume hearings in about three weeks, to take up then the case of land reform specialist Wolf Ladejnsky and others.

Ladejnsky was fired by the Agriculture Department last December as a security risk and hired in January, with full security clearance, by the Foreign Operations Administration.
