Death Case Charge Filed In KF Court

A charge of second degree murder was filed Thursday morning against Marcelus Norwest, 26, who is accused of shooting Jack Jones, 25-year-old former divinity student, in the back.

The homicide occurred early Wednesday morning near the Standard Oil Company plant in Chiloquin. According to District Attorney Richard Beesley, the two men became involved in a dispute over a case of beer. Beesley added that Leroy (Buzz) Waresy, Springfield, Oregon, lawyer who witnessed the slaying, said that Jones was shot in the back.

Beesley also said evidence in the case indicated that Jones was moving away from Norwest and had turned his back when he was hit in the shoulder with a bullet from a 30-30 rifle.

Sheriff Murray Britton, who signed the murder complaint, said the victim, the defendant and Waresy had been touring around Chiloquin for two hours in two automobiles. They finally stopped near the Standard Oil plant.

WHITING, Ind. (AP) — The last flames of the 31-day fire at the Standard Oil Co. (Indiana) refinery were extinguished last night. Two persons died and 45 were injured by the explosion of a giant gasoline cracking still early Saturday and the resulting fire. Standard estimated its loss in excess of \$10 million dollars.

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Educator Calls U.S. Youth 'Last Resource' Of Nation

The importance of educating the nation's youth was stressed this morning by Dr. Paul B. Jacobson, dean of the school of education, University of Oregon.

Dr. Jacobson was the principal speaker at a general session of the Klamath and Lake County Teachers' Institute and Educational Conference at Mills School. Over 450 elementary and high school instructors were present.

He called youth the country's "last resource," and pointed out the chances of teaching youngsters wrongly.

The Oregon educator told how the government has taken a continued interest in education, particularly by passage of acts permitting veterans to obtain free schooling.

He pointed out that both deal with people, but a teacher prepares a student for the immediate future, while the minister prepares students and adults for the distant future, or eternity.
