Polio Cases Rise In U.S.

WASHINGTON (AP) - A total of 2,279 new polio cases was reported to the Public Health Service last week, the highest weekly total for this year.

For the first time since June 4, the 1955 weekly total exceeded the figure for the same week in 1954. However, a Health Service spokesman said last week's increase of about 6.6 per cent over the 2,138 cases reported in the week ended Aug. 20 was "seasonal" and "just about what could be expected at this time of the year."

Even though the case total for the week ended Aug. 27 pushed ahead of the comparative 1954 week, the year's total still is 2,964 cases below the 1954 total for the similar period—14,140 compared with 17,104.

The 1955 "disease year" total stood at 13,077 cases up through last Saturday compared with 15,551 a year ago. The disease year starts about April 1, when incidence of the disease is usually at its lowest.

"A definite peak in incidence appears to have been reached in the New England states," the Health Service said.

The communicable disease center reported that 415 cases of confirmed polio have been reported among persons vaccinated with Salk vaccine. Of these, 189 were paralytic.

The service repeated previous statements that no conclusions can be drawn from these case reports with respect to the efficacy of the vaccine. Upward of 6 1/2 million persons have been given the Salk vaccine since it was licensed April 12.

Oregon Reports 154 Polio Cases

PORTLAND (AP) - The State Board of Health said Wednesday 154 cases of polio had been reported in Oregon this year through last Saturday. That was an increase of 23 over the same period last year.

Of some 46,000 children who received either their first or second shots of Salk anti-polio vaccine, only two were reported stricken. One of these suffered paralysis.

Of the 144,000 first- and second-graders eligible for inoculation, about 98,000 did not get shots. There were 32 polio cases in this group, one of which was fatal and 20 paralytic.

LAKEVIEW - Working on a future National Geographic magazine article which will feature activities of the national forests, Joe Roberts, National Geographic photographer from Washington, D.C., spent the weekend on the Fremont National Forest.

Two activities on the Fremont forest, mining and eradication of tree-damaging porcupines, will be featured from this area in the article. Roberts, accompanied by Lloyd Gilmore and Don Peters, members of the Fremont National Forest staff, spent two days taking colored pictures of porcupines and uranium mines.

Before coming to Lakeview, Roberts shot pictures of power development and use on the Umpqua forest and his next assignment will be pictures of the watershed problems on forests near Redding, California.

United Fund Goal Set

LAKEVIEW - A \$10,508 goal has been set by the Lake County United Fund Budget Committee. A county campaign to raise this money to meet the 1956 budget will start September 10-24 with John McDonald, United Fund chairman, serving as volunteer drive chairman.

This year's goal is \$1,500 less than the amount budgeted last year by the Community Chest, said McDonald. The newly formed United Fund replaces the Community Chest and is governed by a board of 15 directors, nine being appointed by civic organizations and six members at large. The entire board served on the budget committee.

Agencies receiving money from the United Fund are: Red Cross, disaster car, Lakeview High School fund for helping publish the school annual, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, Oregon chest fund, youth center, PTA hot lunch fund and 4-H clubs.

McDonald has named the following chairmen to work in the county during the coming campaign: Raymond Johnson, rural; T. R. Conn, industrial firms and employees; Guy Miller, professional; Carier Fetsch, retail; Jack Pendleton, fraternal, veterans and civic organizations.

W. H. (John) Buell is chairman of the speakers bureau.

Weed Police Report Thefts

WEED - Eleven felony arrests were booked at the Weed police department during the month period July 25 - August 24, reported Weed Police Chief William Skelton. Other arrests included 17 misdemeanors, 43 moving traffic citations, four illegal parking citations and four vehicle accidents investigated by the local police.

The 11 felony arrests included one for failure to provide; one escape; two for grand theft, auto; seven for assisting an escape. Two of the seven arrested for assisting the escape were held for additional charges, one for being drunk in and about an auto and the other for having a loaded gun in his auto.

The misdemeanor arrests were: one for failure to provide; one for being drunk in and about an auto; one for violation of probation; two for failure to pay fines, one of which was arrested on a bench warrant issued out of the Yreka court and the other from the McCloud court; two for assault and battery; three vagrants; four for driving while intoxicated; and four for drunkenness.

A total of 3,516 miles was traveled in the Weed police protection district by the police car during the month period reported.
