CHICAGO — Butchers mainly sold weak to 25 cents lower Friday although a few early sales of 210 to 240 pound offerings were steady. Sows dropped 25 to 50 cents.

Most 210 to 270 pound butchers moved at \$16.25 to \$16.60 but the top was \$16.85, paid for a 49 head lot. Butchers sold 170 to 200 pounds brought \$15.25 to \$16.25. Sows sold from \$12.00 to \$15.75.

Steers and heifers were quoted nominally steady. Odd head of choice and prime steers commanded \$23.00 to \$25.00. A few commercial and good went \$15.00 to \$21.00 and comparable heifers brought \$14.00 to \$19.00. Cows sold steady to 25 cents lower at \$10.00 to \$11.75 for utility to low commercial.

Spring lambs sold steady to strong at \$19.00 to \$22.00 for good to prime. Receipts were 5,000 hogs, 500 cattle, 200 calves and 500 sheep.

CHICAGO GRAIN

CHICAGO — Grains held within narrow price limits on the Board of Trade Friday, showing a slight tendency to ease. Dealings were very quiet.

Hedging pressure had some effect. Demand was limited. Local traders did not want to take a high position in the market over the three-day holiday. The board will be closed Monday, Labor Day.

More Ransom Bills Turn Up

CHICAGO — Three bills from the missing \$303,720 portion of the Greenlease ransom money have been found in Chicago.

Donald Hostetter, FBI chief in Chicago, in announcing this Friday, said the search is continuing and asked the general public to join in the hunt.

It was the largest one-day recovery of currency put up to ransom Bobby Greenlease, who was kidnapped and killed.

Hostetter said the bills have been identified positively.

A woman clerk in the federal reserve bank of Chicago spotted one \$20 bill that was part of the ransom bundle. That started a thorough-going check of \$10 and \$20 bills. Federal reserve bank employees and FBI agents teamed up in the task of checking over the thousands of bills in the bank.

The result was the recovery of two more bills, all of \$20 denomination.

All were retrieved on the same day—Wednesday.

The Chicago recovery was the largest at one time thus far. One \$20 bill was found Aug. 4 in Minot, N. D. Two bills were found this week in the federal reserve bank of St. Louis. Tracing the money has led to a theory that the cash may have been put in circulation by carnival workers.

Instructors Named At OTI

Appointment of a Portland man and a Wyoming man as instructors for 1955-56 school year has been announced by W. D. Purvine, director of Oregon Technical Institute, Raymond R. Wood of Portland comes to the Institute as an instructor of Refrigeration Servicing with a background of six years in the occupation and two years as an instructor for West Coast Trades Institute in that city. Carroll M. Cather of Rock Springs, Wyoming, Machine Shop instructor, has five years experience in the occupation as well as teaching experience. He has completed three summers of college teacher training.

All instructors will return to the campus on September 6 to participate in an orientation program. New student week will open September 19 to 23 with all major courses in operation, regular classes resuming on September 26.

Strange Bone Find Reported

Several months ago H. H. Littleton had a crew of men working on a highway project six miles northeast of Alturas. An alert worker noted some bone fragments embedded in a yellow clay formation about 30 feet down in the cut bank at 25 feet from the nearest road.

The bone fragments were carefully removed and brought to the Forest Service for identification. Since no one here could identify them, they were sent to the University of California for positive classification.

Forest Supervisor Rahm has just been advised that the specimens submitted was the upper end of the shin bone of a camel. University experts stated that bones from camels of a similar size have also been found southeast of Alturas.

Supervisor Rahm states that he has studied the grating regulations and can find no provision for prehistoric camels on national forest ranges. Since none have ever been seen alive, it is difficult to determine their forage needs. If local foresters encounter any such animals on local ranges, Rahm states they will just have to impound them for further study.

On the serious side, the University of California Museum of Paleontology is interested in receiving unidentifiable bone specimens. More positive identification is possible when the head or teeth can be found. Much can be learned regarding the evolution of Modoc County and the surrounding area from such information.

Rail Walkout Postponed

NEW YORK — The CIO Transport Workers Union Friday ordered postponement of a strike of 35,000 nonoperating employees of the Pennsylvania Railroad. The strike had been scheduled for mid-night Friday.

Michael J. Quill, TWU president, declared, however, that the employees might be "reluctant to postpone their decision to strike."

He said the union was notifying the national mediation board that it was directing its locals to postpone the walkout that would have hit 12 states and the District of Columbia.

The postponement directive came after President Eisenhower stepped into the situation by creating an emergency fact-finding board to look into the dispute. Under the Railway Labor Act, this usually postpones strikes for 60 days.

A strike Friday night could have interfered with Labor Day weekend travel of thousands of persons, the union contended. The road could not have run without the maintenance work performed by the nonoperating employees.

The strike action grew out of what the union called an accumulation of grievances dating back six years.

Morse Asks Rehearing

WASHINGTON (UP) — Sen. Wayne Morse (D-Ore) called on Interior Secretary Douglas McKay today to request a rehearing of the Federal Power Commission decision to authorize private power development of Hells Canyon on the Idaho-Oregon border.

In a statement issued through his office, Morse said McKay has four days "to reverse his walkout on the public interest in the Hells Canyon case."

Sept. 6, Morse noted, is the deadline for requesting a rehearing of the FPC decision to license the Idaho Power Co. to develop the Hells Canyon site.

Morse said the FPC decision "clearly means destroying comprehensive natural resources development to serve the monopoly interests of the Idaho Power Co."
