Congressional Action Aids Peron To Crush Opposition

BUENOS AIRES, Argentina. (U.P.)—Congressional approval of a "state of siege" for Buenos Aires today bolstered President Juan Peron's new drive to crush his opposition.
The all-Peronista Senate unanimously passed the bill last night after the Peron-dominated lower house voted it through 109-12 in compliance with Peron's demand for emergency powers to "annihilate" his foes.
Peron was expected to affix his signature today, transforming into law the measure affecting the capital's 3 1/2 million citizens. The whole country was placed under a state of siege for 15 days after the unsuccessful navy revolt against the government June 16. The new restrictions applied only to Buenos Aires, however.
It appeared the chief effect of the measure would be psychological since Peron already had the special powers under a "state of internal war" clamped on the

East Rail Strike May Be Averted

NEW YORK (U.P.)—The CIO Transport Workers Union says it will decide today whether to abide by the spirit of the Railway Labor Act and call off a strike set for midnight tonight of 350,000 non-operating employees against the Pennsylvania Railroad.
A strike by the TWU against the nation's biggest railroad would affect the line's operation in 12 states and the District of Columbia.
In Denver yesterday President Eisenhower created an emergency fact-finding board to look into the dispute. Under the Railway Labor Act this move requires postponement of strike action for 60 days.
The union said the strike action grew from an accumulation of grievances dating back six years. It recently asked for a wage boost and a shorter work week.

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Antarctic May Be Conquered

WASHINGTON (U.P.)—The map who will be chief of staff for history's greatest invasion of the antarctic says man within 25 years will be able to disintegrate polar ice and unlock the secrets of that frozen continent.
Coast Guard Capt. C. W. Thomas forecast that the great ice masses will be conquered through electronics, mechanical abrasion "or even super-sonics" — sound waves inaudible to the human ear.
Rear Adm. George Dufek, commander of the U.S. task force that will head for the antarctic this winter, said man will learn more about the antarctic in the next five years than in the past 100.
The forecasts were made at a symposium conducted last night by the Arctic Institute of North America.

Board Makes Staff Change

The Board of Supervisors of the Klamath Soil Conservation District at their last regular meeting announced a change in the staff of the Soil Conservation Service working with the district.
Don Baldwin has replaced Neil Witting as work unit conservationist. Witting was promoted to economist with the watershed planning unit for the state of Idaho. Baldwin has been ranch planner for the Pee Valley Soil Conservation District with headquarters at Klamath Agency for the past two years.
Before coming to Klamath County he worked for over two years in Walla Walla County with the Soil Conservation Service.
The supervisors also reconfirmed their desire to encourage every farmer in the district to become a district cooperator and conservation farmer. Any farmer or rancher in the district which now includes the southeastern part of the county from Malin and Oleno west and from Algoma south, can get help in planning and applying conservation practices by contacting any one of the supervisors or the district office in the post office building in Klamath Falls.
The present board of supervisors includes chairman Clyde Horsley, Midland; Vice-chairman Jim Flowers, Warden; Sec.-Treasurer John Kerns, Kenos; Verland Huff, Midland; Myron Taylor, Spring Lake; Bob Pettit, Merrill; and Keith Gentry, Malin.
Their next meeting will be September 6 at 8 p.m. in the office on the third floor of the post office, and anyone interested is invited to attend. The regular meeting night is the first Monday of each month and farmers are encouraged to attend.

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Even Though Not Candidate, Eisenhower Will Be Active

DENVER (U.P.)—President Eisenhower was pictured today as most likely to play an active role in the 1956 presidential campaign whether he runs for re-election or not.
Eisenhower aides said privately he is determined to try to guide the Republican party along the "dynamic conservatism" lines he has said it must follow to remain in power.
The President's deep interest in the party's future was pointed up yesterday at the Summer White House announcement that he will confer here Sept. 10 with the Republican chairmen from all 48 states.
They will be accompanied from an earlier Washington meeting by Leonard W. Hall, GOP national chairman. And it is being taken almost for granted that the party leaders will appeal to the President to bid for a second term.
Presidential associates here said Eisenhower is as intensely interested in trying to help the Republicans recapture control of Congress next year as he is in keeping the White House in GOP hands—regardless of whether he is the candidate.
Rep. Richard Simpson of Pennsylvania, chairman of the House Republican Congressional Campaign Committee, plans to attend the Denver meeting.
There is an outside possibility Eisenhower will give the state leaders a clue to his plans. But the general expectation is that he will wait until next spring before announcing whether he will run again.
James C. Hagerty, White House press secretary, said the Denver conference and the earlier Washington session were being arranged to improve GOP campaign techniques, stimulate organizational activity and broaden political action to create greater enthusiasm among party workers.
Meanwhile, the vacationing President continued to take it easy—with official business kept to a minimum.
Last evening he enjoyed getting together at a downtown hotel with a group of men with whom he frequently plays golf at the Augusta National Club in Georgia. He stayed overnight in the hotel's Presidential Suite instead of returning to the home of his mother-in-law Mrs. John S. Doud.
The group planned to golf today at Denver's Cherry Hills Country Club, and to stay on here at the President's guests over the Labor Day weekend.

Wife Peaceful After Squabble

CHICAGO (U.P.)—A housewife who locked her husband out of their home because of a strike has made peace with all concerned, including the president of the local union involved.
Mrs. Esther Quigley 35, appeared in Woman's court yesterday with Nicholas Prete, president of local 1214, CIO United Auto Workers, on charges of disorderly conduct.
She and Prete were arrested last Friday in front of the Harrison Sheet Steel Co. after a disturbance in which she allegedly pushed a carton of milk at Prete and ripped off his shirt.
Earlier this week she had allowed her husband, Andrew, a local union steward, back into their home after a one-week lockout for his participation in the strike. She declared the strike now settled was illegal because the contract had not expired.
In court yesterday Mrs. Quigley's attorney said all had been forgiven. He asked that the charges be dropped.
"The union holds no grudge against Mrs. Quigley," Prete's counsel said.
All charges were dismissed by Judge Erwin J. Hastens.
