BoSox Return To AL Pack

While the Yankees led the other contenders in a chorus of wailing about wasted opportunities, the Boston Red Sox came barging back into the American League pennant picture today at the very beginning of a very long home stand.

The Red Sox were the only ones to gain ground in the big Labor Day baseball battles as they swept a doubleheader from Washington, 10-2 and 7-2, to push within three games of first place.

The twin wins extended the Red Sox' winning streak to five games and gave them seven wins in the last nine games.

Of all the four contenders, the Red Sox will be the only ones at home when, after today's idle day, play resumes in the pennant chase Wednesday. In fact, they will play 16 of their remaining 19 games at home.

Leo Forgives Antonelli For Blowing Stack

NEW YORK (UP) — Manager Leo Durocher has forgiven ace southpaw Johnny Antonelli of the New York Giants for "blowing up" in Saturday's game at Philadelphia, and now Leo hopes the Giant front office will do the same.

Durocher slapped Antonelli with a "suspension" after the pitcher became angry at being taken out of the game against the Phillies. The suspension was lifted yesterday after the two conferred behind closed doors at the Polo Grounds.

Antonelli wasn't supposed to get paid for the time he was suspended, but Durocher said he hopes the Giant paymaster "forgive" about that.

Antonelli, having a poor season after being the club's star last year, was the first player ever suspended by Durocher during his 15 years as a major-league manager. The suspension came when Antonelli walked into the Giant dugout after being removed from the game, criticized Durocher for "mishandling" him, and threatened to take the next train back to New York.

GROSSINGER, N.Y. (UP) — Heavyweight champion Rocky Marciano who defends his title against Archie Moore in New York's Yankee Stadium, Sept. 30, will not box again until Wednesday. The champ did his usual road work early Monday and then took things easy the rest of the day.

NORTH ADAMS, Mass. (UP) — Manager Charley Johnston watched Archie Moore work three rounds Monday and then pronounced him fit for his heavy-weight title bout with champion Rocky Marciano. "He will be in the best shape of his career for this fight," Johnston said.

Jim Bryan Sets New Auto Record

DU QUOIN, Ill. (UP) — Jimmy Bryan, Phoenix, Ariz., set a new record yesterday at the Du Quoin State Fair in the 30-mile Ted Horn Memorial Auto Race.

Bryan's record time was one hour, four minutes and 56 seconds for the 100 lap race. The previous record had been set in 1949 by Tony Bettenhausen, Tinley Park, Illinois who finished in one hour, six minutes and 37.13 seconds.

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College Gridiron Briefs

SEATTLE, Wash. (UP) — Senior quarterback candidate Sandy Lederman turned out for his first real practice session yesterday, when University of Washington Coach Johnny Chisberg said his passing was "as good as ever."

The Huskies spent yesterday integrating new men into the attack and working on new plays for their opener with Idaho on Sept. 17.

PULLMAN, Wash. (UP) — The Washington State Cougars scored nine touchdowns in an intra-squad game yesterday, but Coach Al Kierker complained that his squad "couldn't go a half the way they look."

Two injuries were reported after the workout. Floyd Richmond, sophomore, left his arm spasm, injured ligaments in his left foot, and Dewey Kellum broke a small bone in his right foot. Both men will be out of action for at least several days.

EUGENE, Ore. (UP) — Coach Len Casanova hopes to solve his tackle problems before his season-opener against the Oregon Ducks take the field for their first game of the season.

The coach says Capt. Lon Stiner and Harry Johnson are seasoned veterans, but he's facing a problem of size and experience behind them. Johnson, at 225 pounds, is the biggest man on the team.

CORVALLIS, Ore. (UP) — Two men stood out yesterday as the Oregon State Beavers ran through a 30-minute game-type scrimmage under the watchful eye of Coach Tommy Prothro.

Big John Witte, a two-year letterman tackle who just returned from a hitch in the army, drew words of praise from the coach, who also was encouraging word for Joe Francis, 189-pound sophomore tackle from Honolulu.

MOSCOW, Idaho (UP) — The University of Idaho's 40-man football squad is concentrating on pass offense and pass defense in preparation for their season opener Sept. 17 against the Washington Huskies at Seattle.

Coach Skip Stahley said his team has suffered very few injuries as yet — but he clarified that by explaining, "Actually we have not done anything yet."

STANFORD, CALIF. (UP) — The quarterback situation at Stanford University has Coach Chuck Taylor "very pleased," but injuries have started to play havoc with his receivers.

While Jack Douglas was looking mighty sharp as a signal caller, end Steve Dotson was heading for the sidelines with a badly sprained left ankle and a possible broken toe.

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Center Frank Tinkham was benched yesterday with a pulled leg muscle, and end George Pelonis will miss two weeks with a pulled muscle suffered in last Saturday's practice session.

SAN JOSE, Calif. (UP) — The San Jose State Spartans ploughed through two bruising scrimmage sessions yesterday that featured running by back Don Greco of El Camino J. C., and Willie Sanford of Compton.

Coach Bob Bronzan said tackle Ken Coronado was sidelined with a knee injury, but the seriousness of the casualty was not immediately known.

JACKSON, Calif. (UP) — Coach Jack Myers thinks his 1955 Tiger team will be about the best that ever climbed into a College of Pacific uniform — and he claims that the heat up here hasn't got a thing to do with the prediction.

The coach went one step more and pointed to tackles John Nisby and Gene Cronin as merely "the best on the Coast."

Ford Frick Sets Series Meet For Possible Winners

NEW YORK (UP) — Commissioner Ford Frick will meet with the Major League pennant contenders today to make plans for the 1955 World Series.

Frick invited all clubs in both leagues with "reasonable" pennant hopes to send representatives to his office for the session.

The series is scheduled to open Wednesday, Sept. 28, in the park of the American League pennant winner. After two games in the American League park, the next three will be played in the park of the National League champion. The last two games of the seven-game series, if necessary, would be played in the American League park.

New York, Boston or Cleveland win the tight American League race, there would be no break in the schedule for travel. If Chicago should win, there probably would be an off-day for travel. These travel plans are based on a Brooklyn victory in the National League.

The Dodgers lead second-place Milwaukee by 15 games and the "magic numbers" is three. Any number of Brooklyn victories and Milwaukee defeats adding to three will end the National League race.
