TULELAKE — The 4-H and FFA livestock auction sale Thursday night, which concludes the Tulelake-Butte Valley Fall Fair, will include sale of top place winners named Monday.

The grand champion sheep of the show was a Hampshire raised by Dean Van Norwick, a first year 4-H'er from Tulelake. Reserve grand champion was earned by Steve Mitchell, Tulelake FFA member. In the hog division, Gary Dahle won grand champion and Allen Hurlburt, reserve grand champion. Judging of steers was scheduled for Tuesday and the sale starts Tuesday night at 8 o'clock, (DET).

Monday's activities began with a three-quarter mile parade down Main Street. Winners included the following: Youth organizations: first, Brownies, second, Girl Scouts. Organized children's group: first, Tulelake Recreation Commission. Churches: first, Presbyterian Church, Service clubs: first, Tulelake Growers Association; second, McCloud Drill Team; third, Butte Valley Spurs.
