Grange Asks Water Action

SACRAMENTO (UP)—A plea by State Grange Master George Sehlmeier for development of California's water resources highlighted the seventh day of the 1955 California State Fair and Exposition here Wednesday.

Sehlmeier called for development of water projects while addressing nearly 1000 state Grange members at a noon lunch in Governor's Hall as the fair honored Grange members. Also honored today was the dairy industry, Sixth Army and Red Cross.

Attendance at the fair continued to disappoint officials, despite a return to afternoon temperatures in the low 90s. The mercury had been above the 107-degree mark for the second, third and fourth days of the fair.

However, yesterday's mild temperature brought only 47,395 persons through the gates, 2299 off the record pace set at the 1954 fair. Attendance so far this season was down 46,000.

Attendance also declined at the race track and pari-mutuel wagering slowed down to \$281,022 yesterday, a drop of some \$25,000 from a year ago. However, the pari-mutuel handle for the first five days of the nine-day racing meeting was about even with last year's record high.

Water Board Tells Needs

SACRAMENTO (UP)—The Water Project Authority, highest ranking water agency in California, said Tuesday it would be necessary to develop 5 1/2 million acre feet in new water each season to correct shortages and provide for growth.

In a letter to Frank B. Durkee, director of public works, State Engineer A. D. Edmondson said this amounted to "more than the estimated yield of the authorized Feather River Project."

"In other words," the letter stated, "the large water supply to be gained from the Feather River Project is fully needed today."

The secretary and treasurer will be elected at the next meeting. Leaders of Camp Fire and Bluebird groups will be announced at this meeting.

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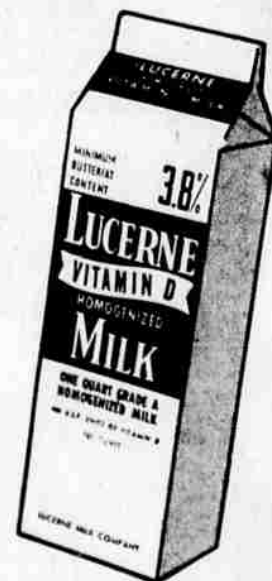
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
