**Japan Professor Hits Jackpot**  
TOKYO (AP) — Hiroshi Sato, Japanese professor of geophysics, rolled in the universities for 30 years at \$100 a month. He wrote a dozen intensely scholarly books. They were read only by other geophysicists — the scientists who study the effect of geography on peoples' domestic and foreign policies. Then the professor cranked out a little potboiler called "Naked Essays." An avid public roostered him to the top of Japan's postwar best seller list. The little book has sold 600,000 copies. "Naked Essays is a collection of Sato's observations on life, including such subjects as the shape of bosoms observed in a public bath house. About half the 80 essays deal with sex. The professor wrote many of the essays for his own amusement. "I simply can't understand it," he says. "I am not a literary man. All my other books flapped."

### Episcopal Church Meeting To Study Change Of Name

HONOLULU (AP)—The 38th General Convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church, having made several moves to soften its attacks on the Roman Catholic Church in South America, today turns its attention to a proposal to change the church's name. The matter normally develops sharp debate, one convention source said. Less than three hours before the Rt. Rev. Egmont M. Kirschke, bishop of southwest Brazil, was to address a foreign mission meeting last night, the church's public relations office announced there would be several revisions in his prepared text because of an unfortunate choice of words which gave a false impression. The revisions deleted all references by name to the Roman Catholic Church and toned down the speech to some extent. One phrase in the prepared text declared "Latin peoples have been nurtured in an extremely debased form of Christianity. They are religiously undemocratized." This was changed to "Latin peoples are religiously un-undemocratized." Another phrase in the prepared text read, "All Latin-American nations have the great majority of their peoples scattered over immense rural areas where the Roman church exploits their illiteracy and credulity in a most sordid way." This was revised to read "... their illiteracy and credulity have been exploited in an appalling way." On Tuesday the Episcopal bishop from Central Brazil, the Rt. Rev. Louis C. Melcher, made several critical references to the Roman Catholic Church in a convention speech. His remarks prompted the Most Rev. John J. Scanlon, Catholic auxiliary bishop of Honolulu, to say the speech was "regrettable, ill becoming and in bad taste." The Rt. Rev. Harry S. Kennedy, Episcopal bishop of Honolulu, also made an effort yesterday to smooth over a ruffled relations with the Catholic Church. He said in a statement: "... I can say that the relationship of the Episcopal Church and the Roman Catholic Church in Hawaii has been most friendly and cordial. We all are grateful for the contribution the Roman Catholic Church has made to the spiritual life of Hawaii."

### Heat Spreads To East U.S.

Hot weather spread eastward, deeper into the Midwest today, after turning the mercury past the 100-degree mark yesterday in parts of Kansas and Nebraska. Omaha had an early morning low of 86 after its sweltering 103 yesterday. The morning low was 21 degrees higher than the reading at the same time yesterday. Temperatures were higher in most of the central and southern sections of the country, with the biggest jumps over the Great Lakes and Missouri Valley. Somewhat cooler air spread over the area from the Rockies westward and from New England to the Carolinas. Los Angeles' string of 100-degree or higher days was ended at eight yesterday when the mercury pushed no higher than 96. A band of light showers and scattered thunderstorms extended from Michigan a westward into Washington and northern Oregon.

## Truman Urges Strong U.S.; Deplores Cuts In Services

CHICAGO (AP)—Former President Harry S. Truman said today the Communist countries seem to be taking a more peaceful course but that America must keep up its guard until it is sure. He decried cuts he said the Eisenhower administration is making in the military establishment. His own administration, he said, began a buildup of the armed forces that "has had much to do with bringing about the attitude of apparent reasonableness on the part of the Communists."

### Re-Enlist Try Ends In Arrest

KANSAS CITY (AP)—Leroy Van Camp tried to re-enlist in the army yesterday and wound up under military guard after he told recruiting officers he had been absent without leave 20 years. Van Camp, in answering routine questions by the recruiters, casually mentioned he quit the Army in 1935 at Ft. Douglas, Utah. "The pay was small," he said. "Only \$21 a month along with room and board. I applied for a dependency discharge because of my wife and two babies. One day they told me my discharge papers had come through and I could pick them up the next day. 'I don't know why I did it, but I decided to pack up that same day and go home. And I did.' Van Camp, 43, was held at nearby Ft. Leavenworth pending a check of his records. Van Camp, a pipefitter's helper, said he decided to re-enlist because "his need good mechanics" and "his conscience had been bothering him recently."

CAMDEN, N. J. (AP)—Illness three times previously had prevented Emma Clott, 37, from getting her final papers to become a citizen. Yesterday she was again scheduled to receive the papers and to take the oath—and once again she was ill. Federal Judge Thomas H. Madden, learning of her plight, went to her home and administered the oath. Mrs. Clott, who came from Rome about 40 years ago, sat through the ceremony grasping a small American flag. She said afterwards "I am so very happy."
