CHICAGO (AP) — An active demand developed for butcher hogs Friday, sending prices 25 to 30 cents higher.

Most 190 to 280 pound butchers sold at \$16.25 to \$16.75, but there were numerous lots above the average. A 52-head lot set the top at \$17.00. Butchers scaling 170 to 190 pounds moved at \$15.50 to \$16.50. A few sows weighing less than 300 pounds reached \$16.00.

Commercial to low choice steers went at \$16.00 to \$22.00. A few commercial and good heifers were taken at \$15.00 to \$22.00. Cows were steady to weak at \$10.25 to \$12.50 for utility and commercial.

Spring lambs were steady at \$19.00 to \$22.25 for good to prime types.

Salable receipts were 5,500 hogs, 500 cattle, 200 calves and 300 sheep.

Red Hat Day Promotions Available

Red Hat Day pledge cards, stickers and buttons are available without charge at local sporting goods stores and other locations in Klamath Falls, it was announced this week.

The promotion, sponsored by 26 statewide organizations concerned with landowner-sportsman relations, was formulated in the Portland chapter of the Isaac Walton League of America and first announced in Klamath Falls at a meeting of the board of directors of Klamath County Chamber of Commerce by Kenneth McLeod, Jr., organization is headed by a committee appointed by Governor Paul Patterson. Virgil Davis is Klamath County chairman.

Climax of the campaign will be Red Hat Day, September 23, eight days ahead of the opening of the general deer hunting season. On Friday, September 23, Oregon sportsmen will be asked to wear a red hat or a Red Hat Day button.

The fire, stickers are not to be used on a deer's head or car window, according to State Police Sgt. E. W. Tichenor. The law is specific regarding the use of stickers in that only official notices, such as non-resident permits or temporary licenses, are allowed to be placed on a motor vehicle.

The stickers may be used on business or home windows, but not on automobiles.

In connection with the Red Hat Day promotion, Klamath Sportsmen's Association members are planning a Red Hat dance. Because of previous reservations at the armory, the dance will be held the evening of Saturday, September 17, a week in advance of Red Hat Day.

Free tickets for two admissions to the dance will be mailed by the secretary of the association to each owner of hunting land who will allow hunting on his property during the coming season. The association is requesting that "No Hunting" signs be replaced by signs reading: "Hunting by Permission."

threatened Yreka's 3500 residents, reinforcements to the Yreka fire crews was expected today with the arrival of 800 soldiers of the 23rd Infantry Regiment which left Fort Lewis, Wash., by motor convoy today.

Gusty winds up to 30 miles an hour, meanwhile, sent a High Sierra forest fire raging again in the Fresno area. The fire, roaring through the Converter Basin and destroying all young Redwoods in its path, threatened to destroy the Bolle tree, the third largest in the world.

BIG TREE ENDANGERED
 The 200-foot tree is about five miles north of Grant Grove, which was threatened earlier in the week. In the Santa Barbara area, a force of 1500 men fought circling flames of Southern California's worst coastal brush fire to prevent its reaching the rich Santa Ynez Valley. Control of the fire now in its fourth day, depended mainly upon wind conditions. They were favorable today. The fire has scarred between 65,000 to 70,000 acres, but control appeared to be in sight.

KF Grand Jury Order Frees Suspects In Haircut Death

Two Chiloquin residents—Leon Gale Pearson and Melvin Chiloquin—held in the county jail four months in connection with the "haircut death" of John Madrueno, 25-year-old railroad worker, were free Friday.

The Klamath County Grand Jury, which twice indicted them for complicity in the alleged killing, refused to return a true bill when the case was submitted for the third time.

When the jury reported Thursday evening to Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg with seven other indictments, District Attorney Richard Beesley moved for dismissal of the second indictment against Pearson and Chiloquin, which was held in abeyance pending the third probe of the case by the grand jury.

Judge Vandenberg complied with the district attorney's request and ordered Pearson and Chiloquin released immediately from the county jail.

The two men were first indicted on manslaughter charges at the request of former District Attorney

Frank Alderson. After that indictment was returned, Alderson petitioned the court for dismissal because he said the wrong charge had been placed against the two men.

Then the grand jury returned an indictment charging the defendants with assault with a dangerous weapon.

Subsequently, Alderson resigned as district attorney. When Beesley assumed the county prosecutor post he concluded that there was not sufficient facts to constitute a crime in the Pearson-Chiloquin second indictment. He asked Judge Vandenberg to resubmit the case to the grand jury. He did not, however, ask that the second indictment be dismissed until the grand jury refused to return a third true bill.

Pearson and Chiloquin were arrested a short time after Madrueno's nude and frozen body was found in a snowbank at the Pat Jackson ranch near Chiloquin Junction last February. The victim's hair had been clipped to the skull. Officers said he also had been severely beaten.

Among those indicted by the grand jury Thursday was Marcelus Norwest, 26, Sprague River, for second degree murder. He is alleged to have shot Jackie Jones, 25, former divinity student, during a quarrel over a case of beer.

When Norwest's attorney, Joseph Stearns of Portland, was unable to appear Friday morning, arraignment of the alleged slayer was postponed until September 13.

Others indicted: James George Woods, assault with a dangerous weapon; Ulysses Ford, two counts of forgery; Delbert Stewart, burglary; Lynell (Sundown) Lockett, burglary; and Bruce Waterbury, non-support.

At the request of his attorney, H. C. Merryman, the arraignment of Waterbury was postponed until September 13. All other defendants were allowed until that date to plead to the charges against them.

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Mrs. Eva Short Death Learned

Mrs. Eva Short, a member of a pioneer Klamath Basin family and a resident here for 25 years, died this morning in Hillsdale Hospital.

A native of Argentina, Mrs. Short was the widow of Floyd Short who died in 1934, one month after their son, Billy, was killed in an air crash in Arizona.

She recently had lived on and

operated the large ranch which had been owned by her late husband on the Merrill Highway about seven miles from Klamath Falls. She was 49 years old.

Surviving is a sister, Mrs. Fred Olin, Klamath Falls, and four brothers, Pete Schaffer, Portland, Charles Schaffer, Milwaukee, John Schaffer, Eugene, and Joe Schaffer, Salem.

Funeral services will be conducted Monday from the Mt. Laki Community Church with the Rev. William Ainley officiating.

Interment will follow at Klamath Memorial Park.

Arrangements are being handled by O'Hair's Memorial Chapel.

Jackie Fenimore Funeral Planned

Funeral services for Jackie Eugene Fenimore, 22, who died in an automobile accident near here September 5, will be conducted from the chapel of Ward's Klamath Funeral Home, Saturday, September 10, at 10:30 a.m.

Officiating will be the Rev. Dallas McNeil of the First Methodist Church.

Pelican Post 1383, VFW, will be in charge of military honors at graveside services in Klamath Memorial Park.

FLOOD DEATHS

TAIPEI, Formosa (AP) — A horrid flood Thursday saw a torrent of water from a crumbling reservoir embankment sweep away her home and carry two of her four children to their deaths, Mrs. Pai Ming-tung, 37, an expectant mother, tried in vain to save a young daughter and son. She was knocked unconscious by the debris and critically injured.

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Wesley Weston Funeral Planned

Wesley William Weston, 41-year-old logger, who perished in the Round Butte forest fire near Bly, will be buried in Kalispell, Montana.

Weston's body was removed from the charred woods Thursday by Deputy County Coroner Bill Mills and Sheriff Murray Britton. He was trapped on a fire line and suffocated, according to the coroner's report. The body was taken to Ward's Klamath Funeral Home.

Weston is survived by his widow, Lela Belle, daughters, Sherry and Beulah, sons, Kenneth and Billy, all of Henley; parents
