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Bigger Fair Crowds Seen

SACRAMENTO (UP) — A three-day weekend and mild temperatures practically assured officials of the California State Fair and Exposition today that the dwindling attendance trend would be reversed for the last three days of the 1955 show.

It was Admission Day at the fair and flocks of state employees were expected to use the holiday to crowd the fairgrounds. Until today, attendance at this fair has sagged 72,187 below last year's record mark. Fair officials noted that Admission Day fell on the eighth day of the fair last year, instead of the ninth, accounting for the 20,608 drop in yesterday's crowd.

This also was Shrine Day at the fair, with special activities including the running of the Shrine Day Purse as the 10th of 12 races in the afternoon. The shriners were to have a 4 p.m. dinner in Governor's Hall, followed by a colorful parade through the fairgrounds and before the grandstand before tonight's musical spectacular.

Trinity and Contra Costa counties, Mount Diablo and the Lodi Grape Festival also had this day set aside for them. There was a Lodi Grape Festival parade scheduled for the afternoon races and the festival queen, Alyce Bauer.

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
