## Rain Maker Claim Made

YREKA — The Siskiyou County Board of Supervisors Tuesday heard a report that the current lightning - caused forest fire which threatened Yreka could have been avoided if a weather modification program had been carried out in the county.

A. C. Stone, representative of a weather modification firm, made this statement at the board meeting when listing some of the benefits the county would gain from a rainmaking program.

Several farmers in the county have been promoting a rainmaking project in Shasta Valley.

Stone told the board that a weather modification program would have changed atmospheric conditions to the point where the dry thunderstorms which caused the fires would never have occurred.

He advocated the use of ground silver iodide generators, and said that his firm has been able to increase rainfall up to 80 per cent in areas where it has set up its generators.

The county cattlemen's association made the selection, and presented Hayden with a hat as a gift.

Hayden received the gift at the luncheon held at the Orio Davis ranch, which was attended by 75 members of the association.

Prior to the luncheon, the group toured the F. N. Giger ranch near Granada and the E. E. Hart ranch of Little Shasta.

Following the luncheon, the group named its officers for the coming year. Elected to office were Blair Smith of Hill, president; G. C. Barnes of Etna, secretary; E. L. Foulke of Gazette, state director; Malcolm Hayden of Etna, Ed Hart of Little Shasta, Niel Hart of Granada, Clarence Dudley of Callahan and Jack Wilson of Edgewood, member of the board of directors.

Born and raised in Callahan, Hayden first started working with beef cattle when he was 19 years of age. He built up his cattle and holdings into one of the largest ranches in the county. He has held local and state offices in the Farm Bureau, the Cattlemen's Association and has served with numerous other civic organizations.

## Shasta Road Building Starts Soon

YREKA — Preliminary work on the Everett Memorial Highway, which will run from Mount Shasta City for 14 miles up the slope of Mt. Shasta to Panther Meadows, will get under way this year, State Senator Randolph Collier (R-Yreka) reported today.

Collier, who attended a meeting with the Forest Highway Committee and representatives of the Siskiyou County Board of Supervisors, said that the groups had come to an understanding on the financing and maintenance of the road.

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The county has agreed to spend \$60,000 on the lower portion of the road, which begins at the Mount Shasta High School.

Supervisors attending the meeting were Clint Jackson (Edgewood, W. A. Barr (Mount Shasta) and Don Avery (Etna). The Forest Highway Committee is made up of representatives of the State Division of Highways, the U.S. Bureau of Public Roads and the U.S. Forest Service.

Once the road is completed, it is felt in Siskiyou County that Mt. Shasta will become a year round recreation spot. A ski lift, which will be operated in the summer as a scenic ride is in the planning stage.

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## Dunsmuir Tax Rate Set

DUNSMUIR — Dunsmuir city council Thursday night set a tax rate totaling \$1.18 per \$100 assessed valuation, the same as last year.

The general tax is \$1, with parks, music and advertising at 5 cents and a special fire department tax of 13 cents.

The council also authorized hiring of another police officer at \$275 a month to act as relief man, poundmaster and radio man.

Albert O. Jordan, constable of the Dunsmuir judicial district, was denied permission by Police Commissioner Richard Renouf to deputize city police officers to assist him in his duties.

Members of the recreation commission were invited to discuss with the council the operation of the ball park and city park, which are under lease to the commission. The council requested the commission to make an estimate of improving the water supply and lights in the picnic area of the city park. The council felt that a portion of the 5 cent levy could be used to help finance these projects.

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The auxiliary will sponsor a Blue Bird group again this year, with Marjorie Hodges as representative.

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## Henley District Ranch Land Sold

Sale of the former McClay ranch eight miles from Klamath Falls and one mile off the Merrill Highway was made last week, it was learned Saturday.

Mr. and Mrs. Carl Lane, who have owned the 105-acre ranch for the last seven years, sold it for about \$55,000 to William S. Mettler and Gladys M. Mettler.

Mettler is associated with the Mettler Brothers Lumber Co. on South Sixth Street.

The Lanes will continue to take crops off the land until December, Lane said.

The Lanes used the Henley district land to raise potatoes, grain and alfalfa.

Realtor Al Schmeck handled details of the sale.
