

NUPTIAL VOWS EXCHANGED IN CATHOLIC CHURCH

KLAMATH AGENCY — In an impressive Nuptial Mass Saturday morning, August 27, Jacqueline Ann Shorey, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George Shorey, became the bride of Robert Jett Llewellyn, son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles L. Duke, San Francisco.

The 10 o'clock service was read in Our Lady of Mt. Carmel Catholic Church, Chiloquin, by the Rev. John C. Gaffney, Los Angeles, before an altar banked with arrangements of white gladioli and chrysanthemums.

The bride, escorted by her father, wore a gown of white lace and

net over satin. The snug bodice of lace was designed with an oval neckline and fitted sleeves which buttoned from the pointed wrists to the elbow. The skirt was made with a shepherds effect in lace with a wide gathered ruffle of net tapering into a full train over satin.

A medieval period crown of seed pearl encrusted inverted veils held her fingertip veil of net. Her bouquet of lilies-of-the-valley, centered with a white orchid, was carried atop a white prayer book. The "new, old borrowed and blue" were her gown, an old sixpence, a strand of pearls belonging to the bridegroom's mother, and a blue garter.
