Paralyzed Man Weds Sweetheart

GRAND RAPIDS, Mich. — Carl Metzger, 29, paralyzed two months ago when he broke his neck in a swimming accident, married his 18-year-old sweetheart Marilyn Phelps from his bed in Butterworth Hospital.

Metzger was wheeled into the hospital chapel for the ceremony. A boutonniere was pinned to the white sheet that covered him. Doctors have told Metzger his injuries may be permanent. He can move only his arms.

Some 30 persons attended the wedding ceremony. Cake and ice cream was served at a small reception. Mrs. Metzger served her husband coffee through a straw.

"Everyone says I'm brave," the bride said. "But I know we can work things out. I'm so happy I don't know what to say."

"I'm getting a wonderful wife," Metzger said. "She has stuck by me. I love her."

During the afternoon wheat became quite popular, wiping out losses and running up for gains extending to around 2 cents. Corn and oats had a slightly weaker undertone, but never lost much ground.

Wheat closed 1 1/4 to 2 cents higher, September \$1.97 1/2-3/4, corn 1/2 lower to 1/4 higher, September \$1.27 1/2, oats unchanged to 1/4 lower, September 57 1/2 to 1 cent higher, September 6 1/2, soybeans 1 1/4 higher, September \$2.22 1/2-22 and 18 cents a hundred pounds lower to 5 cents a hundred pounds higher, September \$10.17-10.20.

MOSCOW (U.S.D.A.) — Sen. Milton R. Young (R-Id.) said Monday Communist party chief Nikita Khrushchev told a group of visiting senators U.S.-Soviet trade relations are "not only possible but desirable."

Khrushchev made his statement at an unprecedented reception for the American legislators at the Kremlin where he and Premier Nikolai Bulganin were their hosts for an hour and 45 minutes.

Young said he introduced the subject of trade while discussing agriculture with Khrushchev. "I asked him (Khrushchev) if he thought it possible for the United States and the Soviet Union to engage in an exchange of agricultural goods," Young said.

"Then the discussion widened to include the possible exchange of other goods," Khrushchev said. It was not only possible but desirable to establish trade relations. He also told us that the ban on trade with Russia had helped the nation develop its own industry.

Sen. Dvorshak (R-Idaho) said the Russian leaders made it clear at the confab that they felt an exchange of trade with the United States was not vital to them but by such trade they could engender good political relations.

Other senators who met with the Soviet leaders were Estes Kefauver (D-Tenn.), J. Allen Prewar (D-Id.) and George W. Malone (R-New).

The same five men, here on an unofficial tour, Sunday were the first American legislators ever permitted to see the new Soviet atomic power station near Moscow.

"They showed us the whole thing," Kefauver said. "They have built a good reactor. I have seen the installations at Oak Ridge and this compares favorably."

Chevrolet Leads In Sales Race

DETROIT (U.S.D.A.) — Chevrolet is continuing to expand its lead over Ford in new car registrations.

Figures tabulated for this year's first seven months showed the big General Motors division registered 905,912 new passenger units throughout the United States in this year's January-July period compared with Ford's 884,300 Ford passenger cars.

Ford led through most of this year until figures were tabulated through June.

The January-July figures also show Buick holding tightly to third place in new car sales with 446,441 registrations against Plymouth's 402,209.

The newest figures were published Monday by the trade paper Automotive News. The paper also reported an increase in used car stocks held by franchised new car dealers. It said a survey showed the dealers were holding an average of nearly 30-days' supply. "Not since last spring," the paper said, "have used car stocks been that heavy."

Happy US Relatives Gather To Greet Freed Prisoners

HONG KONG (U.S.D.A.) — Jubilant relatives began collecting in this British crown colony today to await arrival of 10 American civilians whose quick release has been promised by Red China.

It was not known just when the 10 would cross the border into Hong Kong, but a Peiping radio

broadcast indicated they may already be heading for freedom.

When their release was decided, three of the Americans were believed to be in Peiping, three in Fochung, two in Canton, one in Chungking and one in Shanghai. Since all were expected to cross the border together, they would have to meet at some assembly point — probably Canton — for the train trip to Hong Kong.

Mrs. Sue Bul, who arrived here from Taipei, said she "had not been able to sleep a wink" since hearing that her husband Lawrence was among the 10.

Mildred Lovegren, daughter of the Rev. Levi O. Lovegren, said she was "all aglow" when she received a telegram yesterday from her father dated Chungking, which read, "Expect me very soon."

Lovegren's wife also was awaiting his arrival. She and Mildred have lived in Hong Kong for the past three years, doing missionary work among refugees.

Other relatives waited back in the States for the prisoners to return.

In Yonkers, N.Y., Mrs. Adele Austin Ricketts, herself a prisoner in Red China for three years, expressed happiness that her husband Walter is among the 10. She said she recently had a "long letter" from her husband and that he "seemed fine."

The 35-year-old graduate student, who praised the Reds when she was freed last February and was described by U.S. officials as "thoroughly brainwashed," said, "I made the comments then and still have the same feeling."

Negotiations at Geneva between representatives of the United States and Red China involved about 41 Americans in all.

The Chinese first announced that 12 Americans against whom no formal charges had been placed were free to leave when they chose. Then they announced that 10 others in prison or under house arrest would be let go in a few days.

A joint U.S.-Red Chinese announcement said machinery had been established so the other 19 could "expediently exercise their right" to go home. A source in Geneva said the Communists had declared their willingness to release all the American civilians "in due course."

The Communists' official New China News Agency said today the decision to release the 10 was made in consideration of their offenses and their "fairly good" behavior while in prison.
