

Light Plane Hunt Launched

LAKEPORT (UPI)—Search was started in the Pillsbury Lake area today for a light plane with four men aboard which touched down briefly at a forest airstrip then took off in the direction of Smoke Canyon and has been sighted since.

The Forest Service, which maintains the Gravelly Point airstrip at Pillsbury Lake, said the pilot of the plane was Paul Johns of Portland. No information was available immediately on the names of the three passengers with him.

Johns had flown the light Libby plane from Buchanan Field Concord yesterday. He touched down about 5 p.m. on the strip at Pillsbury Lake, but apparently he could not make a successful landing and took off immediately.

The Air Rescue Group was using one plane from Hamilton Force base to make an air search for the missing plane, and Civil Air Patrol also was expected to join the hunt while forest men went into the area from the land.

Oregon Freight Car Probe Asked

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. Morris Gore (D-Ore.) has joined Sen. Neuberger (D-Ore.) in asking the Interstate Commerce Commission to investigate Oregon's freight car shortage.

In a letter to the ICC, Gore said he had received information indicating the shortage was most acute in areas where the Southern Pacific Railroad provides the only transportation.

He also said that SP had been accused of favoring California shippers.

"If the Southern Pacific is in a discriminating position against Oregon in the distribution of freight cars," wrote Gore, "it is a practice that cannot be endorsed much longer by Oregon lumber producers in the majority of small business."

The senator said the ICC should investigate the entire freight car situation, including the fair program, and that there should be a re-appraisal of the freight transportation item.

Forblad Defends GOP Leadership

NEWPORT, Ore. (AP)—Republican (R-Ore.) told a political rally here Saturday night that the publican Party, under President Eisenhower's leadership, had lived up to the slogan of "everything running but the guns."

Chrysler Unveils New '56 Models At Press Preview

DETROIT (AP)—Chrysler Corp.'s 1956 model cars, introducing push-button automatic drive control, numerous new safety features and concept were displayed at a press preview Monday.

As the new cars were introduced, Chrysler president L. L. Colbert said the record number sold so far this year is not a temporary phenomenon; that there is "every reason to expect a continued high level of demand."

The showing, at Chrysler's proving grounds at Chelsea, west of here, disclosed that Chrysler, like other car makers, has been carrying on extensive safety tests.

In these tests, particular emphasis has been given to a new type door latch, designed to prevent doors from popping open in any but most unusual crashes. Chrysler calls them "life guard"

latches. They will be standard on all Chrysler Corp. cars.

The push button drive, to be standard on all Plymouth, DeSoto, Dodge, Chrysler and Imperial models equipped with automatic transmissions, will be controlled from the instrument panel, left of the steering wheel. The selector unit consists of buttons for neutral, low, drive and reverse which are illuminated for night driving.

Chrysler emphasizes that the left-of-the-wheel installation keeps the buttons out of reach of children. It noted also that shifting with the new device is as gentle as operating a pushbutton radio.

Linkage between the control and transmission consists of a single armored cable. Actuation of the various gears is accomplished when the cable moves varying distances as the pushbuttons are depressed.

The device is designed so the engine cannot be started in any gear except neutral. Another built-in safety factor prevents the transmission from accidentally being shifted into reverse at speeds above 10 miles an hour.

Offered as optional equipment are safety seat belts and a newly designed vacuum-operated brake as they sneaked onto the west coast of North Korea.

Chrysler calls the new body styling concept "flight-a-we-e-p."

Rear fenders and quarter panels feature the fin treatment. Tail-light units, integrated into the fins, carrying out the aircraft motif evident in the over-all styling.

New high-swept fenders emphasize the low silhouette of all five lines of Chrysler Corp. cars.

Four-door hardtop models will be offered in all lines, along with advances in engines that will pre-

sent higher output and increased compression ratios. Also incorporated into the new model design are new 12-volt electrical systems.

A major optional installation for 1956 models is a "Highway Hi-Fi" record player, developed for all five Chrysler lines by CBS Laboratories.

Some specific details of the new cars, especially power output and compression ratios were withheld

for later announcement separately by each of the divisions. These announcements are expected to start next week with public introductions of the new cars set for some time in October.

Prices of the new cars also are being withheld until the public introductions.
