Klamath Camp Fire Council Plans Membership March

A multitude of new members, men and women, young and old, is the goal of the Klamath Council Camp Fire Girls who launched their annual fall membership march this week.

The all-out campaign for girls members and adult volunteers will continue through November 30, Executive Director Naomi French, revealed today.

"Be Friendly - Make Friends - Join the Camp Fire Girls!" is the theme of the nation-wide drive which aims at recruiting enough adult workers to extend the program to hundreds of girls eager to swell the ranks of Camp Fire.

"We can promise sound returns from each investment in the Camp Fire Girls," Mrs. French said this morning. "The future of our community and our country will be in better hands because of the training for citizenship and leadership given these girls today."

"The scope of their activities, of course, depends on the number of men and women willing to give of their time and talents to Camp Fire," she added. "Here in the Klamath Basin we have been most fortunate in having the continued loyalty and support of outstanding citizens. But more are needed as the 'bumper crop' of school children reach Camp Fire age."

Mrs. French added that there is a wide variety of capacities in which volunteers can serve Camp Fire Girls. Women are needed as group leaders and as experts on homemaking activities, while men can contribute their special skills as sponsors and committeemen. Both can give service as members of the local council. Training is now being offered to new and experienced adults in Camp Fire and will continue through October.

In addition to citizenship programs in honor of the year's members are continuing their camping, handicraft and homemaking activities. Camp Fire's program of fun and friendship prizes itself on offering interests for all ages. Three age groups are served by the organization—Blue Birds (7 to 10), Camp Fire girls (10 to 15) and Horizon Club members on the high school level.
