

Eugene Next Stop For Pels

Jimenez Lost To KF Squad

Blue chips will be laid on the table Friday night at Eugene's Civic Stadium as the Klamath Falls Pelicans face the home-standing Eugene High Axemen in a non-conference prep gridiron battle.

Game time is 8 o'clock.

Last week the Pelicans of John McGinnis found the going easy as they steamrolled the "unorganized" Grant Generals of Portland 27-6, while the Axemen stumbled before the strong Corvallis Spartans 14-9. The Eugene eleven will be a stiff test as to telling what caliber of football the Pels can be expected to produce this season.

Coach Loyd Amick's Axemen will probably open against the Pels with 10 lettermen, and one non-letter winner when the first kickoff is signaled by the referee. The only non-letterman that seems to have a starting berth lined up is junior end Don Lawrence, one of Eugene's stellar baseball prospects, who scales around the 170-pound mark.

The opening backfield for the Eugene squad will find quarterback Ed Bennett, a one year letterman at 185 pounds, Curt Bryant and Roger Peter, both single monogram winners at 152 and 185 respectively, covering the halfback chores, and Dave Powell at fullback. Powell, a 180-pound two year letterman, is the big name as far as the Axemen's offense is concerned. In last week's game against Corvallis, Powell rambled for the lone Eugene score on a 50-yard faunt. The line-busting fullback is another top flight diamond prospect in the spring, but during the fall months his talents at line busting take the spotlight away from diamond play.

GRIDERS

In the front wall for the Axemen, Amick will have no "over-sized" griders, 220-pounds or better, as the six other starters besides Lawrence will range from 180 to 200 pounds. At the end spots will be Lawrence and Craig Bushman, a 170-pound center letterman. The tackles slated for front line duty are John Willner and Cliff Allen, 200 and 185 respectively and one year lettermen, while Ron Turner and John Gustafson are down for opening guard positions. Turner is a 190-pound senior and Gustafson a 185-pound fourth year student. The center spot will be given to another single letter winner, Galen Shoreck at 180 pounds.

Other possible last minute changes in the Eugene starting unit may find Don Tenbrook at guard, Bill Muhr at quarterback and Mel Olson, a reserve quarterback last year, at halfback.

Powell, Bennett and Shoreck are all returning starters from last year's Axemen squad which placed second in their league behind the co-state champion Marshfield team. There were 14 lettermen to greet Amick this year.

For the Pels, who will go into the Eugene contest without their captain and leading lineman, and possibly two backs, things could be very dark by the time the final horn sounds tomorrow night.

REPLACEMENT

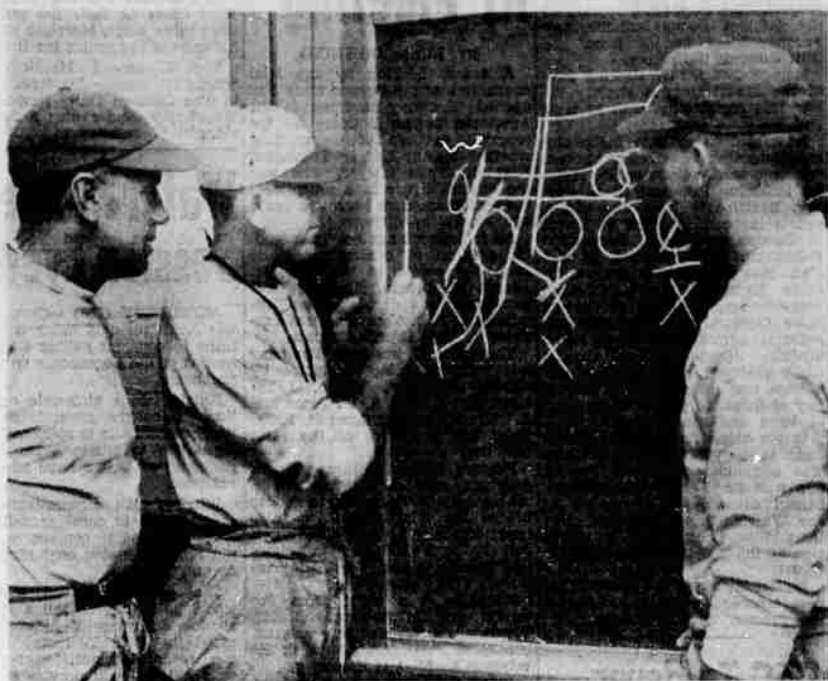
McGinnis will be meeting the Axemen without Modesto "Mighty Mo" Jimenez, a two-year letterman guard and the team's leader. Jimenez suffered a knee injury against Grant last Saturday evening and will be lost to the Pels for two weeks and possibly more depending upon how fast the injury heals. To add to this problem, the Klamath coaching staff may have to find replacements for quarterback Donn Taucher and halfback Dave Pepple, who are also on the injured list, but not as bad as Jimenez.

Taucher also suffered a knee injury, but doctors say the Pelican senior may be ready for tomorrow evening's slate. Pepple has been nursing a sore shoulder the past few days, but McGinnis said this morning he is expecting Dave to be ready and in top shape for the tough Axemen.

At Siegner, a junior non-letterman who played an outstanding game last week against the Generals, will probably get the call to fill the empty spot left by Jimenez. Should Taucher fail to make the Eugene battle, Buch Kimpson will probably draw the starting nod. Tom Ferrell or Joe Linman may see plenty of action if Pepple is on the outside looking in.

Other starting positions will probably be filled by ends Larry Heaton and Bill Badorek, tackles Bob Harshbarger and Jim McGee, guards Roy Ropp and Siegner and center Cal Tichenor. The fullback post seems to be the spot for Dave Leeling, while Lee McGill will handle the halfback chores with Pepple or who ever draws the starting call.

This will be the thirteenth meeting of the two schools since the rivalry began in 1934. Klamath has won five, lost seven and one game closed in a scoreless deadlock. Last year Klamath picked up a 26-19 triumph on Modoc Field. The 1953 game went to the Axemen 19-13.

'Names' Capture Golf Wins

RICHMOND, Va. (AP)—The peculiar pattern of the 55th National Amateur Golf Championship carried down to the last 16 players with an odd assortment of names and nobodies struggling through two more rounds today for a place in the semifinals.

The 16 players who survived yesterday's double round, when strength of legs counted almost as much as skill and stoutness of heart, included five players—two of them Walker Cup stars—whose names are quite familiar to golf followers, a couple of spring-legged 19-year-old college kids who never seem to tire and an assortment of club golfers, little known outside their own local territory.

It's quite a thing for the weekend golfer to get as far as the fifth round of the National Amateur and only one of the 16 still in there has made it before. The one is portly, cheerful Jimmy McHale, who made it in 1949.

"NAMES"

The other surviving "names" are Joe Conrad, the wiry little Texan who won the British Amateur title last spring; favorite Harvey Ward, the 1953 British Amateur champion who never before has passed the 67½-yard James River course of the Country Club of Virginia could be had.

Hollywood Tops Los Angeles In 7-5 In PCL Game

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The Hollywood Stars are close to winning third place in the Pacific Coast League standing and the city championship as well.

They won their second straight from Los Angeles Wednesday night in their playoff series and need only one more victory for the larger share of the gate receipts of the post-season series. Trailing by a 5-4 score in the ninth, the Stars put over three runs after two were out, winning by a 7-5 score.

Don Correlia, rookie southpaw, got credit for the win in relief, but Joe Trimble was called in to work the last of the ninth and retired the side in order. Turk Lown was the loser.

Senators Top Tribe

Ray Narleski, Cleveland's fireballing fireman, finally made a slip—and with it, the Indians may have lost their footing in the race for the American League pennant.

Washington revived the Indian sign it's had on the Indians for one parting shot last night, handing the 26-year-old right-hander his first defeat of the season while dumping the Tribe 3-2.

That sliced Cleveland's lead to one game over New York, a 6-4 winner against Detroit. More important, it left the two clubs even in the lost column with eight games remaining for Cleveland and 10 for New York.

The White Sox, four games behind, muffed a chance to move closer by splitting a double-header at Baltimore. The last-place Orioles won the opener 8-2 before being stopped by Billy Pierce 6-0.

Boston, filling seven of New York's remaining dates, all but faded away in a 7-3 defeat by Kansas City that left the Red Sox seven games back.

Washington, only club to beat Cleveland over the season (13-9), was stopped cold by Narleski in the seventh after chasing starter Herb Score with three straight singles that tied it 3-3. But in the eighth, the Nats finally got to the guy who had run up nine victories, all but one in relief, and had saved 30 others for the Tribe.

Jose Valdivielso, a .225 hitter, did it with a double after Pete Runnels had opened with a single and moved up on a sacrifice.

In the second inning, Roy Sievers had become Score's 238th strikeout victim, a major league record for a rookie. Score working with two days' rest, wound up with nine for a total of 235. Grover Cleveland Alexander held the old mark, whiffing 227 with the Philadelphia Phils in 1911. Alexander set it in 367 innings. Score, a 22-year-old southpaw, broke it in 214.

Detroit scored twice in the first, but New York came back with three off Ned Garver in its half to take charge. Don Larsen, winning his eighth on a five-hitter, then blanked the Tigers 'til the ninth, when Charley Maxwell hit a two-run homer. Gil McDougald homered in the first and tripled home another run in the second.

Hank Bauer delivered the winning blow, a two-run homer in eight off Babe Birrer, third pitcher for the Tigers.

Baltimore racked Chicago's Dick Donovan for 10 of 14 hits while Jim Wilson shut out the Sox until the ninth when Bob Kennedy homered with one on. In the nightcap, a scratch run broke up a duel between Pierce and Bill Wright in the fifth. Three more runs in the eighth wrapped up Pierce's 13th victory and fifth shutout.

Boston was walloped by Gus Zernial, who powered two homers—one a tie-breaking grand-slammer off loser George Saxe in the eighth—for six runs batted in.
