German Drug Relieves Cancer

MINNEAPOLIS (AP)—A German-developed drug is bringing remarkable relief from pain and general improvement in men with cancer of the prostate gland, the American Chemical Society was told today.

It is practically specific for tumors of the prostate, a common type in men, said Walter J. Praloga, Ph.D., Jabay Mubain, M.D., and J. N. Taylor, M.D., of Ohio State University.

German investigators have reported successful control of prostatic cancer with the drug, diethylstilbestrol diphosphate.

The Ohio team tested it on 13 men and found it "produced remarkable relief of pain and other symptoms in a few days." But there have been no signs yet, visible through X-rays, of improvement in areas of bones affected by the spread of the cancer, they said.

The men were treated in a hospital for three weeks then maintained on one to two injections a week. None has suffered from nausea or from feminization, which

Stubborn Jaywalker Relents, Pays Fine

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Mrs. Guisela Eickman, 60, who went to jail rather than sign a jaywalking ticket, police officers gave her last Tuesday, has changed her mind.

She pleaded guilty yesterday to the traffic citation. She had been accused not only of the traffic violation but of resisting officers.

Municipal Judge P. Ray Bennett fined her \$25 with the alternative of five days in jail, then suspended all but \$2 of the fine, which she paid.

CAA To Begin Crash Probe

LAKE PILLSBURY (UP)—Officials of the Civil Aeronautics Authority began an investigation today into the crash of a private plane that brought death to four young people in rugged Smokehouse Canyon.

The wreckage was found yesterday morning by a Forest Service ground party after three days of intensive air search had failed to spot the four-place plane in the dense woods.

Killed in the crash were Beverly Case, 22, recent University of California graduate and daughter of Frank H. Case, New York executive of the American Telephone & Telegraph Co.; Paul M. Johns, 27, a San Francisco insurance agent; Charles Lee, 28, Pittsburg, auto dealer; and Carol Hore, 22, daughter of a San Rafael lumberman.

The four, all licensed pilots, rented the plane Sunday afternoon at Concord for a two-hour flight to Gravelly Valley Airport here.

Witnesses said the plane, a Luscombe sedan, arrived here shortly after 5 p.m. Sunday, made a lopsided, bounding landing attempt, then tumbled back into the air and disappeared in the direction of Smokehouse Canyon.

Authorities said the pilot, believed to be Johns, apparently stalled the plane as he attempted to climb in an effort to circle back for a landing.

Eisenhower Predicts Revolt 'Of Old Men' In Employment

WASHINGTON (AP)—"We are going to have a revolution of old men," a visitor in Denver remarked the other day, "and I am going to be in it."

The speaker was President Eisenhower. Although he was half joking it was the second time in a week the President had referred publicly to the growing employment problem among older folks.

Irish Make Peace Claim

DUBLIN, Ireland (AP)—The Irish, with a history filled with fighting and strife, are laying claim to being among the most law-abiding people in the world today.

Only 1,604 persons were sent to prison or reformatories in the republic last year, and only 14 of these under sentences of hard labor. The average daily population in the country's six penal institutions dropped to 457.

League Wants Added Pension

ST. LOUIS (AP)—A proposal for \$100-a-month pensions, without restrictions, for World War I veterans 60 years old or older, has been approved by the Marine Corp League.

A resolution, passed by the organization at its 32nd annual convention yesterday, directed the group's national leaders to seek legislation for such pensions.

The resolution said that it is traditional that veterans' pensions be established and liberalized on the basis of disabilities and need which increase with age.

whose department is taking the whole matter quite seriously, says that by 1975 half the adult population will be 45 or older.

As Mitchell views it, either older people are going to be provided jobs so they may support themselves, or younger people will be saddled with the cost of taking care of them.

League Wants Added Pension

The department contends, also, the older worker himself has changed — a man 45 has more youth and vigor because he has taken better care of himself, and has more skill and education than a person of the same age years ago.

SIX-POINT PROGRAM

Mitchell has launched a six-point program to combat age barriers in employment to answer these questions:

1. Is the older worker a good worker? The department says various studies already made by outside groups show he excels in many qualities. A study "broad enough to carry real conviction" is under way.
2. Are pension costs an obstacle? Many employers shy away from hiring older worker in belief it will hike their pension plan costs. The department is consulting experts on how this obstacle can be handled.
