Bruce K. Waterbury, 22, charged with non-support of minor children, pleaded not guilty. At the request of his attorney, H. C. Merryman, trial was set for September 28.

Three Persons Face Charges

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USBR Offers Trapping Land

Sealed bids will be received at the Klamath Falls office of the U. S. Bureau of Reclamation for the leasing of the 1,100 acre Hanks Marsh tract for trapping purposes only from November 1, 1955 to April 15, 1956.

The leasing of the land will be for this period only, with no option to renew the lease. The Bureau reserves the right to cancel the lease, whenever found necessary, upon written notice to lessee, served 30 days in advance thereof. If this is done the rent will be refunded in the same proportion as the unused period bears to the entire rental period.

Payment of the rental bid for the lease period must accompany the proposal. Such payments must be by cash, certified check, cashier's check, bank draft, or money order made payable to the bureau of reclamation. Deposits for proposals not accepted will be returned to the bidder promptly. No bid less than \$100 will be accepted.

No refunds or other adjustments will be made due to the lands being submerged or otherwise affected by the water levels of Upper Klamath Lake.

The right to trap muskrats and other fur-bearing animals on the leased area, insofar as is permitted by the laws of Oregon, is included in this lease. The approved form of the lease may be examined at the Klamath Bureau of Reclamation office. Envelopes bearing bids should be plainly marked "Lease of Lands - Hanks Marsh" and addressed to the USBR, P. O. Box 312, Klamath Falls, Oregon.
